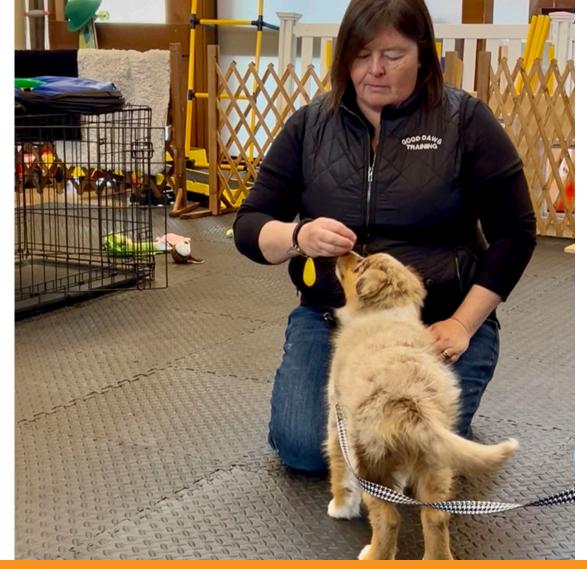

## THE SOCIALIZATION PERIOD

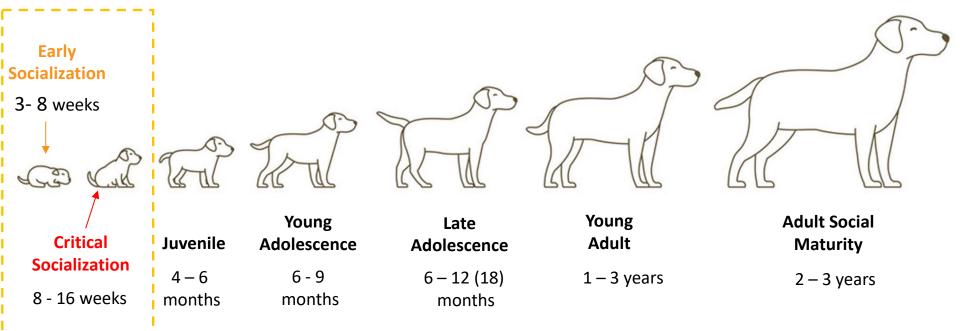
## This is a finite time period dramatically affecting your puppy's future personality!



3 to 16 weeks of age.



Puppies are developmentally open to new experiences.



#### WHY IS SOCIALIZATION IMPORTANT?



Improper socialization can cause lifelong deficits.

As dogs mature, they tend to become less accepting of new experiences. This is a normal survival mechanism.



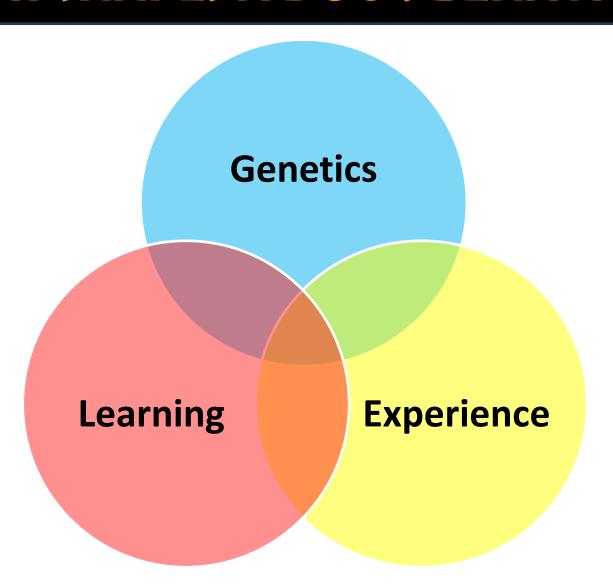
## **PUPPY SOCIALIZATION**

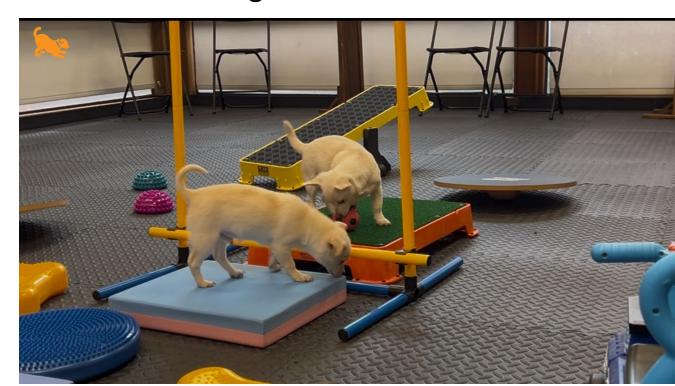

### FORGET "ALPHA" DOG CONCEPT

Your dog is not trying to dominate you or trying to "take over".

Behavior is about learning and consequences; not dominance.

Today the chew toy, tomorrow the WORLD!!

#### THE PROBLEM WITH REPRIMANDS

#### ... and why not to use them!

- Associated with the trainer.
- Does not guide your puppy on what to do.
- Creates fear and anxiety.
- Inhibits learning and creativity.
- Can cause and exacerbate behavior problems.
- If used to teach a behavior, the behavior is performed only to avoid punishment.

#### Dogs are...



Opportunistic.



Amoral – learn safe and unsafe, not right and wrong.



Self-centered.



Social.

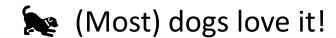


Chewers - everything is a potential chew toy.

#### WHAT IS CLICKER TRAINING?

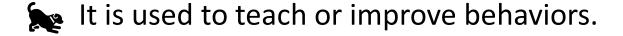














#### BENEFITS OF CLICKER TRAINING



- Fun for dog and owner.
- Promotes creativity.
- Dogs learn faster.
- Behaviors are retained.
- Performs the behavior because it's good for the dog.
- The speed of the click yields precision training.
- Dogs can start clicker training at any age.

#### CLICKER TRAINING IN FOUR STEPS

There are four basic steps involved:

- **1.** See the behavior
- Mark the behavior
- 3. Reinforce the pup/dog
- 4. Add a cue (once the behavior is predictable)

See the behavior

Mark the behavior

Reinforce the pup/dog

Add a cue as behavior is predictable

#### **CLICKER MECHANICS**

The first step is to develop good clicker mechanics:



Clicking and then treating.

Observing and marking behavior.

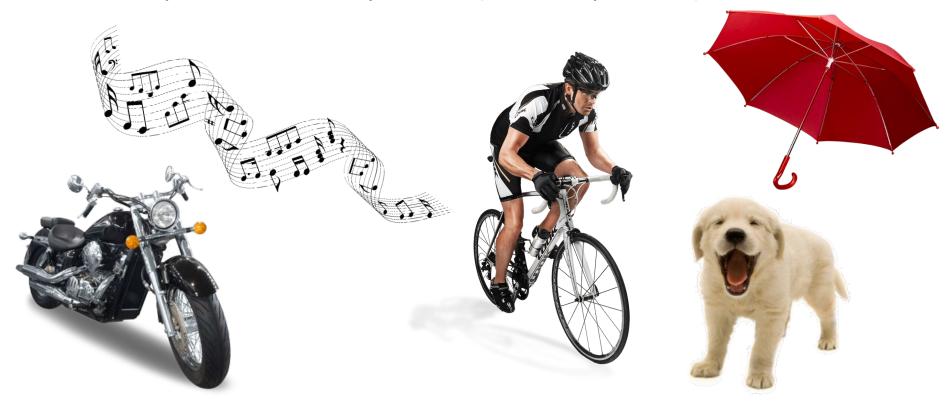
Putting it all together.



Socialization and exposure to **novelty** is ...



It's not simply about exposure; rather, it's about making exposure fun and positive (treats = positive).



During the socialization period, attempt to have one or two positive novel experiences **every day.** 





Always try to be *proactive* rather than reactive.

Assume your puppy could potentially be afraid of the situation and use treats liberally.

Prevent a fear response and make a positive association from

the start.



Puppies often sit to take it all in. New environments can be overwhelming.

#### Socialization and exposure is a lifelong process:

- Even a well-socialized young puppy might regress if positive exposure does not continue into adolescence.
- Between the ages of 5 months 2 years of age, dogs become more suspicious of novelty and things they have not had positive exposure to.
- Strive to have at least 3 to 4 positive experiences a week with the juvenile and adolescent dog.

Give lots and lots of treats!

Just seeing the novel stimuli is enough (puppy doesn't need to "meet" everybody and everything).

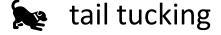
Avoid overwhelming your puppy

Should be fun; learn to read your dog's body language

### **CONFLICT BEHAVIORS**

yawning \*\*

#### WHAT IF A PUPPY IS FRIGHTENED?

- Use treats liberally!
- Allow your puppy to investigate at his own pace.
- Get your puppy to a non-stressful starting point.
- Avoid reprimanding.
- Provide guidance, direction, consistency, predictability, and security rather than resorting to reprimands.



Successful canine parents follow these simple rules:

Be fair: Understand the dog's perspective

Be a good teacher

**Provide clear communication** 

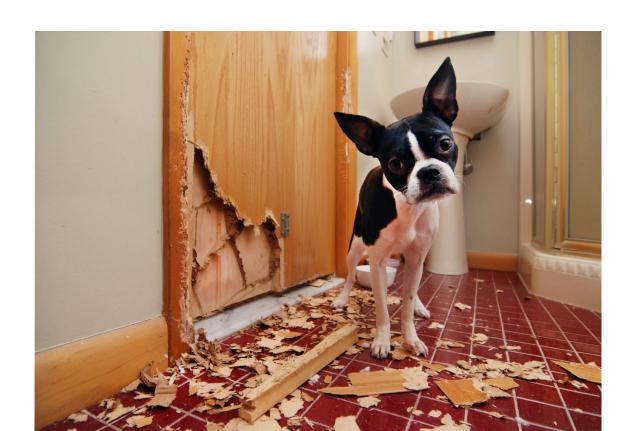
Be consistent and predictable

Be the dog's advocate

We'll look at each of these simple rules individually.

#### Be fair: Understand a dog's perspective

Dogs are amoral, opportunistic, self-centered, social, constantly learning, and exploring the world with their noses and mouths.



#### Be a good teacher

Control what your puppy learns and set your puppy up to succeed.

Guide the puppy into making the right decisions, rather than waiting for him to make the wrong ones.

Teach your puppy the correct behavior rather than waste time telling him what not to do.

#### **Provide clear communication**

- Communicate to your puppy clearly that he is performing a desired behavior.
- Catch him doing appropriate behaviors and reward him for it!
- A high rate of reinforcement will help a dog learn quickly.



#### Be consistent and predictable

- Inconsistency and unpredictability can cause fear and anxiety.
- Reprimanding a behavior (such as jumping) one day and rewarding it the next will confuse a puppy.
- Rules of the household should be established, and interactions should be consistent.



#### Be the dog's advocate

Strive to be aware of your puppy's body language and protect him from overwhelming situations. A dog cannot speak up for himself.

You might need to intervene and prevent negative experiences from time to time.





#### WHAT YOU NEED FOR PUPPY START RIGHT



A hungry, healthy pup/dog



Nylon leash and flat collar

(no flexi leashes or collars that tighten on the neck e.g. slip or prong collars, no e-collars)



harness (preferably front and back fastening)



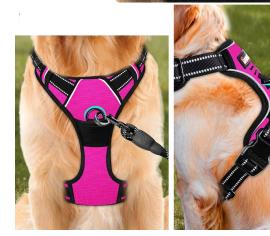
An assortment of **small**, **tasty**, **low to** medium value treats
