Our February Speaker

Our February speaker was Chuck Martinsen, Deputy Director & Shellfish Constable from Marine & Environmental Services of Falmouth. He is responsible for the local boating enforcement and is the herring warden. He talked about Falmouth resources, like shellfish and finfish populations and how volunteers play a big part in shellfish propagation.

Oysters consume nitrogen in the water, turning the green cloudy water into clear water. Reducing nitrogen helps the growth of eel grass and water turbidity. In a highly populated area where there are good flushing systems. Solving the water pollution problem cannot be solved by using oysters alone. In 2017 they added scallop farms to the oyster farming. In 2018 quahogs were added. When they receive their oysters from a hatchery in Maine. They receive 3.1



million oysters in a box the size 13 shoebox. When fully grown in five to six years, the oysters will a tractor trailer full!

During the winter months the oysters are removed from the sea and placed into storage in coolers filled with ice. 45-50% of them will die. Oyster survivability is 95% from the first year to the second.

Scallops are difficult to grow. They die easy, grow fast and are tremendous swimmers. An upweller is a nursery system for them. In April there will be a Shell fishing seminar. Chuck received a NOAA grant for improving shellfishing in Waquoit Bay by removing nitrogen. Chuck has to move the location of the shellfish beds each year as the output from the oysters turns the ground below into ammonia.

There are volunteer service hours needed to assist in these projects. Annually 4,200 service hours are needed. There are 150-200 different tasks so that the volunteers do not get bored doing the same service work each time. Chuck's secretary, Christina Lovely coordinates the volunteer program. Chuck spoke about the return of the blue crabs, when taken they must be five inches across.

Chuck told a funny anecdote to begin his talk. He spoke about ice fishing in Maine when he had just graduated college. He and a friend chose a local pond to fish. As they were cutting the ice many of the locals began to stop their cars to see what they were doing. Chuck and his friend thought it was odd, checked their pond map and assured themselves that all was well. They continued drilling thought the ice with an auger until they broke through and began pulling up corn husks! It turns out that they were not on the pond after all, rather in the middle of a corn field! All in attendance enjoyed Chuck's presentation, it was very informative and entertaining. Thank you, Chuck, we hope to hear from you again in the future!

ASMFC SPECIES - Please note all the ASMFC Species are proposed at this point.

Anadromous:

- Draka Dam on the three mile in the Taunton River watershed received a fish ladder. This project took thirty years from its inception. In the last 20 years Save The Bay, the towns of Dighton and Fall River, DMF, Mass Environmental Trust, and US fish and Wildlife Service all played a part in this project. In the coming months we should see river herring making their way up this river for the first time in over 100 years.
- Herring Brook in Pembroke received a fish weir

- Town Brook in Plymouth is receiving a video system at the Jenny Grist Mill site. Last year this waterway received an eel ramp
- Fore River. DER and DMF are collaborating on building a fishway. This should allow for passage that has not been seen in about 200 years!

During the discussion the size limits for Striped bass came up, they may make it a range of 28 to 35 inches?

Permitting Delay Announced for Vineyard Wind Project

Statement on Bureau of Ocean Energy Management Timeline FEBRUARY 11, 2020

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

New Bedford – Vineyard Wind today released a statement about the Department of Interior's Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) permitting timeline for the Vineyard Wind 1 Project.

"We have received updated information from the Department of Interior that indicates the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the Vineyard Wind I project will be published later than what was previously anticipated," said Lars Pedersen, CEO of Vineyard Wind. "While we need to analyze what a longer permitting timeline will mean for beginning construction,

commercial operation in 2022 is no longer expected. We look forward to the clarity that will come with a final EIS so that Vineyard Wind can deliver this project to Massachusetts and kick off the new US offshore energy industry."

About Vineyard Wind

Vineyard Wind LLC is an offshore wind development company seeking to build the first largescale offshore wind energy project in the US, to be located 15 miles south of Martha's Vineyard. Vineyard Wind, based in New Bedford, Massachusetts, is 50 percent owned by funds of Copenhagen Infrastructure Partners (CIP) and 50 percent by Avangrid Renewables.
