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# Florida Lawmakers Ban Kids Under 16 From Social Media By Drew Smith

Florida lawmakers have fasttracked legislation that forces social media companies to keep most minors off their platforms.

The legislation, which passed the state House Thursday after earlier being approved by the Senate, now heads to Gov. Ron DeSantis's (R) desk, though he says he's not quite ready to sign on.

DeSantis told reporters Friday that he thinks there needs to be 2023 found that a third of teens a "proper balance" between government regulations and parental input on the social media issue.

"We'll be wrestling with that," he said.

The governor said he'll be assessing the final version of the legislation likely through the weekend.

"Federal law says 13 and under can't have social media accounts. That's not really enforced." he said.

DeSantis, who suspended his bid for the GOP's 2024 presidential nomination in January, has been an advocate of reining in media and conversations available to children outside of family

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atmospheres. He championed efforts to censor public school books and discussions of sexuality in public schools.

The lawmakers who championed the proposed social media ban, which would require platforms check the ages of users through a thirdparty source, argue it will make the online landscape safer for youths.

A Pew Research Survey in aged 13 to 17 said they use the most popular social media platforms "almost constantly." It also found that smartphone ownership is nearly universal among teens surveyed spanning all genders, age groups, economic backgrounds and races and ethnicities.

"It's time to take decisive action to protect our most vulnerable population – children," Florida state Sen. Erin Grall (R), one of the bill's leading sponsors,

"We're talking about businesses that are using addictive features to engage in mass manipulation of our children to cause them harm." Grall further said on the Florida Senate floor Thursday.

The legislation passed 108-7 in the state House and 23-14 in the Florida Senate within a matter of hours Thursday.

Grall, a Florida attorney and mother of three kids, didn't immediately respond to requests for comment.

Representatives for Snapchat, TikTok, and Meta, the parent company of Facebook and Instagram, didn't immediately respond to requests for comment. X's press office autoreplied to a request for comment with the message: "Busy now, please check back later."

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
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

Asthma Drug Can Drastically Reduce Food Allergies By Dennis Bennett



About 20 million people in the U.S.—including four million children—have food allergies. Now, there's a new way to reduce their risk of severe allergic reactions. A study published in the New England Journal of Medicine reports that antihistamine, which was the drug omalizumab, or Xolair, allows people with food allergies to tolerate higher doses of allergenic foods before developing a reaction after an accidental exposure. It also leads to milder reactions if they are exposed.

The drug was originally approved more than two decades ago to treat allergic asthma. But because of this new study and other data, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration expanded the approval of Xolair on Feb. 16 to Xolair does not cure food include treatment of food allergies in anyone one year or older. It's now the first drug approved to treat allergies to multiple foods.

Anabelle Terry, a 12-year old with severe peanut and tree nut allergies, experienced that benefit firsthand as a participant in the trial. While participating in the study, she ate half a cupcake while with friends that she thought was nut-free but had made been 18 www.JaxGayMag.com

made with cashew flour. Within about an hour, her stomach and throat started to hurt and her lips tingled, so she thought she was having an allergic reaction and went home. Her mom gave her an enough to guell her symptoms. Before Xolair, if she ate even a tiny amount of peanuts or tree nuts, she would generally need a shot of epinephrine, which is an emergency treatment for an allergic reaction, and a visit to the doctor. "I did notice a difference—I didn't react as badly as I thought I would have," Terry says. "I only had half, but it was a big cupcake, and it was amazing to see that even though I accidentally ate some, I was okay."

allergies, so people must continue to avoid allergycausing foods by reading labels and asking how food is prepared. But people now "have another layer of protection in case of accidental exposure," says Dr. Sharon Chinthraja, associate professor of medicine at Stanford University School of Medicine and co-lead of the study.

**How Xolair Works To Fight Allergic Reactions** 

The drug works by mopping up something called immunoglobulin E (IgE) cells, which activate the immune cells responsible for inflammation and allergic reactions. "I think of the drug as a sponge that takes allergic antibodies out of circulation," says Chinthraia. It was this mechanism that led to Xoalir's original approval in 2003 for allergic asthma, since IgE cells play a role in that condition as well. "There were suggestions that the drug should work in food allergy too, but no study until this one demonstrated that to the level required by the FDA to add it to the label, says Dr. Robert Wood, director of pediatric allergy, immunology, and rheumatology at Johns Hopkins Children's Center and the principal investigator of the study." In fact, because of the way the drug blocks IgE, it "may be more applicable to food allergies because asthma has a lot of different triggers, but food allergies are pretty much an IgE-driven reaction."

# What The New Study Shows

The study included 177 children from ages 1 to 17 at 10 different sites in the U.S. The participants were randomly assigned to receive Xolair as an injection either every two

weeks or every four weeks, depending on their body weight and levels of IgE (a proxy for how severe their food allergies are), or a placebo. All of the participants were allergic to peanuts and at least two other foods such as tree nuts (cashews, walnuts, and hazelnuts), milk, eggs, or wheat. After about four months of receiving the injections, the kids were given high levels of peanut or other food allergens—much higher than doses they might encounter by accidentally taking a bite of food containing them. Of those who took Xolair, 67% were able to tolerate the higher dose of peanut without a severe allergic reaction, compared to 7% of those getting placebo. The breakdown was similar for the other allergens.

"Over half [of the participants] could eat a lot of the foods they were allergic to," says Dr. Robert Wood, director of pediatric allergy, immunology, and rheumatology at Johns Hopkins Children's Center and the principal investigator of the study. "More than 50% could eat the equivalent of 16 peanuts with no reaction."

Among the remaining half, reactions even at small doses of exposure, but all of the reactions were milder among the Xolair group than the placebo group. It's not clear how long the drug blocks IgE activity, but doctors anticipate that people will have to continue getting the shots to lower their risk of severe reactions.

# How To Use Xolair For Food **Allergies**

For Anabelle, the drug provides a sense of security. "I'll be able to try new things and do some things that I wasn't able to before," she says. "I love traveling even more now because I don't always have to worried about whether a new food is safe. I'm still cautious. but more free to experience things."

Xolair isn't an emergency treatment. It's designed to be a maintenance therapy that keeps the immune system in check for as long as people take the medication, so that if someone is accidentally exposed to an allergy-causing food, their reaction will be

dampened and not lifeabout 15% experienced allergic threatening. The first few doses might be given at the doctor's office to make sure people don't have adverse reactions to the shot, but parents give subsequent doses to children at home. Adults can also give the shots to themselves.

> To work, a person has to keep taking the shots. That can get expensive: A spokesperson for Genentech, which makes the drug, says the injections for food allergies will cost the same as those for asthma, which amounts to \$2.900 for children and \$5,000 for adults each month. It's not clear yet whether insurers will cover Xolair for treating food allergies, but many do cover the drug for asthma. For the uninsured, Genentech offers a patient assistance program.

Anabelle's parents are still discussing with their allergist how Xolair might fit into her life. Anabelle completed the trial in 2022 and has not taken the drug for two years. "I would be willing to go back on it," she says. "Maybe with more treatment, it could become even less severe and make me less stressed about food."

Why Is Whiskey The Color Of Caramel?

No matter what type of whiskey you get, you can usually count on it having a rich, caramel hue. This may seem confusing, since most spirits tend to be clear unless they've been infused with something else, like in the case of spiced rum or sloe gin. Whiskey can come in all sorts of different flavors. but these aren't what give it that amber sheen.

Whiskey — much like its grainbased counterparts, vodka and gin — is clear after distillation. Its color comes during the aging process, in which the wooden barrel used for storage transfers pigments (as well as its earthy aroma and taste) to the liquid inside. Naturally, this means that, the longer whiskey ages in a barrel, the darker it will be, with shades varying from pale gold to reddish umber to deep treacle.

An even darker whiskey can be achieved through charring, a process in which the barrel is exposed to intense heat for up to a minute, depending on the distiller's preference. Some whiskeys, such as bourbon, are required to be made in a charred barrel, but this process is not universal. Charring is said to heighten the infusion of the wood's sweeter notes.

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leaving you with an end product that's not only darker but also more flavorful.

# **Types Of Wood Used For** Aging Whiskey

The type of wood used to age a whiskey will also influence its color, but this influence doesn't stop there. Most whiskeys are aged in oak barrels because of the bark's distinct flavor — Gallic acid from European oak provides spice, while vanillins in American white oak fittingly lend the spirit a vanilla flavor. Some whiskeys, like scotch, have to be matured in oak casks for at least three years to earn the categorization.

While oak is by far the most common wood used to age whiskey (why fix something

that isn't broken?), some categorizations allow for a bit of wiggle room. Irish and Canadian whiskies, for example, don't specify what type of wood should be used, which has led some to experiment. Method and Madness whiskey, for example, is aged in French chestnut barrels, and the brand behind this claims on its website that the product contains notes of spice and ripe banana, among other things.

It's even possible to find a white whiskey if you look hard enough. Also known as "new" whiskey, this powerful stuff skips the aging step altogether and is sometimes compared to moonshine because of its color and strength.

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# Airlines Raise Baggage Fees & Charging More At Airports

Airlines are raising their prices to check a bag — again. Just how much you it will cost you, however, depends on when you pay for the service.

United Airlines, American Airlines and JetBlue Airways are among the carriers that have raised the price to check bags this year. Each of them charge customers more if they check their bags at the airport or close to their departure compared with paying to check a bag online in advance.

Carriers are encouraging customers to pay to check their bags ahead of their flight, an approach the airlines argue will free up employees at check-in areas and get travelers to their gates faster.

Earlier this week, American Airlines raised its checked bag fees for the first time in more than five years and adopted the two-tiered strategy that United, JetBlue and several budget airlines already have.

American Airlines customers traveling in coach will pay \$35 to check a first bag for domestic flights if the service is booked online in advance, or \$40 if they purchase the option at the airport, the carrier said

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Tuesday. American Airlines previously charged \$30 for either service.

There are exemptions. Customers who have certain airline or other rewards credit cards, are traveling in a top-tier class or have elite frequent flyer status generally can check at least one bag for free on domestic or short international flights.

# Why Does It Cost Less To Check A Bag In Advance?

"It allows our team members to spend more time with customers who require additional assistance with their travel journey," said an American Airlines spokeswoman.

American this week also said it is reducing fees for slightly overweight bags, which used to force some travelers to remove items from their bags last-minute at the airport to meet the threshold.

The different fee tiers is an approach ultra-low-cost airlines already had to luggage fees.

"It incentivizes people to get the transaction out of way. It's easier for them, and honestly, it's easier for us," said Frontier Airlines CEO Barry Biffle.



"There are people who need legitimate assistance" at the airport.

The prices differ depending on demand and other factors. Most travelers who add on baggage pay the fee ahead of time, Biffle said.

United first started charging customers more for paying for checked bags at the airport in 2020. On Friday, the carrier said it was raising bag fees by \$5 for most flights in North America to \$35 if customers prepay online at least 24 hours before their flight, or \$40 otherwise, starting with bookings made on Feb. 24. A second checked bag will cost \$50, or \$45 at least 24 hours in advance.

# Why Are Airlines Raising Baggage Fees?

Luggage fees are a big moneymaker for airlines. In the first nine months of 2023, U.S. airlines brought in more than \$5.4 billion from baggage fees, up more than 25% from the same period of 2019, according to the Transportation Department's latest data.

Airlines have argued that higher costs such as labor and fuel, their biggest expenses, mean they had to raise bag fees.

"While we don't like increasing fees, it's one step we are taking to get our company back to profitability and cover the increased costs of transporting bags," JetBlue said in a statement about its latest increases. "By adjusting fees for added services that only certain customers use, we can keep base fares low and ensure customer favorites like seatback TVs and high-speed Wi-Fi remain free for everyone."

Southwest Airlines is an outlier among the large U.S. airlines. It allows customers to check two bags for free. "That's the way it's going to stay," Chief Operating Officer Andrew Watterson said.

"It does not cost us \$35, \$40 ... to handle a bag," Watterson said in an interview. Many customers on major airlines bring carry-on bags to avoid bag fees, but Watterson said that could slow down the operation, a big deal for Southwest, which he said tries to turn aircraft around for the next flight in 45 minutes, and even less for some of its smaller Boeing planes.

"It does smooth the operation for people to check it rather than bring it on," he said. "Overall, we think the benefit is a combination of some efficiencies but also customers coming back to us. A repeat customer business cannot be overstated. And when you treat your customers well, give them a fair policy, they come back over and over again."



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Kim Petras Calls Anti-Trans Views 'Plague Of The Planet' By David Vandygriff



Kim Petras has spoken out against anti-trans and sexist views, calling them "the plague of this planet".

One thing about Petras is that she'll always speak her mind in support of the LGBTQ+ community, and that's exactly what she did in a recent interview about her new album, Slut Pop Miami.

Speaking to the BBC about her latest EP, released on 14 February. The album discusses themes of sex-positivity and LGBTQ+ inclusivity in several of its tracks, with the singer telling the outlet that it's something she feels "strongly about".

"I've always been surrounded by incredible women," she began. "Even at school, the people who stood up for me and understood my condition were female," she said.

The Grammy award-winner went on to reject anti-trans and

sexist policies — which have been seen in the US with drag bans and anti-trans bills, to the UK government's alarming school guidance on teaching trans pupils, and Rishi Sunak's apparent disregard for murdered trans teen Brianna Ghee.

"I think men's desire to control women's bodies has been the plague of this planet forever," she said. "It very much goes hand in hand with being transgender. The people who wanted to forbid me to transition are the same ones who want to forbid women to have abortions or have sex and even make money from it."

Petras went on to credit Madonna for her work in Erotica (1992) and her book Sex, which she noted was "misunderstood...as just filth".

"But female sexuality isn't filth and shouldn't be written off like that. Neither is trans-feminine sexuality or anyone's sexuality. I think everyone should be equal.


"That's not to say Slut Pop [Miami] is a big political statement. It's supposed to just be fun, but the conversation it stirs up is a good thing."

Petras has previously been vocal about the anti-trans rhetoric in politics, telling Entertainment Weekly she is "extremely alarmed by it".

"Trans people have always been used to outrage people, but you have to remember that we're only one percent of the population." Continuing, Petras reflected on her childhood, noting that though "everyone would call [her] crazy," as a young trans person, being trans "wasn't so publicly demonized."

She added: "It's scary for all of us who just want to live a normal life."

But, again, that hasn't been confirmed or even rumored outside of Willam's statements in the podcast.

While some fans have questioned the continuity of Down Under due to low engagement about the series on social media, Ru's role on the show hasn't been a point of contention. So, as expressed by Alaska, definitely take this "rumor" with a grain of salt.

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
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# 'I Don't Need To Win Again' Drag Race Star Alaska

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






# Trump Appears To Be Showing Gross Signs Of Dementia

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
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
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# Housing Market's 'New Normal' 7% Mortgage Rates

Homebuying started to pick up during and after the holidays. Existing home sales increased 3.1% from December to January, according to the National Association of Realtors. Meanwhile, the inventory of unsold existing homes rose 2% from December to January, totaling around 1 million at the end of last month, slightly expanding buyers' options.

"While home sales remain sizably lower than a couple of years ago, January's monthly gain is the start of more supply and demand," NAR chief economist Lawrence Yun said in a news release Thursday.

"This might be the market's first steps toward a 'new normal'— a world where inventory remains rather scarce by pre-pandemic standards, but buyers are not


exactly swarming the doorway of every open house like in 2021 and early 2022," Zillow senior economist Jeff Tucker wrote in a blog post last week.

"More revived supply should help meet the returning demand, and head off the risk of renewed overheating," he said.

For the last few years, limited housing inventory and low rates have put the housing market on ice. Many homeowners who'd otherwise be eager to sell have hesitated to shake off the so-called golden handcuffs of mortgage rates as low as 2% or 3%.

That's finally starting to change, experts say — even though rates are now much higher, climbing again past 7% in recent weeks.

"Markets are just kind of recalibrating for the reality that the Fed is not going to cut interest rates right away," said Greg McBride, Bankrate's chief



In many cases, lifestyle factors — like empty-nesters looking to downsize or growing families hunting for more space — are pushing people to move, rather than wait around for sweeter deals.

"It's a new cycle for real estate," said Bess Freedman, CEO of Brown Harris Stevens, a real estate agency that operates throughout the East Coast. Already, she said, that shift in mindset has started to put some more "good opportunities out there. The people who are serious about it are getting into the market and taking advantage of it."

Experts expect buyers to have a bit more leverage this year compared to last. Data from Zillow shows that 1 in 5 home listings saw a price cut in



January, and the typical home was on the market for 29 days — longer than during last year's buying frenzy, but 19 days shorter than the average before the pandemic.

"We'll probably see several years of pretty tepid home price appreciation," McBride said.

Tucker gave a similar forecast. "Home prices will neither be skyrocketing nor plunging, but hopefully moving on a slow, boring trajectory like they historically have, and a little higher in spring than in winter," he wrote.

That could benefit those who are still browsing and saving up for a first home, McBride said. "If you get that promotion, you pay off your student loan debt, you really build up your savings, you're going to be in a position where home prices may not be much different two years from now than they are

today. But your financial position is a lot better," he said.

Buyers should take the time now to improve their credit and get pre-approved for a loan. Freedman also cautions against waiting for lower rates if they need to work with an you can afford to buy. If you happen to find something you love, she said, "you can probably negotiate well and get your financing in place, and vou won't rearet it."

With supply increasing, buyers stand to benefit from a little more time in the process than in years past, when countless buyers were waiving inspections and bidding well over asking prices just to be in the running.

Right now, "you have the ability to do appropriate due diligence. You don't need to feel pressed into making an offer on the spot, and if you do, that's a pretty good indicator that

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maybe you should walk away," McBride said. "Making the biggest financial decision of your life under duress rarely leads to success."

Sellers may increasingly find agent who's tapped into local trends to avoid having their homes sit on the market for a long time, Freedman said.

"If you're priced right, it's definitely a seller's market. If you're priced too high, you're just going to sit there," she said.

If a home you're trying to sell is languishing but you can't reduce the asking price, McBride recommends dangling other concessions. "Offering a temporary mortgage rate buy-down for the seller could be the type of incentive that gets a deal," he said.





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
