(February 17 - April 4, 2021)

Mt. Pleasant recognize Sundays as a day of Celebration

Adapted from Alfred Street Baptist Church "At the Cross" 2021 Lent Meditations

Disclaimer: Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church strongly encourages individuals with health concerns to consult their physician prior to beginning a fast. This is especially important if you take prescription medications or have a chronic condition. Some people should never fast without professional supervision.

BEFORE THE FAST (BODY & SPIRIT)

Physical & Basic Preparation: (Consult your physician. Use wisdom)

- Begin to reduce your food portions prior to the fast.
- Flush the body by drinking plenty of water.
- Begin to eliminate caffeinated and sweet beverages.
- Be strategic. Plan your meal ahead of time. Preparation is Key.
- Before the fast, remove temptations (snacks, candy, sodas, etc.) that will distract you during the fast. Begin limiting fast foods.

Spiritual Preparation:

- Read and meditate on Psalm 51 daily.
- Reduce distractions and designate your quiet time and place to be with the Lord.
- Schedule time for reading the word each day.

SUGGESTIONS DURING THE FAST

- Get A Journal of Renewed Strength: Get a journal/notebook. Write down what your prayer requests and answers. Journal what the Lord says to you. (Psalm 77:11-12, Deu. 17:18, Deu. 6:4-7, 2 Timothy 1:5). HONOR THE LORD AND HIS PURPOSE FOR YOU!
- Be Accountable: Pair with a person or persons. Pray, share, and commit to the Fast with each other. (Matthew 18:20, Ecclesiastes 4:9-10, Psalm 133:1-3)
- Pray in Silence & Solitude Spend some time in silence and solitude (noise-free) to allow God to speak to you. It is important to **limit** social networking, texting, tweeting, and unnecessary cell phone use. Also **limit** secular television/radio. (Matthew 4:1, Matthew 14:23, Mark 1:35, Luke 4:42, Psalm 46:10)

SUGGESTIONS AFTER THE FAST

• Gradually return to implementing meats into your diet. Be careful. Continue to drink plenty of water. Begin with eating soups. Continue to eat healthy

February 17 - March 6, 2021

SCRIPTURE/PRAYER FOCUS: See Devotional Scriptures AND also pray for spiritual, emotional and physical healing; breaking of strongholds, bad habits and deliverance from evil.

- Eliminate sugar, sweets, caffeine, and snack foods (candy, cake, chips, coffee, soda, etc.)
- Eat fruit and vegetables during the Fast.
- Drink plenty of water and 100% juice

March 7 - March 27, 2021

SCRIPTURE FOCUS: See Devotional Scriptures AND also pray for provision, protection, direction and unity; God's will and plan for Mt. Pleasant and for our individual lives; obedience and wisdom for the journey; our nation, leaders (spiritual and world), and finances; that the great grace of God will be upon us all.

- Eliminate sugar, sweets, caffeine, and snack foods (candy, cake, chips, coffee, soda, etc.)
- Eliminate bread, pasta and rice.
- Limit meat intake to 1 serving of chicken, turkey or fish per day
- Eat fruit and vegetables during the Fast.
- Drink plenty of water and 100% juice

March 28-April 4, 2021

SCRIPTURE FOCUS: See Devotional Scriptures AND pray for increased faith, revival in the church and land; missions and evangelism. Pray for unsaved loved ones (opportunity to accept Christ) People will sincerely desire to commit their lives to Christ. Hunger and thirst for holiness. Identification with the Sacrifice, Suffering, and Resurrection of Christ. Pray for a desire for the word of God and the demonstration of miracles, signs and the wonders of God! Declare God's greatness

in the entire earth/

***THE REMAINING OF THE FAST WILL CONSIST OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES ONLY. (Please see in the suggested list of vegetables and fruits)

- Eliminate sugar, sweets, caffeine, and snack foods (candy, cake, chips, coffee, soda, etc.)
- Eliminate bread, pasta and rice.
- Eliminate All Meats
- Eat fruit and vegetables during the Fast.
- Drink plenty of water and 100% juice
- Pray for Great Power!!!

There are 47 days from February 17th to April 4th Easter Sunday. Mt. Pleasant does not fast on Sundays.

HERE IS A LIST OF FOOD ITEMS THAT CAN BE INCLUDED IN THIS FAST.

- All fruits. These can be fresh, frozen, dried, juiced or canned. Fruits include but are not limited to apples, apricots, bananas, blackberries, blueberries, boysenberries, cantaloupe, cherries, cranberries, figs, grapefruit, grapes, guava, honeydew melon, kiwi, lemons, limes, mangoes, nectarines, oranges, papayas, peaches, pears, pineapples, plums, prunes, raisins, raspberries, strawberries, tangelos, tangerines, watermelon
- All vegetables. These can be fresh, frozen, dried, juiced or canned. Vegetables include but are not limited to artichokes, asparagus, beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chili peppers, collard greens, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, garlic, ginger root, kale, leeks, lettuce, mushrooms, mustard greens, okra, onions, parsley, potatoes, radishes, rutabagas, scallions, spinach, sprouts, squashes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, turnips, watercress, yams, zucchini, veggie burgers are an option if you are not allergic to soy.
- All whole grains, including but not limited to whole wheat, brown rice, millet, quinoa, oats, barley, grits, whole wheat pasta, whole wheat tortillas, rice cakes and popcorn.
- All nuts and seeds, including but not limited to sunflower seeds, cashews, peanuts, sesame. Also nut butters including peanut butter.
- *All legumes*. These can be canned or dried. Legumes include but are not limited to dried beans, pinto beans, split peas, lentils, black eyed peas, kidney beans, black beans, cannellini beans, white beans.
- All quality oils including but not limited to olive, canola, grape seed, peanut, and sesame.
- Beverages: spring water, distilled water or other pure waters. Soy milk, almond milk, unsweetened tea, black coffee

What is the Season of Lent?

Lent was first celebrated during the fourth century and began with only a few days before Easter. The early church would baptize converts to Christianity—all those who believed in the name of the Lord—on Easter Sunday only. With time, Lent was extended to several weeks. The 40 days were symbolic of Jesus' preparation and temptation by Satan in the wilderness after His baptism and before the beginning of His ministry. It was a time of purification and separation.

Lent became known as the 40-day period before Easter and begins on Ash Wednesday. Sundays are not counted in the 40 days because the day commemorates the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Since early biblical times, ashes have been symbolic of repentance (turning away from sin and turning to God) or of grief in mourning. The ashes were used to make a sign of the cross on the forehead of believers from the charred remains of the palm branches used on Palm Sunday the year before. This extended period of 40 days became a time of prayer and fasting as well as a time of self-examination and inner reflection for the purpose of repentance.

As we celebrate Lent, we should remember that what we give up for a short period of time cannot prepare us for how God expects us to live our lives daily in relationship with Him. Perhaps that is why after the Reformation, the discipline of fasting became unpopular. Yet, there were those church fathers and leaders who still wanted to preserve Lent as a time of self-sacrifice; thus, people were encouraged to give up something they enjoyed during Lent.

We suggest during this season of Lent to forget about giving up trivial things. Instead, take on a newfound attitude to live in accordance with God's Word. No amount of fasting, abstaining from physical pleasures or any other form of self-denial can purify us. Our cleansing can only come from the atoning blood of Jesus who sacrificed His life for our many sins.

Get to know Jesus intimately for yourself during this sacred time. Use these meditations—written by the board members of the Christian Life Institute and ministers and members of Alfred Street Baptist Church—to help guide you as you reflect on Christ's great sacrifice and how it impacts your life today. Let the Holy Spirit convert your mind daily and lead you to do and think the things that are pleasing in His sight. Pray, repent and let God work in you and to do His good pleasure.

GLORY WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 2021 Transformed

READ: 2 Corinthians 3:12–18

KEY VERSE: But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are

being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit

of the Lord. - 2 Corinthians 3:18b (NKJV)

After daily looking into the bathroom mirror for over five decades, I have seen myself change from one level of maturity to another. Similarly, the person of Jesus is a mirror in which the Lord's glory is brilliantly mirrored, and it is into this the new life bestowed in Him that those who see with eyes of faith "are transformed."

In 2 Corinthians 3:18, Paul depicts the life of faith as being changed into the image of Christ and as moving from one degree of glory to another. He characterizes the Christian life as one of growth and improvement.

We are all works in progress. Through the intimacy of our relationship with Christ, we are daily transformed from the inside out. The season of Lent is a great time for self-examination and self-correction of our faith walk. Keep your eyes focused on the Lord and observe how amazingly He blesses you!

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Lent is the period of the liturgical year from Ash Wednesday to Easter in the Christian tradition. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer—through prayer, repentance, almsgiving and self-denial—for the annual commemoration of the death and resurrection of Jesus during Holy Week, which recalls the events linked to the Passion of Christ. There are traditionally 40 days in Lent. The six Sundays in this period are not counted because each one represents a "mini-Easter," a celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death.

ASh Wednesday is the first day of Lent and occurs 46 days before Easter. Ash Wednesday dates may differ each year because it is dependent on the date of Easter. Ash Wednesday derives its name from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of adherents as a sign of mourning and repentance to God.

Paim Sunday is the Sunday before Easter. It commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, and in many Christian churches Palm Sunday is marked by the distribution of palm leaves.

Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Easter that commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ with the apostles. The significance is derived from the Latin mandatum (A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you), the statement Jesus made in John 13:34 by which He explained to the apostles the significance of His action of washing their feet.

GOOD Friday ("good" meaning pious or holy) is the Friday of Holy Week, observed primarily by Christians commemorating the crucifixion of Jesus Christ and His death at Calvary.

HOLY Saturday is the day before Easter and the last day of Holy Week in which Christians prepare for Easter. It commemorates the day that Jesus Christ's body lay in the tomb.

Triduum (TRID-uh-wum) is the period of three days that begins the evening of Maundy Thursday and ends the evening of Easter Sunday. It recalls the passion, burial and resurrection of Jesus.
