John Alden was hired for a Cooper, at South-Hampton wher the ship victuled; and being a hofful yong man was much desired, but left to his owne liking to go, or stay when he came here, but he stayed, and maryed here.

John Allerton, and Thomas Enlish were both hired, the later to goo m<sup>e</sup> of a shalop here, and y<sup>e</sup> other was reputed as one of y<sup>e</sup> company, but was to go back (being a seaman) for the help of others behind. But they both dyed here, before the shipe returned.

2.  
There were also other 2. seamen hired to stay a year here in the Country, William Trenore; and one Ely. But when their time was out they both returned.

These being about a hundred soule came ouer in this first shipe; and began this worke, which god of his goodnes hath hitherto blessed; let his holy name haue praise.  
And seeing it hath pleased him to give me to see 30. years compleated, since these beginings. And that the great works of his prouidence are to be obserued. I haue thought it not unworthy my paines, to take a view of the decreasinges, & increasinges of these persons, and such changes as haue past over them, & theirs, in this thirtie years. It may be of some use to such as come after; but however shall rest in my owne benefite.

I will therfore take them in order as they lyd.

m Caruer and his wife, dyed the first year, hem y<sup>e</sup> Spring, she in ye somer; also his man Roger, and y<sup>e</sup> little boy Jasper, dyed before either of them of y<sup>e</sup> commone infection. Desire minter, returned to her freind & proved not very well, and dyed in England. His servant boy Latham after more than 20. years stay in the country went into England; and from thence to the Bahamy Islands in y<sup>e</sup> west Indies; and ther with some others was stauen for want of food. His maid servant maried, & dyed a year or tow after here in this place. His servant John Howland maried the daughter of John Tillie, Elizabeth, and they are both now living; and haue 10. children now al living; and their eldest daughter hath 4. children

and ther 2. daughter, one, all living  
and other of their children mar-  
agable. so 15. are come of them.

<sup>m</sup> Brewster lived to very old  
age; about 80 years; he was when he  
dyed, having lived some 23. or  
24. years here in y<sup>e</sup> country. though  
his wife dyed long before,  
yet she dyed aged. His sonne was  
the dyed a yonge man unmaried;  
his sonne <sup>lived</sup> Loue, till this year 1650.  
and dyed & left 4. children, now  
living. His daughters which came  
over after him, are dead but have  
left sundry children alive; his  
eldest sonne is still living, and  
hath 9. or 10. children, one mar-  
ied, who hath a child, or 2.

Richard more, his brother dyed the  
first winter; but he is maried, and  
hath 4. or 5. children, all living.

<sup>m</sup> Ed: Winslow, his wife dyed the  
first winter; and he maried with  
the widow of <sup>m</sup> White, and hath 2.  
children living by her marigable,  
besids sundry that are dead.  
one of his servants dyed, as also the  
little girl soone after the ships ar-  
rived. but his man Georg Somle  
is still living, and hath 8. childre

William Bradford, his wife dyed  
soone after their arival; and he  
maried againe; and hath 4. chil-  
dren. 3. wherof are maried.  
who dyed 9 of may 1656.

<sup>m</sup> Allerton his wife dyed with the  
first, and his servant John Hooker.  
his sonne Bartle is maried in England  
but I know not how many children  
he hath. His daughter remember is  
maried at Salem & hath 3. or 4  
children living. And his daughter  
Mary is maried here, & hath 4.  
children. Him selfe maried againe  
with y<sup>e</sup> daughter of <sup>m</sup> Brewster, &  
hath one sonne living by her. but  
she is long since ~~dyed~~ dead. And  
he is maried againe, and hath left  
this place long agoe. So y<sup>e</sup> account  
his increase to be 8. besids his  
sons in England.

<sup>m</sup> Fuller, his servant dyed at sea; and  
after his wife came ouer, he had tow  
children by her; which are living  
and growne up to yers. But he dyed  
some 15. years agoe.

John Crakston dyed in the first mor-  
tality; and about some 5. or 6. years  
after his sonne dyed, having lost him  
selfe in y<sup>e</sup> wodes, his <sup>foot</sup> became frozen,  
which put him into a feauer, of which  
he dyed.

Captain Standish his wife dyed in  
the first sicknes; and he maried  
againe, and hath 4. sonnes live-  
ing, and some are dead.  
+ who dyed 3. of octob. 1655.

<sup>m</sup> Martin, he, and all his, dyed  
in the first Infection; not long  
after the arival.

<sup>m</sup> Moline, and his wife, his  
sonne, & his servant dyed the first  
winter. Only his daughter Priscila  
survived, and maried with John  
Felden, who are both living, and  
have 11. children. And their eldest  
daughter is maried & hath five  
children. See N.E. Memorial  
p. 22.

<sup>m</sup> White, and his 2. servants dyed  
soone after ther landing. His wife mar-  
ied with <sup>m</sup> Winslow (as is before noted)  
His 2. sons are maried, and resolued  
hath 5. children; perigrine form,  
all living. So their increase are 7.

<sup>m</sup> Hopkins, and his wife are now  
both dead; but they lived aboue  
20. years in this place, and had one  
sonne, and 4. daughters borne here.  
The sonne became a seaman, & dyed  
at Barbadoes, one daughter dyed  
here. and 2. are maried, one of  
them hath 2. children, & one is yet  
to mary. so their y<sup>e</sup> increase, which  
still surviue, are 5. But his  
sonne Giles, is maried, and hath 4.  
children.

12. his daughter Constanta, is also married, and hath 12. Children all of them living, and one of them married.

4 Richard Warren lived some 4. or 5. years, and had his wife come over to him, by whom he had 2. Sons before dyed; and one of them is maried, and hath 2. Children so his increase is 4. But he had 5. daughters more came over with his wife, who are all maried, & living & have many Children.

8. John Billinton after he had bene here 10. yers, was executed, for killing a man; and his eldest sone dyed before him; But his 2. sone is aliuue and maried & hath 18. Children

7. Edward Tillie, and his wife both dyed soon after their arival; and the girle Humility their cousen was sent for into Ento England, and dyed ther. But the youth Henery Samson, is still liuing, and is maried, & hath 7. Children.

John Tillie, and his wife both dyed, ~~at~~ alittle after they came a shore; and their daughter Elizabeth maried with John Howland and hath issue as is before noted.

8. Francis Cooke is still liuing, a very olde man, and hath seene his Childrens Children, hane Children; after his wife came over, (with other of his Children) he hath 3. still liuing by her, all maried, and have 5. Children so their encrease is 8. And his sone John which came over with him, is maried, and hath 4. Children living.

6. Thomas Rogers dyed in the first sickness, but his sone Joseph is still liuing, and is maried, and hath 6. Children. The rest of Thomas Rogers came over, & are maried, & have many Children.

Thomas Tinker, and his wife, and sone, all dyed in the first sicknes.

And so did John Riddale, and his wife.

James Chilton, and his wife also dyed in the first infection. But their daughter Mary is still liuing and hath 9. Children; and one daughter is maried, & hath a Child, so their Increase is 10.

4 Edward Fuller, and his wife dyed soon after they came ashore; But their sone Samuel is living, & maried, and hath 4. Children or more.

John Turner, and his 2. sones all dyed in the first sicknes. But he hath a daughter still liuing at Salem, well maried, and approued of.

Francis Eaton, his first wife dyed in the generall sicknes; and he maried againe & his 2. wife dyed, & he maried the 3. and had by her 3. Children, one of them is maried, & hath a Child, the other are liuing but one of them is an ydoole. He dyed about 16. years agoe. his sone Samuel, who came over a fucking child is aliso maried, & hath a Child.

All these dyed sone after their arival, in the generall sicknes that beset. But Digerie prest had his wife & Children sent hither afterwards, she being Mr Allertons sister. But the rest left no posteritie here.

Richard qardinar, became a seaman, and dyed in England, or at sea.

Gilbert Winslow after diuerse years abroad here, returned into England and dyed ther.

6. Peter Browne maried twise; by his first wife he had 2. Children, who are liuing & both of them maried; and the one of them hath 2. Children by his second wife, he had 2. more; he dyed about 16. years since.

Thomas English; and John Alderton,  
dyed in the general sicknes.

John Alden married with priscila,  
m<sup>2</sup> Mollines his daughter, and <sup>had</sup> issue  
by her <sup>as</sup> before related.

Edward Doty, & Edward Litster  
the servants of m<sup>t</sup> Hopkins. Litster  
after he was at liberty went to Vir-  
ginia, & ther dyed. But Edward <sup>Doty</sup> by  
a second wife hath 7 Children  
and both he and they are living.

of these 100. persons which came  
first over, in this first ship together;  
the greater halfe dyed in the generall  
mortality; and most of them in 2.  
or three monthes time. And for  
those which survived though some  
were ancient & past procreation; &  
others left y<sup>r</sup> place and countrey;  
yet those few remaining are sprung  
up above 160. persons; in this 30.  
years. And are now living in this  
presente year 1650. Besids many  
of their Children which are dead,  
and come not within this account.

And of the old stock (of one, &  
other) ther are yet living this pre-  
sent year 1650. nere 30. persons.  
Let the Lord have y<sup>r</sup> praise, who is  
the High preseruer of men.
