Howard states, "The challenge for me is always to see the world with fresh eyes and respond spontaneously to the beauty before me...This is what the magic of painting is about for me. This allows the viewer to use his or her imagination and participate in the painting."





Stan Miller Watercolor Workshop

Piqua Arts Council was thrilled to invite nationally and internationally awarded artist, Stan Miller, to Piqua to instruct a four-day Watercolor Workshop. The seats filled up fast at Apple Tree Gallery, as the workshop began on Monday, March 7 and ran through Thursday, March 10 from 9am to 4pm daily.

Stan Miller has been a professional painter in watercolor and egg tempera for more than forty years, earning many awards; exhibiting paintings in numerous exhibitions, galleries and museums; instructing workshops and jurying art events around the world along the way. Born on a small farm in Southeastern South Dakota in 1949, Stan was influenced by various events in his childhood, but it wasn't until his third year of college that he took his first watercolor class. He then started selling his paintings for as little as \$2 each, and in 1973, he finally made the decision to make a living as a full time, professional watercolorist. Now he enjoys teaching nearly as much as painting, as he teaches weekly classes in Spokane as well as workshops around the world. Stan spends most of his time in his studio painting, hoping never to retire.

Poetry Out Loud ·····

For the third consecutive year, Piqua Arts Council hosted the West Central Ohio Regional Finals for the National Poetry Out Loud Competition. National Endowment for the Arts, the Poetry Foundation, Ohio Arts Council and regional organizations all partner in hosting this national poetry recitation competition, in which the winner takes home a \$20,000 cash prize. This stage of the competition took place at the Upper Valley Career Center Hartzell Auditorium in Piqua on the evening of Thursday, February 10. Piqua Arts Council is responsible for a twelvecounty region, with this year's competitors coming from Piqua High School (Isabella Reyes), Xenia High School (Hiba Loukssi), Newton High School (Molly Norman) and Chaminade Julienne Catholic High School (Amaira Cochran).

Each student competed in two rounds of poetry recitation for judges Kevin Milner, Jamie Suttle, Countess Winfrey and Nate Funderburg. Not only did the 2022 judges take part in determining which student would move onto the next round in the competition, they also provided live entertainment for the evening. After astounding performances from the participating students, the judges reached their decision.

The winner of the regional competition was Amaira Cochran, sophomore at Chaminade Julienne Catholic High School, with her poems, *Abcedarian Requiring Further Examination of Anglikan Seraphym Subjugation of a Wild Indian Rezervation* by Natalie Diaz and *Respectability* by Tina Boyer Brown.

What started as a video series in 2021, Home Grown Arts was created to highlight the artists around Piqua and its surrounding areas. There's a big misconception that creatives can't thrive in rural communities. Many believe the arts are more successful in larger cities, which leads to many artists leaving their small hometowns in search of opportunities elsewhere. But this isn't how we see it.

At the Piqua Arts Council, we see creatives every day making a living in and around Piqua. We want to celebrate these artists and show how the arts have impacted their lives and shaped them into the individuals they are through various short documentaries – our Home Grown Arts series.

Last year, PAC partnered with AJ Ganger of Indian Nation Station in the creation of these short interviews. The videos featured artists such as Jared & Justin Younce of ReFlektion, Dan Rosenbaum, Bobbie DeBrito, Jimmy Felts and more, which premiered twice a month on our YouTube and Facebook pages.

We have once again teamed up with Indian Nation Station in the making of new highlight videos that will premiere in 2023. These interviews will feature Erik Ganger & Lily Stewart of Ganger Images, Maureen O'Keefe, Brett Poling, AJ Ganger and more to be a part of the 2023 series.













Covington native, Erik Ganger, and his partner from Piqua, Ohio, Lily Stewart, are a modern style photography duo. Together through Ganger Images, they have pursued various photographic opportunities from traditional weddings or senior photos, product + lifestyle photos for Winans Chocolates + Coffees, event photos at Piqua Community Foundation's Pitch Piqua, and more.

Professional artist, Maureen O'Keefe, was born in Sidney, Ohio. She loves spending time in her studio at the Piqua Arts & Innovation Center located in the heart of downtown Piqua. Maureen has held various exhibitions and her work has been included in group exhibitions and private collections. She is the recipient of the 2019 Individual Excellence Award from the Ohio Arts Council and has received numerous drawing and painting awards.

Brett Poling is the Director and Conductor of the Piqua Civic Band. Poling has been an educator for more than 27 years, having taught music, choir and drama at St. Luke School before becoming the technology coordinator and assistant principal. Prior to teaching in Beavercreek, he served as the band director for Lima Central Catholic High School + their 3 elementary schools.

AJ Ganger is the Director of the Indian Nation Station, the Public Access TV station for Piqua, Ohio. AJ works closely with the students of Piqua High School during their Media classes in teaching them how to use a camera, working with Final Cut Pro, running TriCasters, making graphics, running replay, and teaching them how to communicate with local businesses in coordinating coverage for various opportunities.
