Key things you need to know to help your Rangers move up into our offer for young women and/or adult membership, volunteering and leadership

Encourage your Rangers to see that their last year as a Ranger is a great chance to start investigating new opportunities - there's a whole host of great things out there for them!

RANGERS

- Check out pages 26 and 27 of the Rangers' handbook, You can achieve anything, to highlight what is available to those coming to an end of their time as a young member.
- It's important to communicate that young women can continue as a peer educator or carry on with their Queen's Guide award or Duke of Edinburgh's Award even after they've left Rangers.
- Although this is still a time to offer support and guidance, speak to Rangers about how it's
 also important for them to make their own personal decisions and take a route that works
 best for them.
- Why don't you ask your local 18-30s coordinator to visit your unit and explain all the exciting opportunities available to young women in Girlguiding? If you can't fit this in, then it's still a good idea to have an evening for your Rangers to explore those opportunities together.
- Talk through the different routes a young woman could take, whether it's getting involved as a social member, becoming a unit helper, training to be a Girlguiding leader, or exploring options and qualifications to help members undertake more outdoor and adventurous activities.
- It is important to explain that as young women, the opportunities they have are not restricted and it's a great time to get involved in many different aspects of Girlguiding.
