



- 3. **Support your Club** With over <u>55 active members</u>, the Poway Club is San Diego County's most active Stamp Club. - 4. Show & Tell Do you have an interesting philatelic item to share at our next meeting? Bring it in and share it with us as we would love to see it!
- 5. Tied Cover A method or way of identifying the authenticity of a stamp on cover. The cancellation of a stamp typically leaves an impression on both the stamp and the cover itself. When tied the stamp will show that it was already affixed to the cover before being cancelled. Most collectors prefer stamps that are "tied" because it helps to ensure the authenticity of higher value covers.
- 6. **Mourning Covers** During the 20th century in the days before the internet, death notices and/or condolences were frequently mailed using envelopes that have a distinct black-boarder. These covers are now referred to by philatelists as a "mourning cover."
- Cachet Cover An envelope or cover can also be adorned with a
 picture that is printed, stamped, or glued onto the envelope. This is
 called a cacheted cover. Covers with no cachets are likewise called
 un-cacheted covers.

Member Spotlight!

The Poway Stamp Club Newsletter highlights one of its members each issue. Today's spotlight is on **ARDEN SIMONI**

"GUAM GUARD MAIL" stamps and covers are the primary focus for new member # 478, ARDEN SIMONI. The stamps are especially historical. Originally issued by the US NAVY as overprints on USA stamps of the Commonwealth of the Philippines, the stamps and are now listed in Scott USA with "M" headings (for military). Guam Guard Mail stamps have higher catalog values for used and on cover varieties than for mint.

Arden now lives in Carlsbad. He has an especially unique and fascinating INTERNATIONAL personal career including living in GERMANY for 3 years and in RUSSIA for 10 years. His interest in philately has been slowly growing since childhood and has recently "explosively re-emerged" after a 50 year gap. Welcome to The Poway Stamp Club...ARDEN SIMONI!

Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms is here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. Examples of "errors" are consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal and typically are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or tagging and **FULL** stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or re-*entries* are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

Editors Corner

Oddities: The catch-all

category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to <u>defraud the issuing</u> <u>authority</u>. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery: fraudulent

reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to <u>defraud the buyer</u>.

Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are <u>not offered as genuine to</u> <u>defraud</u>. (reprints may be considered fakes)

For more information on definitions of and values for many EFOs. See the S.R. Dazt book, "*Catalogues of Errors on US Postage Stamps.* " The falls divide the river into the upper and lower Iguaçu (meaning Great Water). Together they make up the largest waterfalls system in the world. The cataracts are complex with almost 300 separate waterfalls which drop an average of 220 feet over a front of <u>1.7 miles</u>. Additionally, the falls are so complex that it is nearly impossible for stamp designers or even photographers to capture the amazing spectacle that is this most amazing of places.

For this article the editor found a plethora of both Brazilian and Argentinean stamps that depict the beautiful Iguazu falls. It would be quite easy to create a topical album that contained nothing but waterfall stamps. A good-looking topical stamp collection of Iguazu Falls could be assembled at little cost, with issuing countries including Argentina, Brazil, the United Nations, and others.

The Garganta del Diablo, the Devil's Throat, is an abyss where torrents of water thunder downward. A walkway has been created right to the brink of the falls. You can look straight down from this vantage point and hear the mighty roar while being drenched by the continuous spray



The Devil's Throat

The bulk of the river rages down the devils throat an apt appellation, for in this great inferno the water roars, tears about and displays every possible color as it springs from the V-shaped channel created by erosion. Its torrent is so violent that it heaves about colossal stones. It is here upon one of these giant stones that an American once carved the phrase" "Poor Niagara." Upon leaving the Devil's Throat, the water moves along one side of San Martin Island, while the wide and semi-circular sweep of the rest of the volume of water including San Martin Falls goes on the other side. The two volumes meet at a point past the island 12 miles below to join the Parana river. The rainy season can add a depth of 10 feet to the falls. In the Devil's Throat in May to June may raise the water as much as 120 feet above the dry season level. The maximum flow is estimated at 40,000,000 cubic feet per minute.

An Argentinean stamp, from 2014, makes the attempt to depict the Devil's Throat (Scott 10 peso 2725c). Behind and just to the left of the Toucan's head. On the right is a 10 peso stamp of San Martin Falls as part of the Iguaçu complex.

The souvenir sheet from Argentina is a composition with wildlife and vegetation of the region with the water fall depicted. On left side is the \$10 stamp of Devil's Throat in the background of the stamp, which consists of a U-shaped 82 meter high, 82 meter wide and 700 meter long chasm where half of the river flows.

Both Brazil and Argentina have over-time, issued stamps to commemorate and promote the falls. The first, from Argentina in 1936, was SC#448 5 pesos. The stamp shows a large palm with two tiers of beautiful falls behind it The Argentinean stamp was followed closely by a set of stamps from Brazil.

Iguacu National Park was Brazil's first National park, created in 1939. By that time, Brazil had its own stamps honoring the falls: a 1,000 reis denomination and a 5,000r (Scott 456), both with the same design, inscribed "Cataratas de Iguassu".

The Iguaçu River rises near the city of Curitiba and for most of its course, the river flows through Brazil, with most of the falls on the Argentine side. The Iguazu River forms the boundary between Argentina and Brazil.



Iguaçu National Park (Argentina) was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1984, and Iguacu National Park (Brazil) followed in 1986. Both parks are well-engineered to provide amazing vistas of the many waterfalls while simultaneously protecting the rare Atlantic Rain Forest ecosystems

In 1939 one of the UPU stamps showed a nice view of the falls; SC 462 25 c.



Soapbox By D. Klauber

Your Regional Philatelic Library

In April 2018, The PSC Newsletter editor interviewed Bob Eygenhuysen in order to better understand Southern California's only Philatelic Library. The following article describes this valuable resource.

The San Diego Philatelic Library is an educational and literary endeavor that is operated by the San Diego County Philatelic Council. This not for profit entity was incorporated to serve the collectors of San Diego County. The Library was established to promote and facilitate the pursuit of stamp collecting at all levels. The San Diego Philatelic Library is proud of what has been accomplished by its unpaid Volunteers. The all-volunteer organization has about 28 individuals who provide various services to operate the facility. These folks work to keep the doors open, and draw as many interested parties as possible into the service area. <u>The Library hours vary and are based upon who can take a shift, plus additional hours can be arranged by appointment only.</u>

Many generous philatelists have donated almost everything imaginable to the Library. The Library has a 501(c) status with the Internal Revenue Service as well as California, and as such is a public charity. Donors of gifts, books, catalogs, albums, covers, stamps, etc. to the Library are entitled to a charitable deduction from itemized adjusted gross incomes. Some library donations are re-gifted to youth groups or other kids interested in the hobby. Some may go to John Hotchner's Stamps for the Wounded, in Falls Church Virginia through the Library's oldest volunteer, 99 year old Bob Lackner. But most goes to sale to keep the lights on.

Be sure to watch for SDPL sales on E-bay at the Library's on-line store (see sandiegophilateliclibrary.org. Frequent voice sales are another integral part of the library, and as feasible, the Library holds these auctions at its Poway location. The next Library Auction will be held Saturday October 19th 2019.

One of the most active groups that utilizes the library is the Poway Stamp Club. The Club holds its meetings at 6:30 sharp, the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. But the SDPL is far more than just a library; their knowledgeable volunteers can offer assistance to persons who have "inherited" stamp accumulations, helping them find the value and sale options for their collections. The Library is only one of eight independent library research centers in the United States. Please call to make an appointment to stop by and visit with the volunteers, and take advantage of this very valuable resource.




New Stamps United States Postal Service Stamps

Sept 17, 2019 | Forever 55 cents | Multiple Stamp Design



Sept. 17, Winter Berries. Four (55¢) forever definitive stamps in doublesided pane of 20; winterberry, juniper berry, beautyberry, soapberry; Tulsa, OK. The release of the newest USPS winter offering: Winter Berries Forever. The stamps, which will be sold in panes of twenty, feature four botanical portraits of vibrant winter plants on a spare white background: the winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*), the juniper berry (*Juniperus communis*), the beautyberry (*Callicarpa americana*) and the soapberry (*Sapindus saponaria*). Art director Antonio Alcalá and artist Steve Buchanan designed the set. The stamp dedication ceremony has been scheduled for September 17, 2019 at 11:00 a.m. in Tulsa, Oklahoma, at the Tulsa Botanic Garden. October 4, 2019 | Forever 55cents | Single Stamp Design (pane 20) Purple Heart

The United States Postal Service will issue its newest iteration of the Purple Heart stamp Oct. 4 with a first-day ceremony at the Indypex stamp show. News of the non-denominated (55ϕ) forever stamp was first reported in *Linn's* Aug. 26 issue. The ceremony will take place at the stamp show site, the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds and Exhibition Center, 2003 Pleasant St., Noblesville, Ind.

The stamp design features the medal (with part of its ribbon) that is awarded to U.S. military personnel who have been wounded or killed in action The medal design shows a left-facing profile of Washington within a purple heart framed in gold. Above Washington is a representation of his family crest. The medal is suspended from a purple ribbon bordered in white.

The Purple Heart medal has appeared on U.S. stamps with great regularity since 2003, when a 37ϕ self-adhesive stamp was printed. The most recent variety was issued in October 2015. The 2015 version of the Purple Heart stamp remains on sale at some post offices and from the USPS Stamp Fulfillment Services division.

October 11, 2019 | Forever 55cents | Multiple Stamp Design (pane 20)



SPOOKY SILHOUETTES

The United States Postal Service is turning on the special effects for its 2019 Halloween stamp issue. The non-denominated (55ϕ) Spooky Silhouettes forever stamp set of four will be issued Oct. 11, just in time to mail Halloween greetings. The stamps are being printed by flexography using rainbow foil. A description in the Fall 2019 issue of USA Philatelic, the Postal Service's mail order catalog, adds that "Beneath the ink of each image lies a layer of iridescent pigment."

The four images show spooky scenes captured as silhouettes through Gothic style windows. On the first stamp, an arched window frames a raven on a bare tree branch with a black cat below against a yellow sky background. Two cathedral style windows show wispy ghost figures, one sad and one smiling. Behind them is an orange tint. On the third stamp, a window with heavy curtains reveals a giant spider approaching its web. The background is a deep glowing red. The final stamp depicts another arched window with three flying bats. Black stars are also visible in the deep purple sky.

Important: The Postal Service employees have been directed not to split these panes to sell stamps individually. Only Forty million stamps are being printed and processed by USPS contractor Ashton Potter.

The first-day ceremony for the Spooky Silhouettes stamps will take place at 5 p.m. Friday at Emerson Park Stage, 6 Mount Vernon St., in Milford, N.H., as part of the Oct. 11-13 Milford Pumpkin Festival.
