





MONO LAKE CALIFORNIA

Nevada in Mono County California. Sagebrush, Jeffrey pines, volcanoes, tufa towers and brine shrimp are some of the colorful forms found here. This is a highly alkaline lake and is considered to be one of the most extreme aquatic environments in the world.

CONSERVATION EFFORTS Mono Lake is recognized by the Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network as a vital place for nearly 2,000,000 migrating shorebirds to rest and eat. California gulls also nest here. 


