

ments in or near Ishpeming your responsibility. Fatigues optional for all functions; Class A uniform required for the formal banquet and military ball Saturday evening. Scrapbooks, souviners and other memborlia encouraged but not required. One weeks KP on pots and pans for failure to report as ordered — and consider yourself SOL if you miss a grand weekend with old bud-

dies and comrades.

If your sharp eyes and alert mind has determined that this years reunion is the observance of the Association's 25th anniversary you are right on target. Lets explore it further. what is the significance of the dates August 19-20, 1961? Gotcha there we'll bet! Well, to satisfy a growing curiosity Saturday, August 19th was the date of the first informal gathering ever of past WWI, WWII members of the 107th and its counterpart units, discharged post-WWII Guardsmen together with the then rostered active Guardsmen. The underlying purpose was to explore the possibility of forming some kind of organization which would honor the past and perpetuate the future of the famous 107th Engineers. Following a full day of happy comradeship, the enthused gathering reconvened on Sunday, August 20th for a programmed business meeting. To quote from the "After a brief discussion all those present enthusiastiofficial minutes taken at the meeting: cally agreed to form an organization comprising past and present members of the 107th Engineers and its counterparts as recommended by Colonel Austin Lindberg. The chairman then presented candidates for various offices as recommended by the nominating committee." After the election of officials the minutes are further recorded as follows: "Motion was made that the officers and board members should formulate a set of by-laws to include dues and membership requirements to be prepared and submitted to the delegates at the next business meeting of the Association. motion was supported and passed." With that mandate we were off and running. The fact that a hopeful dream blossomed into vivid reality far beyond anyone's expectation is now history. W.O. Leonard L. Lorge, presently on active duty with the 507th Engineer N.G. Bn., and the appointed secretary on the first reunion committee, very graciously consented to whip up from memory a summary of events leading up to the memorable weekend of August 19-20, 1961. Here is Len's report:

"Within the 107th Engineers there is always the presence of an honored past." Those words were from the mind of the then Lt Col Leonard C. Ward (Co A 107 Regt-1121 Engr Gp Hq), commander of the 107th N.G. Battalion when I became associated with it. He knew quite correctly that unless the traditions, and the merriment, of the organization were passed on and instilled in new members we would become a group of old-timers with no one to keep the spirit alive. Having worked in a small museum in my youth, the basic interest in history was there. However, it found a real release upon joining the 107th, for they had an almost century-old lineage with little being done about it. My desire to work with it found ready acceptance among men of the 254th as well as local veterans groups across the U.P. Soon a History Room had blossomed in the old Ishpeming armory. Just when we were bulging at the seams, the armory was completely destroyed in a mid-winter fire, taking so many emblems and souviners of the past with it. When we moved into the new armory and got settled, the old history bug bit me again, and a small historical display sprouted.

But this time the lesson had been learned that "things" would not last long and we should concentrate our efforts on the people who had served in the 107th. I made the suggestion to Col Austin E. Lindberg, Col Ward's successor, that it would be quite an event to sponsor a reunion of all members of the battalion, past and pre-Of course, Austy saw this not only as a great gesture to our old friends, but as an Engineer Party the likes of which we had not seen before. And the support came from everywhere - Moose LaCombe, Henry Warth, Frank Matthews, Ed Kohn, Bing Boberg, Vern Rousseau, Ed Doyle, Sam Dubow, Dick Pascoe, Bill Sheldon, Bruce Bureau, Garfield Kintgen, Len Ward, Tux Wernholm, Harry Beeby, Ed Vickstrom, and so many more; all would attend and bring others with them. The Red Arrow Club of Negaunee was behind us, the WWI Drum & Bugle Corps of the Soo also gave support. And our sister battalion in the U.P., the old 300th AAA, had a big piece of real estate that held a lot of members and they too publicized the event, not knowing that one day soon the entire U.P. would be all Engineers including the 300th. It was well underway to being "Good as Done". Our newspaper articles, invitations to Veteran's groups, notices in publications, and certainly not least, the prestige of the 107th in the State brought soldiers, kids and veterans together from all over. We tried to have areas in the Marquette armory where groups could gather and hear music of the times - "It's a Long Way to Tipperary" played in one room and "The Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" sounded from another. Unforseen to us as we planned the event was the terrific reception that going through a chow line would get from the guys and gals alike. did we realize that true to Engineer form, the party would start on Thursday when the first eager beavers showed up at the armory instead of on Saturday as expected. While no one expected the next one would be quite the same, everyone wanted to keep them as an annual ev-And although each armory, each group of officers in charge, lend their own special touch, I know it has been the hand of the secretary, Ed Vickstrom, that has made it possible. His mailing list from old records and rosters research and personal contacts and publishing the BULL SHEET has enabled both the old vets and the new guardsmen to enjoy a fine comrade-I take pride in the fact that an idea could put to work the talents of so many fine people, and produced an Association that, for one grand weekend each year, lets the hearty Engineers of the Argonne/Alsace mingle with the valiant men from Normandy/Rhineland and all in the camp of those unsung guys who carry on today in the 107th National Guards. It is in such an Association as we now enjoy that the honored past of the 107th is in good hands.

AMEN, and many many thanks, Rans! The gang there did themselves proud in all respects and we can look forward to being invited back to Baraga one of these fine years.

It all started with this "Locator File" notice in a military publication which alert Guardsmen brought to ye' editor's attention. "Anyone who was billeted in Newquay, Cornwall, England before the Normandy invasion, particularly with the 112th and 254th Engineer Combat Battalions and the 1121st Combat Group contact: Sid. G. Green, 66 Chosen Drive, Churchdown, Gloucester GL3 2QT, England." After sitting on it for several weeks mulling over the various possibilities involved, curiosity finally prevailed and a non-commital note as follows was mailed "I have noted the Locator File to Mr. Green: notice (photocopy of same enclosed) regarding the pre-invasion billeting of identified units in Newquay, Cornwall. If you will inform me as to the nature of your inquiry, I may be in a position to assist you." At this point maybe something of great Association interest or, conversely, maybe a situation best left unacknowledged and buried. A prompt response from Mr. Green erased all doubts per these ouotes from his letter: "During WWII, I was evacuated as a school boy from London to Newquay. There I was living in the house next to the Garth Hotel where some of the V Corps Engineers were billeted. I and my pals became friendly with the GI's in the Garth and other hotels and used to do odd jobs for them, run errands, etc. Over the years I often thought about the V Corps Engineers and wondered what happened to them and where they went on leaving Newquay so I started to do some research. As I slowly gathered information I became very proud of the part that you and your colleagues took in the liberation of Europe. I now know (from Military Archives Div., Washington D.C.) that the GI's in Newquay were the 1121st Engr Group Hq, 112th, 254th and possibly the 146th battalions. I would like very much to fill in a number of gaps in my knowledge such as: What battalion you were with and what hotels its companies occupied; do you know the names of any of the other hotels in Newquay where the V Corps engineers stayed? I know that the 1121st Gp Hq was in the Barrowfields Hotel. Do you know which outfit was in the Garth?" For starters Sid was informed that H&S 254 was billeted in the Mount Wise Hotel. After initial contact in early 1985, Sid has most generously sent ye' editor lots of information about Newquay in general and in turn was sent copies of all 28 issues of the BULL SHEET, HISTORY OF THE 107th ENGINEERS and a Snortin' Bull cap. He is also in touch with others from the 112th and 254th including Col C. F. Stowell the 112th CO, and has received some information from those contacted. So, if your good memory still retains any items of helpful information shoot it in and we'll pass it along to Sid. Almost ashamed to admit that ye' editor doesn't

remember the hotel where the 254 had its Bn Hq CP - helluva thing for an S-2 Section member to admit but dammit that was 43 years ago!

GUARD BATTALION ON WINTER MANEUVERS

In a radical departure from usual practice, the 107th National Guard Bn this year "enjoyed" for the first time in its long history a winter encampment instead of its annual summer mustering at Camp Grayling located in Lower Michigan. With some reservations but with lots of enthusiasm over the welcome change from routine. the battalion departed for Camp Ripley, Minnesota on a 2 day motor convoy movement Feb. 22 nd. BAILEY BRIDGE

Sir Donald Bailey, inventor of the Bailey Bridge, which played a key role in the Allied victory in WWII died in May 1985. Bailey, who had spent most of his childhood making model bridges from pieces of wood and string, sketched the original design for his bridge on the back of an envelope. He took it to the British War Office, where it was accepted in 1941 for a fee of \$48,000. The bridge was assembled from

welded panels of steel linked by pinned joints. It could be carried easily by a few men (ha ha) and adapted to carry heavy loads including tanks. "Without the Bailey Bridge, we should not have won the war," Field Marshall Bernard Montgomery said after the defeat of Nazi Germany. For sure the combat engineer battalions of the 1121 Engr Gp Hq, the 112th, 146th and 254th, were all well acquainted with Bailey bridge erection under many different combat area conditions.



and with the Rhein-Hotel in mind a contribution from George W. Waldron (Co C 254) is a pre-war tourist booklet touting the many features of the hotel in German, Austrian, French and Englist. Most of the 254 was billeted in the hotel's "100 cheerful and comfortably furnished rooms with 130 beds" while pushing the bridge across the Rhine River. According to George: "In the upper right hand corner of the hotel, I got hit near my left eye with pieces of wood and plaster when the Krauts across the river threw some shells in the area. Severed a nerve causing a twitch that I've learned to control but the incident never got on my re-

cords because I refused to be evacuated because we needed all hands for the bridge job. for frozen feet (have 4 dead toes) picked up in the Bulge - all my records with the 376th were lost so I've never been able to establish a claim." George joined the 254 from a hospital in Liege, Belgium after long service, including Ireland and Cornwall stations, with the 376th AAA, 9th Inf. Div. BET YOU DIDN'T KNOW DEPARTMENT

A communication addressed to the 254th Engrs from "The American Order of the French Croix de Guerre, Inc., New York, N.Y." informs us: In a recent issue of one of the service magazines, we saw a notice of a forthcoming reunion of your Association. It will be of interest to you to learn that your unit had been cited with the Croix de Guerre during its campaign in France or Belgium in World WarII. With regard to the citation we wish to point out that these citations were unit citations which did not carry with them any medals for members of the unit. This compares with individual citations of the Croix de Guerre where individuals of the Armed Forces were decorated for specific acts of bravery or heroism and accordingly would be entitled to wear the medal. As recorded in the name of the 254th Engr Combat Bn in the Order's records: French Croix de Guerre With Silver Star, awarded under Decision No. 246, 15 July 1946, by the President of the Provisional Government of the French Republic, with the following citation: A splendid unit, which distinguished itself in the Bullingen region (Belgium) on 17 December 1 944. It was thrown into a breach opened by the enemy and assigned the mission of closing off three roads of vital strategic interest. After furious combat, it blocked the adversary, causing them severe losses, thus showing the finest qualities of courage and military valor. Now you know !

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whole, the engineers sent to N. Ireland had had scanty training in the U.S. except in basic military subjects, and overseas they had little chance to learn their jobs. They were constantly engaged in construction and was able to give only 10% of its time to training outside of that received on the job. Though valuable, such work did not train the units for many other missions of a combat unit. Thirty percent of the men on one battalion (the 107th) had recently transferred from the infantry, and many of the enlisted men in the unit had never learned any engineer specialties. The men of the 107th at Ballyclare were supposed to be undergoing training, but they were called on so

often to enlarge force headquarters and rehabilitate the Q.M. Depot at Antrim that little time remained for combat training." This situation was slowly rectified as the E.T.O. forces were beefed up with construction engineer units for the monumental task of preparing facilities for the flood of invasion troops to follow. Incidently, the publication quoted from above is an excellent review of the Engineer's role in WWII. The 112th and 254th are each recognized therein 4 different times.
