The Stamp depicted on page 1 header, is Scott U.S. #77 it was first issued on April 14, 1866. Only 2.13 million #77 stamps were produced - Created by the **National Bank Note Company in** Perf. 12, the stamp is considered by many as the First U.S. Mourning Stamp. This 15¢ stamp was issued nearly a year after John Wilkes Booth assassinated President Lincoln at the Ford Theater in Washington, D.C. Lincoln, our 16th President, is known throughout the world as the "Great Emancipator." and is memorialized on what is considered to be the first mourning stamp.

Editors Corner

The Library and Poway Stamp Club Auctions.

(From our last Newsletter) Several times each year as scheduled the Library and Poway Stamp Club hold 2 synchronized Stamp Auctions. Both Auctions contain a mixture of both library and member-submitted lots. Our Auctions are presided over by Auctioneer De jour, Duane Pryhoda. The Auctions generally contain 50 to 200 lots consisting of a great variety of stamps, albums, covers, etc. Items range in price from a minimum of \$1.00 to several hundreds of dollars; normally most all of the provided lots will sell at one or the other auctions. The first of the 2 auctions is always held on a prior Saturday on a week containing a Stamp Club meeting; volunteers at the Library location graciously do the setup, with lot viewing starting at 10 am the day of auction. Bidders view the lots, and if interested are offered/sign up for a bidding paddle. At or around noon the bidding begins.

Some Helpful Auction <u>ETIQUETTE</u> (In General)

Be sure to get your Bidder's number card before the auction starts. Come early and look over the lots for sale before the auction. During the auction, lots will be identified by their lot number and a very brief Description of the lot. When bidding for a lot, please raise your Bidder's Number card and keep it up until you no longer

wish to bid. Flipping the card up and down is confusing for the auctioneers. Please keep extraneous conversation to a minimum. This makes it easier for everyone to hear what the auctioneer is selling, and allows the auctioneer to more easily keep track of the bidding. Please never ask to review a lot while an Auction is in progress. While your purchases will be given to you during the auction, please wait until the end of the auction to pay for them. Your name will be called as the tallies are completed. Those who are only buying will be called first. Buyers who are also sellers will be called next. Sellers with unsold lots should be sure to pick up their lots before leaving. Please be sure to return the Bidder's Number cards so that we can use them again in the following auctions. We look forward to seeing you there.



I was digging through some old business correspondence when I came across the item pictured above. Not terribly unusual except it has two mildly perplexing characteristics. First, it is stamped "CLASSIFICATION SECTION" under an Official Business P-17 return address to the USPO Los Angeles. Second the entire envelope has, well, the *smell* of a *fire* in the woods, or a tree burning. After looking inside, here Is what I found:



This Envelope was obviously burned in a fire. Below the delivery address is a stamp which reads, "Damaged in Fire In Railway Mail Car Daggett, California"



One might ask, "So, what piece of mail was so important to forward after a mail car fire?" Further investigation of the inner contents was found a 1958 Census of Business. Ok, mildly interesting, a census of Businesses was conducted in 1958 to enumerate the retail, wholesale and selected service establishments in the continental U.S., this was in order to produce a Subject and Trade reported to be issued in 1960 as final Census of Business volumes.

U.S. Statue of Freedom Stamps

Release Date: June 27 || Multi pane sizes

New \$1, \$2, and \$5 Statue of freedom high-value engraved definitives are on the way for United States stamp collectors. The USPS recently announced a detail of the statue of Freedom atop the U.S. Capitol will appear on all three values, which will be issued on June 27. All three stamps are being printed in intaglio. This design issue will be a marked improvement over the existing high value abstract Wave issues.

Statue of Freedom*



<u>\$1 Statue of Freedom</u>

The U.S. Postal Service will be issuing the \$1 *Statue of Freedom stamp*, offering a modern take on vintage patriotic stamp art for use on packages, large envelopes and other mailings. \$1 *Statue of Freedom* will be sold in panes of 10 stamps.



<u>\$2 Statue of Freedom</u>

The Postal Service will be issuing the \$2 *Statue of Freedom*, also offering a modern take on vintage patriotic stamp art for use on packages, large envelopes and other mailings. \$2 *Statue of Freedom* will be sold in panes of 10 stamps.



<u>\$5 Statue of Freedom</u>

The Postal Service will be issuing the \$5 *Statue of Freedom* for use on packages, large envelopes and other mailings. \$5 *Statue of Freedom* will be sold in panes of four stamps.

These three designs feature the head of the statue that tops the United States Capitol dome, in a modern interpretation of an engraved vignette originally created for a 1923 stamp (\$5 Head of *Freedom* Statue). The engraved artwork was originally created for the U.S. Bureau of Engraving and Printing by John Eissler (1873–1962). Rendered in emerald green (\$1), indigo (\$2) and brick red (\$5), the tightly cropped enlargements highlight the solid and dashed lines and the crosshatching characteristic of engraved illustrations.

American sculptor Thomas Crawford (1814–57) created the *Statue of Freedom* during the mid-1850s. She wears a variation on a Roman helmet circled by stars, topped with an eagle head, and embellished by feathered plumes meant to evoke Native American headdress. Installation of the statue onto the new Capitol dome was completed in 1863.

All three stamps were printed in intaglio and were designed by Art Director Greg Breeding.

U.S. Frozen Treat Stamps

Release Date: June 20 | Austin TX | DS pane of 20



The United States Postal Service will issue its previously announced set of 10 Frozen Treats forever stamps June 20. The nondenominated (50¢) stamps will be sold in a double-sided pane of 20, which the Postal Service describes as a booklet. A first-day ceremony will take place at 6 p.m. in the Event Courtyard at the **Thinkery Children's Museum**, 1830 Simond Ave., in Austin, Texas. The ceremony is free and open to the public.

The Frozen Treats stamp designs each show two "frosty, colorful, icy pops on a stick," set against a white background. Americans love cool, refreshing ice pops on a hot summer day. Ice pops are made by large manufacturers, home cooks, and artisanal shops. In recent years, frozen treats containing fresh fruit such as kiwi, watermelon, blueberries, oranges, and strawberries have become more common. This booklet of 20 stamps showcases Margaret Berg's whimsical watercolor illustrations of frozen treats. Each of the 10 stamp designs has two different treats.

The watercolor illustrations are by California artist Margaret Berg, a native of South Africa who studied at Otis College of Art and Design in Los Angeles.

U.S. Airmail Army Pilots Stamp

Release Date: Aug 11 | Washington DC | PSA pane of 20



The airmail stamp being issued to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the beginning of regular airmail service will be the second of two identical design stamps to be issued this year. This commemorates the pioneering spirit of the brave Army pilots who initiated the world's first regularly scheduled airmail service.

The nondenominated (50ϕ) red U.S. Airmail stamp <u>will be issued Aug. 11</u> in College Park, Md., according to information sent out in a May 1 USPS press release. The red stamp will have the same intaglio-printed Jenny biplane design as the blue U.S. Airmail stamp issued May 1 in Washington, D.C.
