

Genesis 18-25 Bible Study

Objective: This study guide is designed to explore Genesis chapters 18-25 through the interdisciplinary approach of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics, and Social Studies (STEAMS). By examining these chapters through various projects, participants will gain a deeper understanding of the themes of faith, family, and God's promises as seen in the lives of Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, and Ishmael.

Key Components

Science (S): The Natural World and Divine Intervention

- ❖ **Topic:**
Explore the natural elements and divine interventions described in Genesis 18-25, focusing on the role of the environment in the lives of Abraham's family and the miraculous events that occurred.
- ❖ **Projects:**
 - Environmental Analysis:** Study the natural environment of the region where Abraham and his family lived, including the oaks of Mamre (Genesis 18:1). Create a project that examines how the environment influenced the daily lives and spiritual experiences of these biblical figures.
 - Miracles and Divine Intervention:** Analyze the divine interventions in these chapters, such as the miraculous birth of Isaac (Genesis 21:1-7) and the provision of water for Hagar and Ishmael in the desert. Discuss the significance of these miracles in the context of God's promises, and explore how these events might be understood in relation to the natural world.

<p>Technology (T): Tools and Survival in a Nomadic Lifestyle</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Investigate the tools and technologies used by Abraham and his family in their nomadic lifestyle, focusing on the innovations that ensured their survival and prosperity. ❖ Projects: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Nomadic Tools and Techniques: Study the specific tools used by Abraham’s family, such as tents, cooking utensils, and weapons for protection (Genesis 18:6-8, 21:20). Create a model or display of these tools, discussing how they were essential for survival in the harsh environments of the ancient Near East. Sustaining Life in the Wilderness: Explore the technologies and methods used to sustain life in the wilderness, particularly in the stories of Hagar and Ishmael (Genesis 21:14-21) and Abraham’s journeys. Research how ancient nomads gathered water, prepared food, and protected themselves from the elements, and compare these methods to modern survival techniques.
<p>Engineering (E): Building Altars and Wells</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Examine the engineering aspects of constructing altars and digging wells in Genesis 18-25, focusing on their practical and spiritual significance. ❖ Projects: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Altar Construction: Develop a blueprint of the altars built by Abraham, such as the one at Moriah where he prepared to sacrifice Isaac (Genesis 22:9). Discuss the materials and methods used to construct these altars, as well as their significance in worship and covenant-making.

	<p>Well Digging and Maintenance: Investigate the engineering involved in digging and maintaining wells, as seen in Genesis 21:25-31 when Abraham disputes over a well at Beersheba. Create a detailed project that illustrates the process of well-digging in biblical times, discussing the importance of water access for sustaining life and fostering community in a nomadic lifestyle.</p>
<p>Arts (A): Visual and Literary Expression of Covenant and Struggle</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Interpret the themes of faith, sacrifice, and divine promise in Genesis 18-25. ❖ Projects: Faith and Sacrifice Art: Create a visual art piece that represents key moments of faith and sacrifice in these chapters, such as Abraham’s hospitality to the three visitors (Genesis 18:1-8). Use painting, drawing, or digital art to capture the emotional and spiritual significance of these events. Literary Reflections on Faith: Write a poem, song, or narrative that explores the themes of faith, obedience, and trust in God’s promises, as demonstrated in the lives of Abraham and Sarah. Reflect on how these themes are relevant today, and how they can inspire personal faith and commitment.

Discuss the significance of these lineages in fulfilling God's promises and the mathematical implications of population growth and inheritance.
<p>Social Studies (SS): Cultural and Ethical Context</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Analyze the family dynamics between Abraham, Sarah, Hagar, Isaac, and Ishmael as depicted in Genesis 18-25. ❖ Project: Cultural Practices of Hospitality: Study the cultural significance given the dilemmas faced by each character, such as Sarah's decision to expel Hagar and Ishmael, and Abraham's struggle with the command to sacrifice Isaac. Create a case study that presents these dilemmas and discuss potential resolutions from both ancient and modern ethical perspectives.
