
Next Meetings (September)

Morris, printed stamps for pre-payment of mail. With no objections, he assumed printing costs by the firm of Rawdon, Wright, and Hatch. 12. Tenebrescence – Is caused by a (Tenebrescent) which is a chemical agent that when added to stamp papers or printers ink causes them to appear darker when viewed under long wave ultra-violet light. This is the opposite of a fluorescent agent that causes paper or inks to glow brighter under long wave ultra-violet light. Example of tenebrescent ink: 2001 34¢ Flag over Farm, water activated gum, plate P2222.

- **14. Ungummed As Issued -** stamps issued without gum, as opposed to stamps from which the gum has been removed. Farley's Follies and Scott issues 3 & 4 were issued without gum. Also commonly known as NGAI (No Gum as Issued).
- **15. Ultraviolet Light -** light beyond the visible spectrum used to detect luminescence. Long wave ultraviolet light is commonly used to detect fluorescent brighteners, while short wave is used to detect phosphor tagging.



- **18. Semi-Postal Stamp Issues** Applies to stamps where part or all of the receipts are given over to some charitable cause, public welfare, or other relief fund. On some of these stamps is mentioned the amount for postage in addition to a surtax for the fund.
- **19. Pneumatic Postage Stamps** Special stamps for enclosure of mail matter in cylinders sent through tubes by compressed air. Usually utilized for local mail with a city limit.
- 20. Stitch Watermark –Not intended as a watermark but caused during the process of making paper by the stitches which join the ends of the wire band covering the dandy roll these appear as a group of short parallel lines running across the stamp.

Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms are here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on Varieties, EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. **Examples of "errors" are** consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal. Typically errors are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, Full incorrect, shifted or omitted color(s), inverted centers or frames, multiple impressions, missing/inverted surcharges, missing or wrong watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, factually wrong or misspelled information etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. **Examples of freaks include ink** smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or partial/random color shifts, preprinting paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or reentries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

Varieties & EFOs Part XXXVI

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The Central American Steamship Co.

The 'local' Central American Steamship Co. issues appeared in 1886 – The 4 issues appeared in 1886 and are quite well known, with no documented used examples in existence. The date "1886" appears at the top of the design, flanked by "U.S." and "MEXICO". The fact of the 5 Cts as part of the design makes the omission of a standard 5 Cts value surprising. They were printed in sheets of 98 (7 x 14), and were perforated 11 (often roughly).

While some stamps have been found with indecipherable Handstamps, only a very few have what could be a genuine postmark. This is a double-lined oval cancellation with the company's name, the date (1886) and in the centre "SAN BLAS". San Blas is a sea-port on Mexico's west coast.

Officially founded in 1768 by Don Manuel Rivera y Cordero, San Blas became the most important Mexican port on the Pacific. It was known for exporting all kind of Mexican products to the Philippines and other oriental countries.

Oddities:

The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit:

Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to <u>defraud the issuing authority</u>. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery:

Fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to <u>defraud the buyer</u>.

Fakes:

An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

Between 1880 and 1890, San Blas became part of political plans to make it a major part of the country's external trade. A suggested rail-link was never built leaving San Blas isolated. The theory runs that the company was formed and the stamps prepared in readiness for the scheme. When it fell through in 1891, the unused stamp remainders came onto the market.

The set consist of 4 basic values - 1c green, 2c red, 10c blue and 50c brown, plus the 1c surcharged "GOOD FOR FIVE CENTS / 5 BUENO POR 5 / CINCO CENTAVOS" in three lines in violet.

The design consists of a central vignette of a dual-funnel steamship, with the words "*CENTRAL AMERICAN STEAMSHIP CO*." above, "NEWSPAPERS 1oz 2 Cts" on the left and "LETTERS ½20z 5 Cts" on the right.

It was reported by the APS, that a Mr. A.W. Denning reported in a letter that as the previous Secretary of the company, that a Mr. Alvarez had purchased all remaining stamps of the C, A. S. Co. He also reported that he could not attest to just when the stamps were issued but that it was sometime in May or June of 1886.

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More Important Definitions

Reissues

(A reprint of a currently available stamp)

Reprints

(Copies of the obsolete originals, or previously issued.
They are sold by the Government they are not classified as proofs and sometimes printed for collector's purposes only)

Special Printings

(Original plate stamps for nonpostal use, while originals are still valid for postage)

Government issued Reproductions

(Not printed from the original plates, not valid postage, considered likenesses.)
Examples US Scott 3-4

Se-tenant Pair

A planned pair, strip or block of adjacent stamps (either horizontal or vertical), which were printed from the same plate and/or sheet. The stamps must be un-separated and deliberately different from each other by design, color, denomination or overprint.

Type-Variety/Combination

Pair – An unplanned pair, strip or block of adjacent stamps (either horizontal or vertical). The stamps must be unsevered and are different from each other by variety, meaning that at least one member of the pair/strip/block differs in some detail from the "normal" issue. The detail may or may not be an actual philatelic "error".

The original plan was to print four denominations of 1, 2, 10 and 50 cents. Unfortunately a one cent mailing rate did not exist, so in order to remedy the situation most of the 1 cent issues were then hand stamped with a five-cent value in violet. Mr. Denning believed that it was possible that a few of the stamps may have been used by the company's officers. He did not report how many of each value were printed but that twice as many low values were printed as the higher values as a proportion. It was stated that the stamps were printed by a printer in Boston and the plate delivered with the first order. The plate "stone" was later sold to a printer in Mexico when the company was dissolved. Any stamps that may have been used would have only been used on the Company Steamers and so Franked.

This attestation of a C. A. S. S, Co. officer would seem tp authenticate their corporate existence and makes the Editor wonder why they are not listed in any philatelic documents as local or Cinderella issues

Again, Varieties & EFO's make an exciting and educational addition to any stamp collection for they speak to us about how stamps are produced and how mistakes can be made during their production.



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Masters of American Photography 2002


The first day ceremonies for the Masters of American Photography took place in San Diego, June 13, 2002. Twenty famous American photographers were honored in this special sheet.

I was fortunate to attend the ceremonies and had a conversation with one of the invited guests, Sarah Adams, the granddaughter of Ansel Adams. She very nicely signed my program sheet and I tucked away the souvenir into a box which ended somewhere in one of the closets in our home.

Nineteen years later on a recent trip to Mammoth I was involved with visiting a local photographer who was finishing a picture of a group of us being photographed on top of Mammoth mountain. It so happened that he had worked for Sarah many years back and our conversation brought back many pleasant memories. With this in mind, when I returned home a week ago, I looked for the United States Postal Service program and the sheet of distinguished American Photographers somewhere encased in some remote part of the house. Fortunately I was able to locate the items and thus this article emerged.



First Days and Last Days

Although the collecting of covers began shortly after the first stamps were issued, early catalogs and advertising didn't make much mention of them. There certainly wasn't any special consideration given to the first day of issue. Often, with many stamps there was no official first day of sale. The stamps just sort of trickled out of the post offices. All that changed with the Columbian Exhibition held in Chicago in 1893. For the first time stamps were issued to commemorate a special event. The Burger brothers, two imaginative New York City stamps dealers thought it might be nice to have a set of the stamps on cover post marked on the first day of sale. How many covers they mailed and how many of the different denominations of Columbian Exposition stamps were affixed to those covers is unknown. Only two have survived. One cover has five stamps (one through five cents) and another has one stamp (the ten cent). These covers were postmarked January 1, 1893. Here is where things get interesting.

Congress passed a law in 1810 requiring post offices to be open on Sundays for at least one hour. The law remained in effect until 1912. Most posts offices were one man or woman operations and stayed open on Sundays only long enough to satisfy the law. Post offices in major cities, such as New York had more flexibility. The Columbian Exposition stamps went on sale January 1, 1893. This was however a Sunday and it was the day the Burger brothers bought their stamps and used them on mail which they addressed to themselves. Because the post officers weren't open and conducting business as normal, the Philatelic world has decided that the Columbian Exposition stamps have two first days, January 1, 1893 and January 2, 1893. The Burger covers are the only known Columbian covers postmarked on January 1. Two or three covers exist which were postmarked on December 31, 1892.

It appears several stamps were sold either through error or connivance before the official date. Below is an example of a two cent Columbian postmarked early on January 2, 1893.

The Columbian Exposition did not open until May 1, 1893 and closed October 31, 1893. Covers mailed from the Exposition on the opening and closing days of the fair and bearing the exposition Post Office cancellation are particularly prized. Below is an example of a last day of the fair mailing

FDC collecting over the next few years was hit and miss with most efforts directed at commemorative stamps. All this changed in 1926 when stamp dealer and publisher George Linn placed a textual cachet on a batch of the President Harding memorial stamps. Since then both amateur makers and commercial publishers have made and sold cached envelopes for use as first days covers. Some of these are works of art and covers by certain makers have become highly desirable. Post office departments of various countries, recognizing the potential financial gain from increased sales derived from first day covers began making it easier for mailers to create first day covers.

Eventually, starting around the 1970's, government posts offices began to issue their own first day cover products. One expansion to cover collecting was made by the addition of last day covers. Below is a last day cover produced by the Hong Kong authorities for the last day of issue and sales of the 1987 Hong Kong definitive series.

The 2021 stamp program commemorates Missouri statehood, Japanese Americans who fought in World War II and Chien-Shiung Wu, one of the most influential American nuclear physicists of the 20th century. Fun issuances include Western Wear, Backyard Games, Espresso Drinks, a stamp showcasing a visual riddle, and four Message Monster stamps with self-adhesive accessories. word "HAPPY" is inspired by a different party decoration in the midst of a flurry of multicolored ribbons and confetti.
