Key Components

Agricultural Fertility: Discuss the blessing of the land in the region where Isaac settled, as described in Genesis 26:12-15. Compare the biblical agricultural practices with modern techniques used in similar environments today, discussing how natural resources contribute to prosperity and conflict, specifically water.

Technology (T): Tools of Survival and Communication

❖ Topic:

Explore the tools and technologies implied in Genesis 26-35, particularly those used in agriculture, animal husbandry, and the creation of altars and monuments.

Projects:

Agricultural Tools and Techniques:

Investigate the specific tools used by Isaac and Jacob in tending flocks and cultivating land, such as the use of staffs, tents, and simple hand tools. Create a comparison between these ancient tools and modern agricultural equipment, highlighting how these tools ensured survival and prosperity in the Near East.

Altar and Memorial Construction:

Examine the tools and methods used to construct altars and memorials, such as those in Genesis 28:18-22 and 35:7. Create a diagram showing how these structures were built, and discuss their significance in religious and cultural communication.

Engineering (E): Building and Settlement Structures

❖ Topic:

Analyze the engineering and construction aspects of the settlements, wells, and altars mentioned in Genesis 26-35, with a focus on their practicality and symbolic meaning.

❖ Project:

Settlement Design Project: Create a model of a typical settlement where Isaac or Jacob might have lived, focusing on the layout and engineering required to support a large family and their livestock. Discuss how the construction of these settlements was

	influenced by environmental factors and the needs of a nomadic lifestyle.
Arts (A): Visual and Literary Expression of Covenant and Struggle	 Topic: Interpret the themes of covenant, struggle, and reconciliation in the stories of Genesis 26-35. Projects: Covenant and Struggle Art Project: Create a visual art piece that represents key moments of covenant and struggle in these chapters, such as Isaac's conflicts over wells (Genesis 26) and Jacob's wrestling with God (Genesis 32:22-32). Use painting, drawing, or digital art to capture the emotional and spiritual significance of these events.
