5. Show \& Tell - Do you have an interesting philatelic item to share at our next meeting? Bring it in and share it with us as we would love to see it!
6. Pony Express - The fastest Express delivery was made in March 1861, when President Abraham Lincoln's inaugural address was carried 1966 miles from St. Joseph to Sacramento in 7 days and 17 hours. On July 1, 1861, the Pony Express, already deeply in debt, began operating under contract as a mail route. Even charging as much as $\$ 5$ per half ounce the Express was not able to make its expenses. The Pony Express officially ended October 26, 1861, after the Transcontinental telegraph line was completed, and became an enduring legend
7. Silk Paper - Is an inaccurate description of this variety, as the tiny pieces of colored fiber found in some stamps, primarily of the 1873 regular issue, but occasionally seen on other early issues, are really tiny rag fragments found in the paper pulp. The silk paper found ONLY on the 1873 regular issue (aside from the color- fibered type already described) consists of extremely tiny BLACK fibers, which require strong magnification $(15 \mathrm{X}+)$ to detect.
8. Album Weed - In general, is a forged stamp. It also refers to unusual items that resemble postage stamps but were not intended to pay postage, like publicity labels and bogus issues. Album weed should never be confused with the hopeless act of rolling anything with a Scott Glassine Separator Page. ;)

## Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms is here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. Examples of "errors" are consistent,
unintentional deviations from the normal and typically are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or
tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or re-entries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

## Editors Corner

## Guest Speaker Eric Chaulsett will visit PSC for a Presentation on Washington-Franklin Plate Number Singles.

It is our honor to have guest speaker Eric Chaulsett come to the Poway Stamp Club from the Long Beach Stamp Club. Eric is an expert in Washington-Franklin Plate Number Singles with over 30 years of collecting experience. Eric is also a member of the American Plate Number Single Society, the American Philatelic Society, United States Stamp Society and member of the W-F Study Groups. We look forward to his informative presentation on January 22, 2020. Below Eric has provided his brief Bio so that we may better familiarize ourselves with him.

## Brief Bio of Eric Chaulsett

Stamp collecting began as a quest for a Cub Scout Merit Badge. I collected for a few years, but as I got older the interest faded, and I traded the collection for a surfboard. The military (USMC) came next and after college I began a career in Aerospace and retired after forty years with employment at several different aerospace firms. My career culminated with Northrop Grumman after 25 years.

During my married years I collected off and on. However, after my divorce my collecting interest resurged. I decided that collecting the world was too much. I began collecting United States, but again decided collecting it all would be too much. I began thinking, "What should I narrow my collection down to?" One of the stamps that caught my interest was a 13 cent Washington - Franklin with a 1910-year date on the stamp. So, I began looking into the W-F era issues and discovered a treasure trove of challenges.

I began collecting year dates on the stamp, plate number singles, plate singles on cover, blocks and plate blocks. That, too, was a bit much. The eye catcher was the plate number used to print the stamps, so I actively sought out the W-F plate singles for my collection.

Oddities: The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.
There continues to be a
debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a
classification can be a matter
of personal opinion.
Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

## Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to defraud the issuing authority. (Typically used as postage)
Forgery: fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer. Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)
For more information on definitions of and values for many EFOs. See the S.R. Dazt book, "Catalogues of Errors on US Postage Stamps."

I joined the Long Beach Stamp Club, the American Plate Number Single Society, the American Philatelic Society, United States Stamp Society and member of the W-F Study Group. I ultimately became the President of the APNSS for two terms.

In order to accurately identify the various types of the W-F printings, I developed a philatelic library that includes the B.I.A. Plate Number Checklist, Plates 1 - 20,000, The Expert's Book, A Practical Guide to the Authentication of United States Stamps, a Durland Standard Plate Number Catalog, the Encyclopedia of Plate Varieties on U.S. BureauPrinted Postage Stamps, Hebert's Reference Guide to Plate Number Singles, and Printing History of Washington - Franklin Flat $1 \not \subset$ and $2 \notin$ Plates and Rotary Sheet and Coil Stamps. There is also an article published by the B.I.A. Weekly Philatelic Gossip in 1937 that identifies how to determine a partial plate number when only a portion of the number is present. All of this info was combined to take me to the next step in collecting: Inventory Accountability.

With that much info available, I needed a way to account for the plate numbers in my collection. While still employed, I recruited assistance from the software crowd to create an Excel spreadsheet for tracking the collection. The spreadsheet is organized by W-F issues starting with Scott Number 331 and finishes with Scott Number 547. It gets a bit complex, but an example of the spreadsheet will be in my presentation.

I have intensely collected for over 30 years and I'm now becoming interested in forming an exhibit. I have five presentations on W-F's that I will condense into one "Presento" for the January 2020, club meeting.

## The "Fly Specker"

## The "Fly-Specker" (a non-pejorative)

It is an unusual and odd experience when you show someone your specialty album and the first remark you get is "So you only collect the bad stamps?" Then when you think about it, you realize that they just might be right. It is true that as a collector of Bureau Varieties, one seeks out the most cracked, scratched, gouged, shifted; doubly impressed incomplete stamps possible. This curious compulsion of stalking certain issues has garnered many names including specialist, shift hunter and/or my favorite El Fly-Specker.

So why do we do it? From the Editors perspective and also as a collector of "Classic" U.S. Stamps, one soon realizes that collecting classic beauties becomes an exercise in restraint. Restraint is needed because at some point adding a new acquisition becomes a significant investment or a downright budget buster. For this reason FlySpecking becomes an outlet to collect U.S. stamps at more reasonable budgetary levels. Besides, what's the point In having all of your time and money tied up in a collection that looks just like the next guys?

Thankfully, for the collector of U.S. non-catalog listed plate and printing flaws, the lower valued stamps of the first half of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century are an immensely target rich environment. The reason for this is that these stamps were literally printed by the billions, using a plethora of process steps and printing methodologies. These stamps are still available to the collector in bulk and more importantly at very reasonable prices. Even better your search for these "varieties" and their identification will stimulate your interest in collecting while increasing the true monetary value of your collection.

After all, a collection is or should be a reflection of the character of its owner. So put some personality in your collection, by including in it stamps with "Character", especially those items that the other guy does not.

Again, EFO's make an exciting and educational addition to any stamp collection for they speak to us about how stamps are produced and how mistakes can be made during the production of stamps.
