It is very gratifying to be able to report on the first fruits of the Slovene Research Initiative. This summer, two scholars from the Ohio State University received assistance to travel to Ljubljana for research and consultations, and Dr.

Luka Vidmar (ZRC/SAZU) was able to explore the resources at the OSU Rare Books & Manuscripts Library; he also gave a lecture on forbidden books in Central Europe on May 6. Finally, Gregor Kranjc presented the SRI inaugural lecture at Ohio State on October 1. His talk, "The Lessons and Legacies of World War II Slovene Collaboration" was well received by a large and enthusiastic audience; it was followed by the opening reception of the Center for Slavic and East European Studies (see photos p.7). On behalf of the Society, I would like to thank the director of the CSEES, Dr. Yana Hashamova, as well as Assistant Director Eileen Kunkler and Office Coordinator Maryann Walther-Keisel for all their efforts to make this event a success. The Slovene Research Initiative will again top the agenda of the SSS business meeting, as we explore ways to build on this auspicious beginning. Dr. Hashamova will be present for part of the meeting to answer questions, and Dr. Oto Luthar, director of ZRC/SAZU, also plans to discuss the SRI from the Slovene perspective. 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**OTHER ASSOCIATIONS’ SCHOLARSHIPS**

**Slovene Studies, University of Washington**

In June 2014 the Slovene studies program at the University of Washington in Seattle completed its fifth continuous academic year of teaching Slovene language and literature at the graduate and undergraduate levels. This year’s course offerings included Slovene language and a survey of 20<sup>th</sup>-century Slovene literature that, in addition to UW students, included one distance-learning student. In spring we graduated an advanced Slovene class of four students, each specializing in a different aspect of Slovene studies, whether comparative folklore, literature, art history, or international relations. Two of this year’s UW students attended summer intensive Slovene language courses at the University of Ljubljana.

Our program's close collaboration with *Slovenska miza*, a Seattle area Slovene American cultural society, provided our students with numerous opportunities to speak Slovene with native speakers at informal social gatherings, holiday events, and weekly Slovene language tables.

UW's goal in offering Slovene studies is to help educate the next generation of North American Slovenists, mainly by introducing talented graduate students in various disciplines to Slovene culture, beginning with the language. The resulting high-level engagement of young American scholars with Slovene studies is already providing crosscurrents of fresh intellectual perspective and leading to exciting new discoveries that benefit the scholarly and wider communities.

UW's Slovene studies program currently runs entirely on unpaid, volunteer effort. To make this program thrive now and long after our current volunteers are gone, we are raising funds to create modest endowments that will provide permanent support for:

- 1) Summer intensive language study in Slovenia by UW students
- 2) An excellent research library of Slovene books, journals, and other information resources that will serve not just UW, but all of North America
- 3) UW's existing exchange of faculty with the University of Ljubljana, which in the 40 years of its existence has involved over 100 UW and U. of Ljubljana scholars
- 4) Half of the full-time salary of a lecturer in Slovene studies (to be joined with matching support from the Center for Slovene as a Foreign Language, which will provide the lecturer)
- 5) Graduate student fellowships
- 6) Funds for hosting distinguished visiting lecturers and guest speakers in Slovene studies.

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### **SUA 2015 scholarships**

In order to reach a greater number of college students of Slovene heritage, Slovenian Women's Union Scholarship Foundation officers and trustees are making a change in scholarship application requirements. No longer will a three-year membership in the Slovenian Union of America (SUA) be required, but a one-year adult membership. Payment prior to 31 January 2015 will be necessary.

During 2015 a number of \$2,000 and \$1,000 scholarships will be offered to high school students who will be attending accredited college classes full time. Scholarships will also be available to those students already in college. \$500.00 Continuing Education Scholarships will be offered to those adults returning to a technical school or college part time in order to update a current occupation or to enter a new career. The Graduate Student Scholarship will no longer be available.

A student of Slovenian descent (whatever percentage), may apply for a SWU Scholarship once they have become a member of SUA. The three-year membership requirement as part of the scholarship application criteria is being waived.

## MEMBERS NEWS

### In Memoriam Helga Glušič (1934–2014)

SSS member Helga Glušič passed away on 3 October 2014. She was a distinguished professor emerita in the University of Ljubljana's Department of Slovene at the Filozofska fakulteta. Dr. Glušič spent two academic years in the U.S.: She was a Fulbright lecturer for Slovene, Serbian, and Croatian at the University of Kansas in 1985–86; and a visiting professor at Indiana University in 1986–87. From 1978 to 1984 she headed the Commission for the Advancement of Slovene at Foreign Universities, caring for the lecturerships in Slovene throughout the world. In 1995, she delivered a series of lectures in Argentina at the invitation of Slovene émigré organizations. Her chief research areas were the contemporary Slovene novel, the writer Ciril Kosmač, and Slovene émigré literature. Dr. Glušič edited the Celje Mohorjeva družba's anthology of émigré literature, 1945–91, entitled *Slovenska izseljenska književnost*; she contributed to the three-volume work on émigré literature, *Slovenska izseljenska književnost* (1999). Helga Glušič will be remembered as a sensitive and judicious colleague full of warmth for others.

Recently incorporated as a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit, ASEF promotes the educational exchange between the United States and Slovenia. Its inaugural meeting and gala was held in San Francisco in February 2014.

The group has already awarded its first two fellowships to visiting scholars, Marinka Žitnik and Niko Colnerič. Both PhD candidates from the University of Ljubljana worked with Dr. Jure Leskovec at Stanford during the summer.

The highlight of the meeting came as Ambassador Božo Cerar presented a painting donated, through the ceaseless efforts of Tanya Vajk, by internationally renown artist Miro Zupančič to the group's newly initiated fundraiser auction. Lee Peterlin and Tom Brandt will spearhead the effort, planned as part of the 2015 ASEF Gala to be held on January 25. ASEF board members look forward to welcoming all fellow supporters of American Slovenian educational exchange at this 2<sup>nd</sup> annual event.

At the elegant Embassy reception for ASEF, the Slovenian Union of America's Bernardka K. Fitzsimmons expressed the support of their group for the new effort, to the great appreciation of the ASEF board. Executive board members Jure Leskovec, Peter Rožič, S.J., and Advisory Board Co-Chair Mark Vlastic reported on their private meeting with Slovenian President Boris Pahor at the Bled Strategic Forum, as well as other efforts to organize lectures in conjunction with the Universities in Slovenia. ASEF also held its inaugural Fuisz Lecture in Ljubljana.

## OF INTEREST TO SSS MEMBERS

### Društvo v tujini izobraženih Slovencev – VTIS

Association of Slovenes Educated Abroad was founded in December 2013 at the premises of the Slovenian Academy of Sciences and Arts under the honorary sponsorship of the President of the Republic of Slovenia. VTIS serves as a platform for Slovenian citizens who were or are currently studying, researching or lecturing at academic institutions outside of Slovenia and aims to promote mutual cooperation between Slovenian experts. There are two events currently planned for the USA: an event in the fall of 2014 in New York City and another event in the spring of 2015 on the West Coast. The purpose of these events will be to enable young Slovenian scholars to present their work to the wider public as well as to provide a platform for networking between Slovenian experts based in the USA. 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### Slovenian Digital Humanities Landscape

Quick progress of digitally enabled research did not go round Slovenian humanities community. Digitally mature researchers and members of various memory institutions helped to build a resourceful network in different fields of Humanities. One of the most useful platforms for all researchers is definitely the Digital Library of the National and University Library ([www.dlib.si](http://www.dlib.si)). A similar platform for local libraries Kamra also offers a wide range of content ([www.kamra.si](http://www.kamra.si)), digitized museum holding can be found at central portal Museums.si. A technically very advanced and resourceful biographical portal is available on academic level ([www.slovenska-biografija.si](http://www.slovenska-biografija.si)), or on a community driven counterpart platform, divided into regional biographical portals ([www.gorenjci.si](http://www.gorenjci.si), [www.notranjci.si](http://www.notranjci.si), [www.primorci.si](http://www.primorci.si), [www.pomurci.si](http://www.pomurci.si), [www.celjskozasavski.si](http://www.celjskozasavski.si)). Two success stories are influential also abroad: a platform for archiving events Videlectures ([www.videlectures.net](http://www.videlectures.net)) and online library catalogue Cobbiss, used not only in all libraries in Slovenia, but also in a wider Balkans area ([www.cobiss.net](http://www.cobiss.net)). Digital collections of archival sources can be found at the sites of state and local

archives, research data of more recent date (especially on Slovenian public opinion) is available at the virtual Archive of Social Sciences ([www.adp.si](http://www.adp.si)). But this short list is only for starters and covers mainly the surface of the vivid field.

A representation of many smaller scale humanities projects is available on the SI-DIH portal ([www.sidih.si](http://www.sidih.si)), which represents a central hub for Slovenian digital humanists. SI-DIH is an initiative of the Institute of Contemporary History ([www.inz.si](http://www.inz.si)) and Research Centre of Slovenian Academy of Sciences and Arts ([www.zrc-sazu.si](http://www.zrc-sazu.si)) and also a member of dedicated European network ([www.dariah.eu](http://www.dariah.eu)). A wider group of humanists is collaborating on the project, bringing together all sorts of profiles, from highly propulsive linguists to ethnologists and historians. Going digital is not always easy, this is why series of workshops for finding solutions is organized with materials/recordings published at the portal afterwards.

The most important result of the combined efforts is the SI-DIH browser, which enables searching through digital collections and digital/digitized data of many Slovenian research institutions, which were not all freely available in the past. The backbone of the content is comprised of materials, which are available on the central platform for historians, named History of Slovenia – Sistory ([www.sistory.si](http://www.sistory.si)) and a multidisciplinary platform @rzenal ([www.arzenal.si](http://www.arzenal.si)). That, and included smaller collections, enables finding not only textual or pictorial materials online, but also important metadata on storage of non-digital resources or geodata on archaeological sites, thus steering the researchers to proper data holders. The number of harvested collections is growing steadily, enabling browser to give more focused results for specific queries and occasionally offering surprising combinations of data, which would be impossible in case of using a generic web browser. With a help of an add-on can user afterwards enrich the query with the results found in the Europeana digital library (<http://www.europeana.eu>).

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### Slovenian Genealogy Society International

In 2013, the Slovenian Genealogy Society International, Inc. (SGSI) published a translation of August Dimitz's 1875 *History of Carniola from Primeval Times to the End of French Rule in Illyria (1813), with Special Consideration of Cultural Development*. Dimitz served as the Imperial and Royal Financial Councilor and Secretary of the Historical Association of Carniola in the mid-1800s. He was a lawyer by profession and an historian by avocation. SGSI had it translated from German into English by A. J. Witter.

One might ask why a genealogy society would undertake a project of this nature. Al Peterlin, SGSI's founder and former SSS member, was the President of the Society when the decision was made: "We Americans of Slovene descent needed something to help ground us into an historical context. Today, our children barely know there is an American Constitution, let alone history of our immigrant grandparents. With no background understanding history, one is subject to historical revisionism." Dimitz's comprehensive history is the work of a person immersed in history. The SGSI identified a translator with the help of member Ed Skender. This is a valuable resource for English-speaking Slovenes with an interest in their heritage.

The SGSI is pleased to make this classic text available to English readers. As Dimitz stated, "Until now, no one has undertaken to set down the history of our fatherland in an account that combines the material at hand into a whole. A history of Carniola is a necessity for school and home. In both places there should be cultivated a love of the homeland that can only be rooted in a more exact knowledge of its history."

The 1,400+-page book comprises four volumes:

- Vol. 1, *From Primeval Times to the Death of Emperor Frederick III (1493)*
- Vol. 2, *From the Accession of Maximilian (1493) up to the Death of Ferdinand (1564)*
- Vol. 3, *From the Accession of Archduke Karl in Inner Austria to Leopold I (1564–1657)*
- Vol. 4 *From the Accession of Leopold I (1657) to the End of French Rule in Illyria (1813)*
