

- If you do not understand the meaning or ideas of the poem you are reading, you should <u>re-read</u> and <u>annotate</u> it.
 - Perhaps you have re -read and annotated, and you still feel that you do not understand the poem. That's what the internet is for!
 Sometimes you will not have the knowledge of the poet's life, or the events they may be drawing on to write the poem:
 - For example: in the poem "Daddy" by Sylvia Plath, she compares her father to a Nazi in many ways throughout the poem, but if you did not have prior knowledge of Nazis, you would miss a lot of references.
 - Use the internet to find the deeper meaning, but **don't always rely on** it...it just has people's take on what the poem means (It's not always right)
 - If you find a good take on the poem on the internet, re-read the poem and see if it makes sense to you!
- Another way to understand the meaning of poems, is to find the lines of the poem that seem to have the most weight in them.
 - Most weight meaning: repetition, seem important to the title
 - **Re-read those lines 5 times** and try to **look at it in different perspectives**
 - This strategy will help you analyze the poem to a completely different level!
