## Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms are here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on Varieties, EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. Examples of "errors" are consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal and typically are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

## Freaks: Also called

"varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have
flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or reentries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

## Varieties \& EFOs Part XX  Space Accomplishments Block

The U.S. Space Accomplishments stamps \#2632 was issued on May 29, 1992 in Chicago IL. There were over 37 million of these stamps printed by the bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) using the Photogravure printing method. The stamps are multicolored and have a perforation of 11 both horizontally and vertically.

These stamps are part of a dramatic se-tenant block of four stamps that when joined side by side present the former rivals (Soviet Russian Cosmonauts and U.S. NASA Astronauts) in a scene of apparent space cooperation.

Oddities: The catch-all
category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

## Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to defraud the issuing authority. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery: Fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer.

Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

The stamp design was a collaboration between U.S. and Soviet artists presenting a broad spectrum of space exploration. The stamps explore the significant past and present achievements of the previous 25 years while letting us take a look at and anticipate some possible future joint achievements.

The 2633 Varieties - In the lower left, of the United States 29c space stamp set of 1992, the one that pictures the U.S. Apollo orbiter, shows a consistent plate flaw. This EFO variety is named the "Toaster Cord" flaw because it resembles a loose cord.

Of the four stamps in the unified design, the U.S. Apollo orbiter is the major element in the stamp affected, i.e. Scott 3633. This EFO variety appears near the lower right of the bottom pane of 50. The flaw color is Black and is always located in the lower-right corner, at position L49.

## More Important Definitions

Reissues
(a reprint of a currently available stamp)

Reprints
(copies of the obsolete originals)
Special Printings
(original plate stamps for non-
postal use, while originals are still valid for postage)

Government issued Reproductions
(Not printed from the original plates, not valid postage, considered Ikenesses.) Examples US Scott 3-4

The Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) claims that the flaw appears twice in a proof sheet of four panes, but only on the bottom 2 panes, once per pane. ${ }^{1}$ The BEP claims that the flaw was caused by a hair from the black negative and was transferred to the film used to make the black gravure cylinder. This is the result of the fact that with gravure printing uses one cylinder per color. Less than 1.5 million of the error stamps were sold as part of the larger 149.26 million stamp distribution. Interestingly, 1.5 million EFO stamps would typically be enough in the market to handle demand had the stamp been found and reported when the stamps were current; however, it took 18 months for this flaw to be identified. As such, far fewer mint examples survived for collectors. You should check your blocks, plate blocks and strips to see if you have an example of this "Toaster Cord" variety.

This set of Space stamps can also be found with another special and expensive variety. The designation for this true error (variety) is 2634 a. yellow omitted and has a Scott value of over $\$ 4500$. You must be very weary of these EFOs as the yellow in stamps Nos. 2631-2634 can e easily removed by exposure to sunlight. The editor recommends that it is essential all color omitted varieties of this series be expertised.

Again, Varieties \& EFO's make an exciting and educational addition to any stamp collection for they speak to us about how stamps are produced and how mistakes can be made during the production of stamps.

# Distinguished Marines Camp Pendleton Ceremony 

Camp Pendleton special post mark for dedication of new Distinguished Marine Stamps, November 10, 2005

Back in 2005, a marine friend of mine invited me to the first day dedication of the new marine stamps issued in Washington and Camp Pendleton. Four stamps were issued that day that honored distinguished marines; Gunnery Sergeant John Basilone, Sergeant Major Daniel Joseph Daly, Lieutenant General John A. Lejeune, and Lieutenant General Lewis B. Puller.

Included is a biography of the four marines honored by the stamps.


In addition to the first day of issue ceremony cover for the stamp with the Camp Pendleton post mark, I was able to have a Washington DC post mark and a Camp Pendleton post mark attached to the same envelope. I attached a John Basilone stamp to the cover as he has the most connection to San Diego. A statue is located in Little Italy, San Diego, honoring Sergeant Basilone.

Camp Pendleton is the largest marine base in America. It is part of the former Santa Margarita Ranch and was purchased for $\$ 4,000,000$ in 1942 . The base includes 17 miles of beach property, and has protected San Diego from completely turning into an extension of Los Angeles sprawl.

# Why I Collect Cachet Covers <br> ———券•会 <br> "And they say Cover Collecting is DEAD" 

In philately, a cachet is a printed or stamped design or inscription, other than a cancellation or pre-printed postage, on an envelope, postcard, or postal card to commemorate a postal or philatelic event. There are official and private (independent of postal authorities) cachets. They commemorate everything from the first flight on a particular route, to the Super Bowl. Cachets are also frequently made, either by private companies or a government, for first day of issue stamp events.
Cachet covers have been around for quite a while. Most notable, Civil War cachet covers.

By 1920, led by collectors like Edward Worden, cachet First Day Cover collecting had a devoted following. But FDCs could still only be sold by the date of the cancellation on the envelope. It wasn't until 1923 that the first envelope cachet, indicating that the cover is a FDC, and what the purpose of the stamp was, that FDC collecting entered its modern phase. This first cachet was on the 1923 Harding memorial issue that was released for the recently deceased President Warren Harding..
The first cachet FDC (first day cover) was produced by prominent philatelist and cachet maker George Ward Linn in 1923, for the Harding Memorial stamp issue.

That is the story of FDC's. My interest is with the cachet and why they were created. Cachet-making is considered an art form, and cachets may be produced by using any number of methods, including drawing or painting directly onto the envelope, serigraphy, block printing, lithography, engraving, laser printing, attachment of photographs or other paper memorabilia, etc.

The largest and best-known cachet-making companies, which typically produce thousands or tens of thousands of printed cachets for U.S. stamp issues, are ArtCraft (1939-2015), Artmaster, Fleetwood, House of Farnam, and Colorano. That is the short History for cacheted FDC. My collecting interests are with cachets that are of interest to me or my collecting interest (it's not always the stamp). You have private individuals who have entered into the market. Using modern technology such as laser color printers, artists who "hand print cachets" like Dorothy Knapp, Collins H. Brehm to name a few, and even you and me.

Below is a Ken Boll cached FDC for Scott 983, First elected governor of Puerto Rico. The majority of Ken Boll's cachets were used to complement covers for U.S. issues. However, he did create several cachets for Canadian and United Nations stamps.

The following Issue dates, stamp subjects and formats are tentative and subject to change. They are based on Linn's listing of projected 2020 releases.


Bugs Bunny 80th Anniversary 10 Forever Stamps
July 27 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20
Bugs Bunny has been known for his impeccable impersonations and his masterful masquerades, so the soon-to-be-revealed 10 designs on this pane of 20 stamps each showcase a costumed Bugs Bunny in some of his most memorable getups. The original stamp artwork is based on Bugs Bunny's iconic moments and was created especially for this issuance by Warner Bros. Entertainment Inc., featuring work from Warner Bros. Animation artists. They also have created sketches on the reverse side of the stamp pane.


## Thank You Forever Stamps

Aug 21 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20
Two simple words can mean so much. Say "Thank you" in style with four new stamps. Highlighted in gold foil ar the words :Thank you" in cursive script and an elegant floral design that swirls through and around the word Dan Tanamachi the stamp designer and lettering artist, drew the original sketches for the calligraphy by hand and then created the final art digitally.

$19^{\text {th }}$ Amendment: Women Vote 10 Forever Stamps
Aug 22 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20

Inspired by historic photographs, the stamp art features a stylized illustration of suffragists marching in a parade or other public demonstration. The clothes they wear and the banners they bear display the official colors of the Nationals Woman's Party (NWP) Purple, white and Gold.

The $19^{\text {th }}$ Amendment Women Vote stamps are being issued as Forever stamps and will always be equal in value to the current First-Clas Male one-ounce price.


## Innovation Forever Stamps

Five New stamps in a pane of 20 celebrate the American spirit of innovation, specifically in fields in which U.S. scientists and engineers have made significant contributions that have touched lives around the world: computing, biomedicine, genome sequencing, robotics, and solar technology.

Pioneering Japanese American Artist Ruth Asawa is perhaps the best known for intricate abstract wire sculptures. Inspired by nature, asawa transformed industrial material into transparent and seemingly weightless works of art that challenged traditional definitions of sculpture. She is also acclaimed for her drawings, paintings, prints, and large public projects.


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
