

Member Spotlight!

The Poway Stamp Club Newsletter highlights one of its members each issue. Today's spotlight is on

Jerry Tronier.

Have you ever experienced the thrill of finding an exceedingly valuable stamp that ultimately results in disappointment? JERRY TRONIER bought a large box of stamps from "Debbie" a non-collector (swap-meet acquaintance). It was a fair price thought Jerry as he sorted the contents. At bottom of the box he found JAPAN AIRMAIL SOUVENIR SHEETS in 20 pristine post-office-fresh packs of 100. Scott Catalog value of each sheet was \$1,250! Total value was over \$1,000,000! "EUREKA! I'M RICH!!!"

The sheets were fakes...good solid looking fakes but imperfinated of perforated like the real sheets. The well-known fakes, printed in Germany, had zero value.

Today Jerry laughs easily and marches on undaunted with his world wide stamp collection. He likes real USA plate blocks, precancels, and perfins. He has been collecting for almost 50 years.

Ask Jerry about his father and his colorful French family history of stamp collecting.

Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms are here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on Varieties, EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. **Examples of "errors" are** consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal. Typically errors are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, Full incorrect, shifted or omitted color(s), inverted centers or frames, multiple impressions, missing/inverted surcharges, missing or wrong watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, factually wrong or misspelled information etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. **Examples of freaks include ink** smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or partial/random color shifts, preprinting paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or reentries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.



Varieties & EFOs Part XXII

Cape Lookout dropped issues 3788a single/3791b sheet

On June 13, 2003 the American Packaging Corporation for Sennett Security Products on behalf of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) released the 37c multicolor photogravure Southeastern Lighthouses issue at Tybee Island, Georgia.

Oddities: The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to defraud the issuing authority. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery: Fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer.

Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

This strip of five commemorative stamps picture the historic beacons from America's Southeast.

The pane of 20 commemorative issues includes a strip of five 37c stamps, serpentine Die Cut 10.75 x 10.25, including the lighthouses images of Old Cape Henry, Va. (Scott 3787); Cape Lookout, N.C. (two varieties: normal "37USA," 3788; dropped "37USA," 3788a); Morris Island, S.C. (3789); Tybee Island, Ga. (3790); and Hillsboro Inlet, Fla. (3791).

Lighthouse Varieties & EFOs

The lighthouse sheet has an interesting error located on the stamp in position 2 of the pane of 20, the text "37 USA" is placed lower than on the other Cape Lookout Lighthouse stamps in the pane. The variety is Scott Dropped 3788a. Technically the error is considered white shifted and is listed in Scott's as 3788a, Cape Lookout. The error is found only in the first row of the pane.





The other four rows have the stamp printed correctly. Scott's values the error stamp at \$4.00, a 363% premium over the normal issue, but also values the pane at \$37.00! This is pretty good considering that most of the panes from this period are valued between 15–20 dollars. The stamp is not considered extremely rare but is officially listed as an error in Scott under the definition of "a stamp that has some major, consistent, unintentional deviation from the normal."

The Cape Lookout Brick Lighthouse, was built in 1859 it is 163feet high and located on the Southern Outer Banks of North Carolina. It flashes every 15 seconds and is visible at least 12 miles out to sea and up to 19 miles. It is one of the very few lighthouses that operate during the day. The Lighthouse today is the second to stand at this location. The first was built in 1812 at 96 feet and proved to be too short to protect ships from the treacherous Lookout Shoals. In 1862 during the Civil War, Confederate troops tried to destroy the Cape Lookout Lighthouse. The lens was damaged, but later repaired. The Cape Lookout Lighthouse was painted in 1873 with the recognizable black-and-white, diagonally checkered pattern that still identifies it today. The Cape Lookout Lighthouse is the only such structure in the United States to bear the checkered day-mark, intended not only for differentiation between similar light towers, but also to show direction. The center of the black diamonds point north-south and the white diamonds point east-west.

3-D Lighthouse Images - This set of Lighthouse stamps also has a little known feature that many philatelists are not aware, that hidden 3-D images can be seen on these stamps when viewed with a special lens.



USPS Stamp Decoder Lens

The Stamp decoder is an optical lens manufactured for reading hidden images and symbols on selected US Stamp issues. Each decoder lens comprises thousands of tiny elongated lenses called lenticels. On most of the stamps issues, the decoder needs to be placed horizontally (with the printed wording on the decoder facing up) to view the images while other stamps may require turning the decoder to a 15 degree angle to view them.

The US Postal Service produced some stamps with a hidden image from the years 1997 to 2004. These hidden images and messages could only be viewed through a special device called the "Stamp Decoder".




Hidden "1859" 3-D image

Picture Post Cards —o**** Julian

Julian is one of the gems of San Diego. The town was founded in 1870, and named after Mike Julian, the mining recorder of the gold camp that had recently been set up. The post office opened August 8, 1870, and has been with us ever since.

By the turn of the century the gold ore was waning, but due to the climate and soil conditions, deciduous fruit blossomed. Julian became the apple growing center of the county. Today, Julian apple pie is a state treasure, and the community in the eastern foothills of our county hosts many local events, and is a mecca for tourists and locals alike.

a. This post card shows the Victorian style one room Santa Ysabel School originally built at Witch Creek in 1888. The building was moved to Julian in 1971 and used as the Julian branch of the county library. Today the building houses the Julian Historical Society.

b. The cover depicted with the California poppies and "The Land of Sunshine" was postmarked in Julian in 1941. I have seen this specific cachet on a number of covers posted in California. If the readers have examples, please sent me copies, or the originals if you prefer.

c. The second cover is part of a series of covers celebrating the Butterfield Overland Mail centenary, 1858-1958. The celebration began from St. Louis/Tipton, and finally arrived in San Francisco. Due to The Civil War, the original route ended in 1861.

Bugs Bunny 80th Anniversary 10 Forever StampsJuly 27 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20

Bugs Bunny has been known for his impeccable impersonations and his masterful masquerades, so the soon-to-be-revealed 10 designs on this pane of 20 stamps each showcase a costumed Bugs Bunny in some of his most memorable getups. The original stamp artwork is based on Bugs Bunny's iconic moments and was created especially for this issuance by Warner Bros. Entertainment Inc., featuring work from Warner Bros. Animation artists. They also have created sketches on the reverse side of the stamp pane.

Thank You Forever Stamps

Aug 21 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20



Two simple words can mean so much. Say "Thank you" in style with four new stamps. Highlighted in gold foil ar the words: Thank you" in cursive script and an elegant floral design that swirls through and around the word Dan Tanamachi the stamp designer and lettering artist, drew the original sketches for the calligraphy by hand and then created the final art digitally.

19th Amendment: Women Vote 10 Forever Stamps Aug 22 | Virtual Ceremony | PSA pane of 20



Inspired by historic photographs, the stamp art features a stylized illustration of suffragists marching in a parade or other public demonstration. The clothes they wear and the banners they bear display the official colors of the Nationals Woman's Party (NWP) Purple, white and Gold.

The 19th Amendment Women Vote stamps are being issued as Forever stamps and will always be equal in value to the current First-Clas Male one-ounce price.
