## Definitions

The following definition of EFO terms is here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on EFO's.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal. How do you decide what's an error versus a freak or oddity?

## Errors: Are usually

"major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. Examples of "errors" are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts.

## Perforation Errors

\& Gutters (Pairs, Snipes and Selvage)

In my last Column on EFO's (EFO's Part V), I focused on the occurrence of Perforation Errors \& other Perforation Phenomena. Our EFO topic this time is on Perforation Phenomena surrounding Gutter Pairs, Snipes and Selvage. After the release of the last issues topic, it was brought to my attention by several club members that the editor had intolerably left out some of our member's favorite perforation EFO's (The Guttersnipe).

As stated last issue, Stamps with Perforation Phenomena are among the most common types of Errors, Freaks and Oddities. Mis-Perfs over the past century have become popular among stamp collectors.

The term "Guttersnipe" was originally used to describe a young hoodlum or street urchin. Many historians attribute its earliest usage to the author with the nom de plume "Mark Twain" aka Samuel Clemens. However, in the Philatelic realm, a guttersnipe has a totally different meaning.

## So what are philatelic Guttersnipes?

A philatelic guttersnipe is defined as one or more stamps to which is attached the full gutter from between panes, plus any amount of an adjoining $\operatorname{stamp}(\mathrm{s})$. This term is typically used in reference to U.S. stamps. Guttersnipes can be caused by a production process misregistration of the cutting device or a paper foldover. Another definition for Guttersnipes (EFO), is a stamp or stamps to which is attached a gutter, including perforations and sometimes including portions of the stamp(s) on the other side of a margin or gutter. A guttersnipe should be regarded as an (ERROR). So what is a gutter? A gutter is formed because stamps are printed on a sheet of paper and on each sheet are usually printed four or more panes of stamps. Panes typically contain from 1 to 100 or more individual stamps. What collectors today call a sheet of stamps is actually a single pane of stamps from the original "sheet". A gutter is that area, with or without printing which is located between the stamps of one pane and the stamps of an adjacent pane.

## Oddities: The catch-all

 category for anything that is left. Oddities are often very subtle problems and do not have catalog status.Examples of oddities can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancellations, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, and so forth. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There will continue to be a debate about the definition of freaks and oddities. This is one area where a
classification can be a matter of personal opinion.
A frequent area of debate is over pre-printing paper folds. The debate centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

## Guttersnipe \& Gutter Selvage

Technically a guttersnipe is classified as an EFO. As can be seen from the image below, the gutter exists between the stamps of each pane but a small amount of the stamp on the adjacent pane is still attached to the clear gutter. This is simply a miss-registration of the full sheet of stamps on the cutter machine.

Gutter selvage is simply the selvage left attached to a stamp that has perforations on the outside of the selvage indicating that the stamp was attached to another pane of stamps at some time. Because they are considered a production anomaly rather than intentional they fall under the EFO Category.


The format in which they are collected will depend on the type of selvage gutter. For the example above the stamps on this sheet consisted of 4 stamp panes. The Selvage markings that are parallel to the edge come from the gutter between the panes and are not seen with a plate number which is associated with the outer edge of a press sheet. When the press sheet was cut, the cut would normally split the gutter markings. However, when the cutting process is off, it cuts into the stamp instead of through the gutter which is how a guttersnipe is created.

## What was Farley's Folly?

The infamous "Farley's Follies" hullabaloo began in 1933 when James A. Farley (1888-1976), took several stamp sheets from the presses before they were gummed and/or perforated. He signed these sheets which were not made available to the public and gave them to his friends and family. In doing so he had created some very prized stamp rarities. Many collectors were livid when they discovered what he had done. Eventually, the Post Office came up with a solution to the issue by reissuing in sheet form all the stamps issued since March 4, 1933. These Reissued sheets were all in ungummed format, and in sufficient numbers to devalue the original sheets and also satisfy public's demand.

Marginal markings that are at right angles to the selvage edge appear at the edges of the press sheet and not between the panes. So on US stamps of the era, you will in general NOT find gutter with perpendicular markings. However, if those markings exist, they will be on the same side as the sheets plate number. Warning: Many guttersnipe collectors want the entire gutter intact. If there are no marginal markings, then most want part or the entire adjacent stamp to show that it is not just a selvage with fake perforations added.

## Gutter Pairs and Various Combinations

These are probably the most common form of collecting gutter issues. If you are a U.S. Gutter collector then you most likely have gutter combinations from the United States Parks issue in your collection. These are known as part of "Farley's Follies", (see column left for explanation of Farley's Follies) or the Farley issues and are the most intricate gutter varieties in modern US gutter stamp collecting. This is because there are manifold combinations of gutter pairs, blocks, line blocks cross gutter blocks, and the full gutter panes. Some collectors also collect these combinations in both the vertical and horizontal formats.

## Our Poway Stamp Club

The Poway Stamp Club (PSC) welcomes anybody with an interest in stamps, from the beginner to the seasoned collector. The club meets twice a month. At the meetings we have club business, presentations, Show and Tell, APS Circuits, raffles and/or planned social activities. The club presentations are typically given by either a Club member or other interesting person telling the rest of us about a particular aspect of stamp collecting that interests them. We also occasionally have "Show and Tell" sessions where members can share new acquisitions to their collections. Club-owned copies of current Scott catalogs are always available for members to peruse and check out (See Club Librarian Scott Boyd).

Several times each year as scheduled the Library and Poway Stamp Club hold 2 synchronized Stamp Auctions. Both Auctions contain a mixture of both library and member-submitted lots. Our Auctions are presided over by Auctioneer De jour, Duane Pryhoda. The Auctions generally contain 50 to 200 lots consisting of a great variety of stamps, albums, covers, etc. Items range in price from a minimum of $\$ 1.00$ to several hundreds of dollars; normally most all of the provided lots will sell at one or the other auctions. The first of the 2 auctions is typically held on a prior Saturday on a week containing a Stamp Club meeting; volunteers at the Library location graciously do the setup, with lot viewing starting at 10 am the day of auction. Bidders view the lots, and if interested are offered/sign up for a bidding paddle. At or around noon the bidding battle royal (fun) begins.

## Free U.S. Stamp Album:

Did you know that you can go online and print a complete U.S. Stamp Album for free! (Well the cost of paper and Ink are on you). Nearly 800 of them, in fact. The Philosateleian includes spaces for all but the rarest U.S. postage stamps. You can customize them however you like, and best of all, they're free. ## The Precision U.S. Specialty Multi-Gauge

A while back, I introduced at a Show n Tell, The New and Improved U.S. Specialized Multi-Gauge. It is an essential tool for any collector interested in U.S. stamps from the Classics through the Liberty Issue of 1954. It has become one of my most indispensible philatelic tools.

The new gauge contains 11 precision measuring devices beginning with a Specialty Perf Gauge based on the Kiusalas Specialist Gauge. For collectors of the Grilled Issues, there are two useful gauges: the Grill Pattern Gauge, used to determine the grill type of a stamp, and the Grill Size Gauge, which is used to determine the size of the grill. The Parallel Line Millimeter Gauge is used to measure the width or height of coil stamps, as well as the parallel accuracy of coil cuts and edges. For collectors of Flat Press/Rotary Press issues, the Design Size Millimeter Gauge will quickly measure the size of the frame design of these stamps, while the Rotary/Flat Press Gauge is the quickest way to determine what press was used to print a stamp. The Schermack Private Perforation Gauge accurately reflects the vertical height of Schermack Type III perforations. The Large and Small Hole Perf 10 issues of the Liberty Series can easily be distinguished using this measuring device. A Standard Perf Gauge, which measures to the nearest tenth of a perforation; a Cancellation Diameter Gauge and an enlarged 240mm long Millimeter Scale are the final three devices on the gauge.

The grill points in the Grill Pattern Gauge have been lightened, to allow users to better see through the gauge. Includes a protective slipcover shown and a colored "contrasting background card" to aid in measurements. The back of the slip cover has a summary of the instructions and feature description shown below
