Note: Data Collection and Lawmaking

Modern data collection methods in lawmaking have accelerated because of institutional adaptations in the House of Representatives, including remote teleconferencing and electronic document submission. In the future, Congress will have a more searchable record. Structured input and machine-readable data will increasingly be the operational norm. Civil Society Field Hearings will create information that can be metabolized into Congress's data systems, thereby creating conditions for community-informed decision-making as a norm.
