



## SPECIAL RECOGNITION of the 107TH ENGINEER BATTALION

In commemoration of the 100th anniversary of a distinguished unit of the United States Army.

The 107th Engineer Battalion traces its lineage to the organization of the Calumet Light Guard in the Michigan State Troops on 8 August 1881. In its first 25 years, it served as a company in the 2d Battalion of Infantry, and in the 3d and 5th Infantry Regiments. After its first muster for Federal service, it fought at El Caney, in the only full-scale infantry battle of the Spanish-American War on 2 July 1898 as Company D, 34th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, Michigan National Guard. Spanish-American War Campaign participation credit:

### SANTIAGO

On 1 June 1906, the unit became Company A, Michigan Engineer Corps. It trained at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, in 1915 and was called to Federal service in a provisional engineer regiment under U. S. Grant III on the Mexican border in June 1916. Upon return the next year, it was called to guard the Soc Locks and then mobilized for Federal service in August 1917. After construction work at Camp Custer, Michigan, it joined new Upper Peninsula units as the 1st Battalion, 107th Engineers at Camp MacArthur, Texas, with the 32d Infantry Division (Wisconsin and Michigan). Company A served as demonstration troops at Fort Belvoir before the deployment to France. In four major offensives with "Les Terribles," the 107th Engineers repaired roads and bridges, prepared shelters, and working ahead of the infantry, breached barbed wire, and built assault crossings. Reconstituted in 1937-1939 entirely in Michigan, the 107th Engineer Regiment trained with the 32d Division on Second Army maneuvers in Wisconsin in 1940. The call-up of 18 National Guard divisions that fall was the organization's fourth muster for Federal service. The year of training at Camp Beauregard and Camp Claiborne, Louisiana, sharpened engineer skills in construction and destruction of roads, bridges and obstacles, and in combat as infantry. With Federal service extended by international unrest and Pearl Harbor, the 107th Engineers deployed to Northern Ireland after reorganization to a divisional battalion for the triangularized 32d Division. Heavy Construction of a General Depot replaced training. At the end of the project, one company was sent to England for the subsequent North Africa invasion and the battalion learned of the diversion of the 32d Division to the South Pacific. Inactivated and reconstituted as the 2d Battalion, 112th Engineer Regiment, intensive training resumed and the organization moved to Devizes, England.

Selected as demonstration troops again, the Michigan Engineers proved the speedy construction of British Bailey bridging for long floating spans as well as dry-gaps and shorter spans which resulted in the manufacture of this equipment for coming operations in Europe.

In a general reorganization for more flexible and self-sufficient units, the Michigan Engineers became the 254th Engineer Combat Battalion in the 1121st Engineer Combat Group with the 112th and 146th Battalions. The group prepared for close support of the 29th Division on the right of V Corps' assault over Omaha Beach. Without common knowledge, the Michigan Engineers rehearsed tasks to be performed in France: breaching the seawall, clearing beach exits, building the Isigny/Carentan bridge, and crossing flooded areas. The battalion turned from its own training to construction of mock-ups of ships, landing craft, aircraft, and other construction simulating the target landing areas in France. The battalion sustained casualties in accidental detonations of weathered, displaced, or lost British beach mines in clearing beaches for joint invasion rehearsals by army, naval, and air forces.

In the assault landing on Omaha, the Michigan Engineers performed the preplanned tasks to move and link invading forces and block the enemy through the breakout at St. Lo. Then, in successive campaigns, the battalion moved 1,372 miles in close support of numerous armored and infantry divisions clearing obstacles, debris, and mines; providing roads, bridges, and potable water; producing rock, timber, and other engineer materials; and on several occasions fighting as infantry by design or necessity.

The battalion (then 254th) was twice decorated for extraordinary heroism on 17 December 1944 in resisting several vicious attacks by armored infantry and tanks, denying vital routes and supplies of gasoline and rations, sorely needed by the enemy for his counterattack. Both the United States and French governments recognized this gallant and courageous action.

In another singular action, at Honningen, Germany, on 22 March 1945, the battalion bridged the Rhine in spring flood in 12 hours with floating steel treadway equipage. The vital V Corps bridge permitted reinforcement of forces beyond the collapsed Remagen Bridge.

Relieving the stresses of final rapid advances, the battalion restored and operated 100 miles of railroad in eastern Germany hauling supplies forward and prisoners back.

The battalion met Russian forces near Leipzig and again in Czechoslovakia. At war's end using PW labor, the battalion restored traffic ways, utilities, and essential services in Pilsen, and later constructed redeployment facilities in France. World War II Campaign participation credits and honors:

Following 22 December 1945 inactivation of the battalion, the 107th and 254th consolidated and reorganized as the 107th Engineer Combat Battalion, 46th Infantry Division, Michigan National Guard. Reorganized and redesignated the 107th Engineer Battalion in 1953 and again non-divisional, the battalion continues exemplary peacetime performance in training and readiness for Federal service with significant State and community service in forest fires, traffic assistance, floods, storms, riots, and other emergencies. A fifth muster to Federal service occurred on 24 July 1967 for 9 days of riot duty in Detroit.

Home stations: Ishpeming, Marquette, Calumet, Baraga, Ironwood, Iron River, Gladstone, Kingsford, and Menominee in the Upper Peninsula.
