PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE, Spring 2016

This year, two prominent Slovene scholars will be working at the Ohio State University under the auspices of the Slovene Research Initiative: Dr. Drago Kunei, head of the Institute of Musicology at ZRC/SAZU is currently there doing research on old recordings of Slovene folk music made by immigrants in Ohio; and Dr. Željko Oset of the University of Nova Gorica will come in August to study the connections between Slovene scholars and their counterparts in the Soviet Bloc after WW II. (Because OSU is receiving two Slovene scholars this year, none will come on the SRI in 2017.) Meanwhile, Mary-Allen Johnson of OSU will be going to conduct research in Slovenia again this summer with the help of the Initiative. I am also pleased to report that also this summer, Dr. Brian Baer of Kent State U. will be the first non-OSU Society member to be supported by the SRI in Slovenia: he will be pursuing a project in translation studies at a workshop in Piran.

In other SRI-related developments, **Eileen Kunkler** of the Center for Slavic & East European Studies at Ohio State has set up a very handsome webpage for the Initiative at https://slaviccenter.osu.edu/about/slovene-

<u>research-initiative</u>. Be sure to bookmark this address and check regularly for Slovene-related events at OSU! Finally, the CSEES and SSS also have established a working relationship between the SRI and the cultural attaché at the Slovene embassy in Washington: we hope this will eventually lead to visiting Slovene artists and scholars making presentations at the university under the auspices of the Slovene Research Initiative.

This spring the Executive Council voted to use money from the Velikonja Fund to enable three worthy graduate students (Olivia Hellewell, Kristina Reardon and Kaitlyn Tucker) to take Michael Biggins's distance seminar at the U. of Washington on Slovene to English literary translation. We are so fortunate to have funds available to put to such good use! Thanks again to our late colleague Jože Velikonja for his generosity.

As always, see below for information about SSSrelated events at the ASEEES convention in November. Especially note the Society-sponsored panel "The Detritus of Occupation: American Gottscheers and the Memories of WWII in Slovenia," which will feature Žarko Lazarević and Gregor Kranjc of the SSS and Oto Luthar, director of ZRC/SAZU; and the roundtable "Slovenian Foreign Policy after 25 Years: Past Accomplishments and Future Challenges," in which SSS members Carole Rogel, Peter Rožič, Charles Bukowski, and James Gow will participate.

Seattle: Slovenian Prime Minister; Michael Biggins Teaching Slovene

While in Seattle heading a Slovene trade delegation last December, Prime Minister of the Republic of Slovenia Miro Cerar met with University of Washington President Ana Mari Cauce on the UW campus to express interest in sustained collaboration between UW and academic institutions in Slovenia. This spring quarter (April–June 2016) the University of Washington has also been offering a 3-credit course on Slovene to English literary translation, taught by Prof. Michael Biggins. In addition to graduate students at UW, students elsewhere around the world – on the U.S. East Coast and in Europe – have enrolled in the course and participate in twice-weekly class sessions via live audio-visual link.

In autumn 2016, we will start up UW's 5-quarter accelerated Slovene language sequence again, beginning with SLVN 401 (elementary Slovene 1, autumn 2016) and culminating in SLVN 406 (intermediate Slovene 2, autumn 2017) and SLVN 499 (advanced Slovene, winter 2018). IN MEMORIAM RUDOLPH MATT SUSEL (1940–2016)

Dr. Rudolph (Matt) Susel, one of the founding members of the Society for Slovene Studies, recently died in Cleveland. Dr. Susel served on the society's first executive council, 1973-75, while he was an assistant professor of history at Arizona State University. He had previously been a research associate at the University of Minnesota's Immigration History Research Center. Between 1979 and 2008, Dr. Susel edited the Slovene-language pages of the newspaper Ameriška domovina in Cleveland. He also edited the Slovene pages of the American Mutual Life Association's (AMLA) Our Voice. Dr. Susel was a member and leader of many Slovene-American organizations, including the Slovenian-American Heritage Foundation (Cleveland) and United Americans for Slovenia, an AMLA affiliate that lobbied for Slovene independence.

Dr. Susel contributed a great deal to the Society for Slovene Studies (SSS) over the course of four decades: as a regular participant in annual SSS scholarly meetings and Midwest Slavic reader Conference meetings. of journal submissions and contributor to the journal, and editor of the third issue of Papers in Slovene Studies (1977, with assistance from Toussaint Hocevar and Carole Rogel). He was a regular and reliable advisor to Slovene Studies editors and SSS officers. Dr. Susel wrote detailed summaries of the society's annual meetings for Ameriška domovina. He welcomed many visitors from Slovenia to Cleveland. Perhaps no one could better introduce them the history, to accomplishments, and challenges of the Slovene-American community there.

IN MEMORIAM ALEŠ DEBELJAK (1961– 2016)

Longtime SSS member Ales Debeljak died of injuries incurred in a traffic accident in Slovenia on January 28. He was 54. Aleš joined the Society during his first extended period of residence in the U.S., while pursuing graduate studies in sociology at the University of Syracuse. At the time he was a frequent participant in Society conferences and panels. After completing his American Ph.D. he returned to Slovenia to embark on a productive career in academia studying and teaching the sociology of culture. One the most influential Slovene poets and essayists of his generation, in America he cultivated contacts with colleagues in a wide range of spheres-academic, political and literary-helping to build momentum for wider trans-Atlantic collaborations between Slovenia and the U.S. that carried through the 1990s and 2000s. Dr. Debeljak's colleagues in the Society and throughout North America mourn the loss of energetic, forward-thinking this and gifted colleague and friend.

IN MEMORIAM CHARLES EDWARD GRIBBLE (1936–2016)

Longtime SSS member Charles Edward Gribble (1936–2016), professor emeritus of Slavic and East European Languages and Literatures, died on

3 June 2016. He contributed to the field of South Slavic linguistics for nearly sixty years, thirty-five of which he spent at Ohio State University. He studied under Roman Jakobson at Harvard and V. A. Zvegintsev at Moscow State University. At Ohio State, he taught the Structure and History of Russian, Old Church Slavonic, South Slavic Linguistics, South Slavic Cultures, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, Bulgarian, Czech, and other subjects. He was the author of numerous publications, including Monastic Traditions: Selected Proceedings of the Fourth International Hilandar Conference (with Predrag Matejić 2003). In recognition of his scholarship, Dr. Gribble was presented with a festschrift on the occasion of his seventieth birthday, Studia Caroliensia: Papers in Linguistics and Folklore in Honor of Charles E. Gribble (edited by Robert A. Rothstein, Ernest Scatton, and Charles E. Townsend, 2006). In 1996, he founded Slavica Publishers to promote high-quality textbooks and literature, monographs on folklore, and linguistics. During his thirty-year editorship, Slavica grew to become the largest venue for Slavistic publications in the Western Hemisphere. He received several honors from Bulgarian institutions and, in 2006, the Marin Drinov Medal, the highest honor given by the Bulgarian Academy of Sciences. In the course of his long career, Dr. Gribble supported and encouraged colleagues with interest in Slovene studies. SSS members remain very grateful for his help.
