

The Civil Society Field Hearing has two goals:

- 1. To make visible the ongoing dismantlement of the US government and slashing resources for public goods, while also privatizing them
- 2. To clarify and document for the record how these presidential actions impact our constitutional system and our communities across the country

Economic Policy Institute (EPI): Federal Employment Data by Congressional District

EPI provides comprehensive data on the number of federal workers residing in each state, county, and congressional district. This information is crucial for assessing how executive actions affecting federal employment may impact specific regions. <u>Economic Policy Institute</u> **Congressional Black Caucus Foundation (CBCF): Executive Order Tracker**

The CBCF maintains a tracker that details the status and analyses of executive orders, focusing on their impact on Black communities. While not exclusively organized by congressional district, it provides valuable information on how these orders affect specific demographics across various regions. <u>Congressional Black Caucus Foundation+Congressional Black Caucus Foundation+1</u>

Congressional Statements and Resources

Your representative should have the latest data on how the Executive Orders impact their district. See <u>www.house.gov</u> for details. You can also inquire by phone or drop by the district office. Some members of Congress have compiled resources and analyses related to the administration's executive actions and put them online. For example, Tennessee Representative Steve Cohen's <u>website features</u> a tracker of harmful executive actions, which may include district-specific information.

<u>Carnegie Endowment for International Peace</u> offers current global perspectives on the decline of US democracy, and <u>VDem</u> collects global data on democracy. <u>Just Security</u> and <u>Lawfare</u> discuss security implications and the rule of law.
