

CELEBRATING THE U.S. CONSTITUTION AND OUR FREEDOMS

On September 17, our nation celebrates the signing of one of the most important documents in human history – the Constitution of the United States. In 1787, 39 delegates at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia signed this founding document which provided a lasting framework for the government of our young country. Honoring the ideals of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution safeguarded individual rights and provided a structure in which "We the People" rule. Government was limited by separation of powers among three equal branches and was controlled by consent of the governed. Although it is under assault today, the U.S. Constitution still survives due to our constant vigilance, offering the promise of freedom.

Constitution Day gives us an opportunity to expand our knowledge of the U.S. Constitution and to share its vital importance with others. What activities can we do during September to highlight this founding document?

Begin by reading the Preamble to the Constitution with your family and friends. Encourage your children and grandchildren to memorize it:

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

It is up to each of us to understand the importance of the United States Constitution, to defend it, and to uphold its principles. According to AZ Quotes, one of our Founding Fathers, Samuel Adams, once stated, "The liberties of our country, the freedoms of our civil Constitution are worth defending at all hazards; it is our duty to defend them against all attacks. We have received them as a fair inheritance from our worthy ancestors. They purchased them for us with toil and danger and expense of treasure and blood. It will bring a mark of everlasting infamy on the present generation – enlightened as it is – if we should suffer them to be wrested from us by violence without a struggle, or to be cheated out of them by the artifices of designing men."



QUIZ & ANSWERS

1. What document did the Constitution of the United States replace? (Answer: The Articles of Confederation)

2. Why was it necessary to create this new document?

(Answer: Eleven years after our Founders dissolved our colonial bonds with Great Britain, 55 men met at a Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia to correct the flaws in the Articles of Confederation, our country's first written constitution. Those flaws left our new nation vulnerable to foreign threats and domestic concerns. The result after many painstaking months of debate and compromise was the Constitution of the United States of America. This new document gave the government enough power to protect the people from foreign and domestic threats but provided the separation of powers and checks and balances necessary to control the government's power and authority.)

3. Several delegates were reluctant to sign the document because they feared the new government would not protect individual rights. How were their concerns addressed? (Answer: The Bill of Rights, the first ten amendments to the Constitution, was adopted in 1791.)

4. What are The Federalist Papers and why are they important?

(Answer: According to Hillsdale College, "Thomas Jefferson described The Federalist Papers as 'the best commentary on the principles of government, which ever was written.' ... The Federalist Papers is a collection of newspaper essays written by James Madison, Alexander Hamilton, and John Jay in defense of the Constitution." They were written and published in 1787 and 1788 while states were debating whether or not to ratify the U.S. Constitution. By the end of June 1788, the Constitution had been ratified by nine states as required, and it became the law of the land the following March. The Bill of Rights, promised to reluctant states and ensuring basic protections of our liberty, was adopted in December, 1791.)

5.What powers do Articles I, II, and III describe in the U.S. Constitution? (Answer: The first three articles of the U.S. Constitution create the separation of powers and checks and balances vital to preventing tyranny. Article I details the legislative powers, Article II details the executive powers, and Article III details the judicial powers.)

6.What rights are guaranteed by the First Amendment? (Answer: Freedom of religion, speech, the press, peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.)

CITAEN RESIDENT?

In recent years, Constitution Day has shared the spotlight with Citizenship Day. Naturalization ceremonies are conducted throughout the United States on Constitution Day, administering the Oath of Allegiance and welcoming immigrants as new citizens of America.

In this ceremony, applicants thought to be of good moral character and attached to the principles of the United States Constitution are asked to recite the Oath of Allegiance. They must renounce fidelity to foreign princes, potentates, and sovereignties and pledge allegiance to the United States of America. They promise to bear arms in service to our country and to do work of national importance if required by law.

As these new citizens affirm their loyalty to the United States, we may ask a question that applies to all Americans. "What are the responsibilities of a good citizen?"

To our Founding Fathers, an informed citizenry was vital. US Immigration lists these additional characteristics:

- Support and defend the Constitution
- Stay informed of the issues affecting your community
- Participate in the democratic process
- Respect and obey federal, state, and local laws
- Respect the rights, beliefs, and opinions of others
- Participate in your local community
- Pay income and other taxes honestly, and on time, to federal, state, and local authorities
- Serve on a jury when called upon
- Defend the country if the need should arise

A PEW Research surveys adds:

- Know the Pledge of Allegiance
- Display the American flag

As we look around us and watch news media, it is apparent that many of the characteristics of good citizenship and following the Constitution are in jeopardy. Victor Davis Hanson wrote a book several years ago entitled *The Dying Citizen: How Progressive Elites, Tribalism, and Globalization Are Destroying the Idea of America*. He explains how the distinction between "citizen" and "resident" is fading.

It is up to us to honor and defend the Constitution of the United States and to demonstrate the true meaning of "good citizenship."

Thank you, Debra, for inviting us into your lovely home. Your leadership and generosity are greatly appreciated!












Book: Original Sin: President Biden's Decline, It's Cover-Up and His Disastrous Choice to Run Again by Jake Tapper and Alex Thompson
