
Circuit Books and Member Trading Extravaganza!

The Stamp Image on page one is a U.S. 1869 Scott #114 with a G grill. Because of its age this stamp is considered a "Classic" or prior to 1870. The stamp was created as an homage to the completion of the Transcontinental railroad. The stamp was not popular at the time of its creation which makes it more scarce today. This stamp is one of the forerunners of "Commemorative" stamps A mint stamp in good condition typically sells for between \$150-

Sometimes both types of pairs are accidents, but at other times they are planned that way. Denmark, Switzerland and Germany have issued deliberate booklets which contain both.
- 9. Cats delivering Mail? Can you believe that cats were used to deliver the mail? There have been different types of animals used camels, reindeer, horses, dogs, pigeons, but CATS? Well it's true. APS Fun Facts

10. Lunar Stamps? — A stamp was created on the Moon! In 1969 during the Apollo 11 moon flight, the astronauts took with them a die of a postage stamp which they pulled an impression of when they touched down on the moon. Thus, creating the moon's first postage stamp! Once the die was returned to earth it was used to produce the 10 cent airmail stamp issued in September of 1969.

Member Spotlight!

The Poway Stamp Club Newsletter highlights one of its members each issue. Today's spotlight is on JACK WADLINGTON.

Congratulations! On Wednesday August 31, 2019 the members of Poway Stamp Club unanimously voted to approve new membership for JACK WADLINGTON.

Jack is a resident of Scripps Ranch. He collects USA stamps (and will add covers infrequently) "only when the cover can highlight the stamp". Example. A Confederate cover can highlight a Confederate block of stamps by showing how the stamps were utilized.

Jack served two tours as a young lieutenant artillery officer near the famous DMZ (famous KHE SANH area) in Vietnam. And then he continued his patriotic military service as an Army Captain at Fort Sill and along the way married a Navy nurse. He has three grown sons.

Ultimately he used military savvy and deep discipline to keep cool as he transitioned into being an accountant and then a high-pressure grain trader in the civilian world of commodity futures markets. He retired in 1998 but did not sit idle. He has done extensive community volunteer work especially at the Scripps Ranch Library and other local civic organizations. He brings a full resume of significant work, proven intelligence, and overall success to the PSC.

Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms is here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. Examples of "errors" are consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal and typically are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or re-entries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

#695 - 1931 14c American Indian, Dark blue

Inspired by Chief Hollow Horn Bear a native American of the Brule band of Lakota Sioux. The "American Indian" stamp was originally flat plate printed and placed on sale May 1, 1923 as a perforation 11 Scott #565. Later it was rotary printed using a Stickney press as a perforation 11 x 10.5 Scott #695. Between the printings over 200 million copies were produced with approximately 10 percent of those pre-cancelled. Additionally, the Perf. 11 variety is known with two different **Canal Zone Overprints**; those in which the "A's" have flat tops and catalogued as Scott No. 77 (100,000 issued in 1925), and those in which the "A's" have sharp, pointy tops and catalogued as Scott No. 89 (55,700 were issued in 1928). There was also a third rotary press Canal Zone Overprint stamp issued as (Scott 116).

Oddities: The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to <u>defraud the issuing authority</u>. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery: fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer.

Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

For more information on definitions of and values for many EFOs. See the S.R. Dazt book, "Catalogues of Errors on US Postage Stamps."

In 1931, at the time of its printing there was no common solo postal rate for the 14¢ stamp, so the stamp was typically used in conjunction with a 5¢ stamp for the 19¢ registration rate or with a 13¢ stamp for the 27¢ airmail rates. Any unaccompanied usage of the stamp is most likely a result of philately, due to its lack of a solo rate.






The 14¢ stamp was designed by the Clair Huston of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) and is considered by many as one of the finest examples of the engraver's art in U.S. philately. Credit for the origin of the "American Indian" stamp is attributed to De Lancy W. Gill whose portrait of Hollow Horn Bear served as the inspiration for Huston's BEP Model. The Photo shows Hollow Horn Bear in his native dress with headdress and breastplate as part of the Siouan (Sioux) and Brule Tribes. L.S. Schofield and Frank Lamasure were the engravers who turned Huston's artwork into the final stamp dies and plates.

Gill's photographic portrait of Bear was taken on March 8, 1905, just four days after Theodore Roosevelt's presidential inauguration. The Chief was a member of an Indian delegation participating in the inaugural festivities, which set a new attendance record and a lengthy parade that took three and a half hours to pass the reviewing stand. Chief Hollow Horn Bear died in 1913, after he contracted pneumonia while participating in another Presidents (Woodrow Wilson) inaugural parade.³

Plate Flaws of the 14c American Indian Stamp

I recently acquired an upgrade/replacement copy of my stamp #695 for my personal collection. Low and behold as I looked more closely at the specimen, I noticed a blue line on the stamp that started at the bottom of the issue and traveled up and into the vignette frame.

After some research I was pleased that I had found the only plate crack of Scott #695 listed or identified by Loran C French in his book "*Encyclopedia of Plate Varieties*". The definitive reference in the editor's opinion on U.S Bureau-Printed Postage stamps.

First U.S. Pre-cancel?

The stamp which pre-cancel collectors consider the first U.S. pre-cancel is one that appeared and was pre-canceled three years before the U.S. issued its first stamps.

In honor of being the first U.S. pre-cancel belongs to the stamp used in 1844 by the famous Hale Local Post of Boston, Mass. To save time required for canceling, a clerk in the office of the Hale organization seems to have "invented" pre-canceling, by canceling sheets of stamps with his pen before he placed them on the covers turned over to the post for delivery. The pre-cancelation is in the form of a cross formed by horizontal and vertical pen strokes. Of course, the stamp must be on cover to authenticate its status, but if you have one on cover, well you've got something pretty good there.

Philatelic Gossip - 1939

Follow-up on the Aug 28th Editors Corner

The Editor while doing his weekly Philatelic research, came across an interesting and related article in the December 7, 1940 (WFC) Weekly Philatelic Gossip. It proves that collectors should always be on the alert for Fakes and Forgeries. Lets be clear, the forgers have been at it for a very long time and have been increadably successful in creating literally tens of thousands of different forgeries.


The article I found proves the point and was titled "Accused of Faking U.S. and Other Overprints". It disscussed that several individuals had been accused of changing common stamps into some expensive collectors' items by applying fake overprints. It further stated that two men in N. Y. were arrained on charges of having in their possesion, cuts similar to those used in making United States postage stamps. As a result of the overprints the two were charged with faking the value of some stamps at as much as 2600 percent to stamp collectors. The two men when arrested had two copper plates of the London – Orient flight overprint of the philippine Islands and the Hawaii overprints issued by the Government. A search of their homes yielded additional cuts, a printing press, inks and a quantity of common stamps to which the overprints were to have been applied. These dies included overprints of the following (Guam Guard Mail, Kansas, Nebraska, Canal Zone, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Panama and Madrid-Manila air mail varieties). In their offices they had literally thousands of falsly overprinted stamps and according to the authorities and additional 2 printing presses, cuts and ink were also found at their offices. The authorities also confiscated a chase in which a cut wth a Kansas overprint was fastend and ready to print. N.Y. Tribune, Nov 23, 1940

The ingenuity award (The best serial teller of untruths) went to Duane Pryhoda for engineering his own miss-centered rating system and then bestowing his own specimen with the lowest possible rating of (-100). Indeed, a lot of fun was had by all and thanks again to all those who entered and participated in our little Soiree'

New Stamps United States Postal Service Stamps

Aug 29, 2019 | Forever 55 cents | Multiple Stamp Design


Tyrannosaurus rex dominated the tail end of the dinosaur age. A recent surge in discoveries has revolutionized our understanding of the fierce carnivore. Four dynamic designs on a pane of 16 stamps depict the awe-inspiring dinosaur in growth stages from infancy to adulthood. One design illustrates a face-to-face



encounter with a *T. rex* approaching through a forest clearing; another shows the same young adult *T. rex* with a young *Triceratops* — both dinosaurs shown in fossil form. The third and fourth stamps depict a newly hatched *T. rex* covered with downy feathers and a bare-skinned juvenile *T. rex* chasing a primitive mammal.

"The Nation's *T. rex*," the young adult depicted on two of the stamps, was discovered on federal land in Montana and is one of the most studied and important specimens ever found. Its remains are now exhibited at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Natural History in Washington, DC. *The Tyrannosaurus Rex* stamps are being issued as Forever stamps. Forever stamps will always be equal in value to the current First-Class Mail 1-ounce price.




Sept. 12, Walt Whitman. One (85¢) 3-ounce rate forever commemorative stamp; Literary Arts series; AP; Huntington Station, NY 11746; USPS item No. 120304 (pane).

The U.S. Postal Service celebrates the 200th anniversary of the birth of "the Father of American poetry," Walt Whitman, by honoring the poet with a new stamp in its Literary Arts series. Born 200 years ago, poet Walt Whitman was one of the nation's greatest champions. His writing aimed to embody the democratic ethos itself, using poetry to break down the artificial boundaries that separate man and woman, city and countryside, free and enslaved, poet and laborer — and ultimately the self and the universe.

The 1855 publication of "Leaves of Grass" marked the beginning of what would become Whitman's lifelong masterwork. Over the next 40 years, he published several editions of the collection, which grew from 12 untitled pieces to nearly 400 poems. Art director and designer Greg Breeding worked with artist Sam Weber to create this stamp. Additional details will be provided before the ceremony date.

Sept. 17, Winter Berries. Four (55ϕ) forever definitive stamps in double-sided pane of 20; winterberry, juniper berry, beautyberry, soapberry; Tulsa, OK.

The release of the newest USPS winter offering: Winter Berries Forever. The stamps, which will be sold in panes of twenty, feature four botanical portraits of vibrant winter plants on a spare white background: the winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*), the juniper berry (*Juniperus communis*), the beautyberry (*Callicarpa americana*) and the soapberry (*Sapindus saponaria*). Art director Antonio Alcalá and artist Steve Buchanan designed the set.

The stamp dedication ceremony has been scheduled for September 17, 2019 at 11:00 a.m. in Tulsa, Oklahoma, at the Tulsa Botanic Garden.

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
