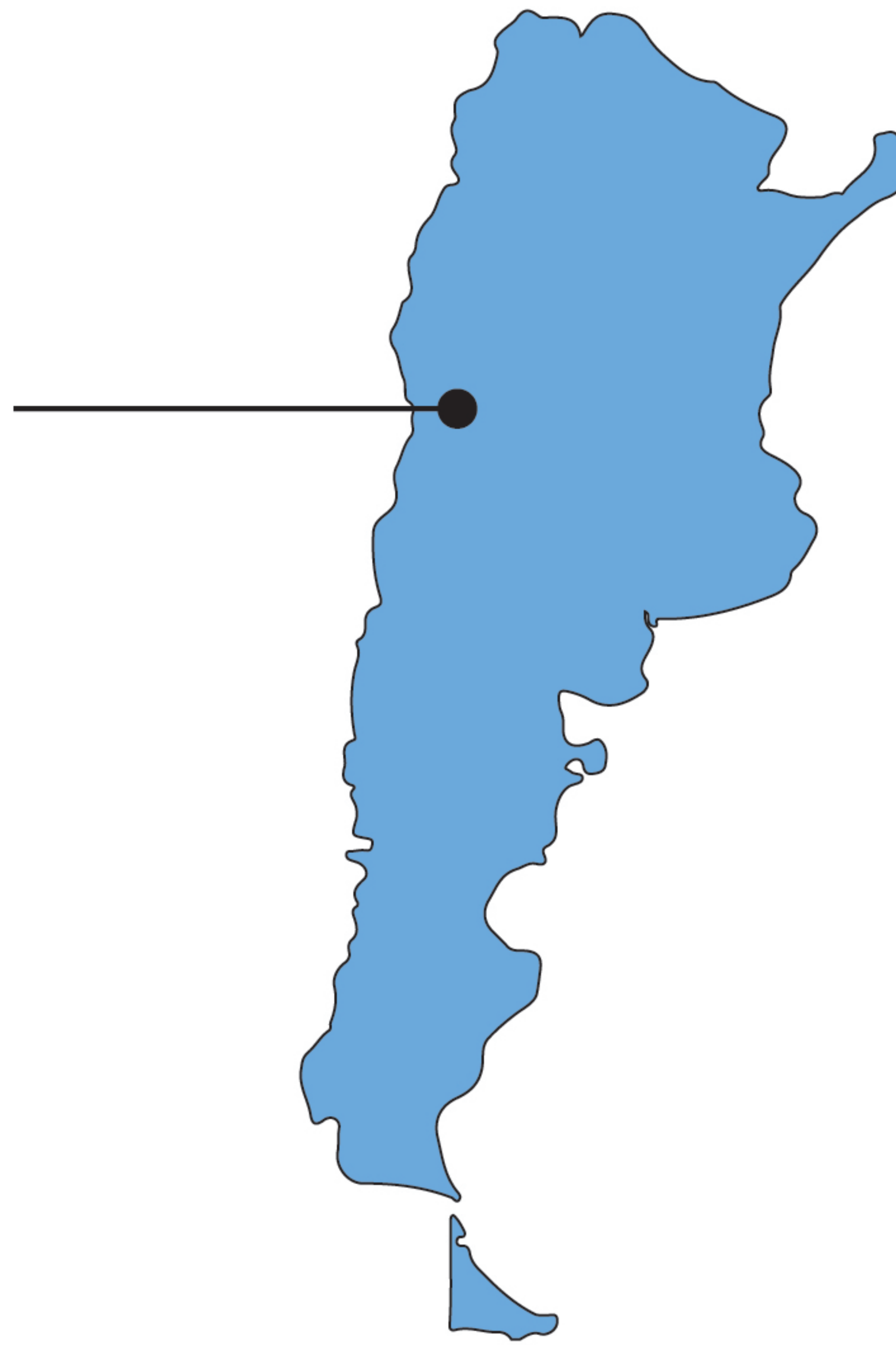

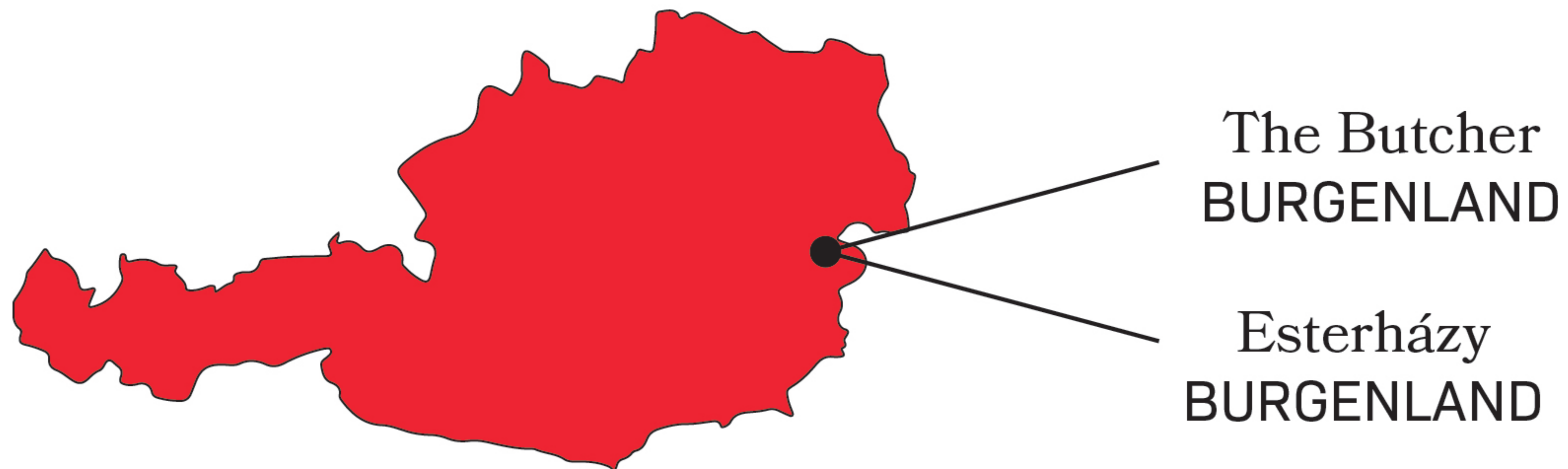
- The most important wine province and one of the main producing centres in the world.

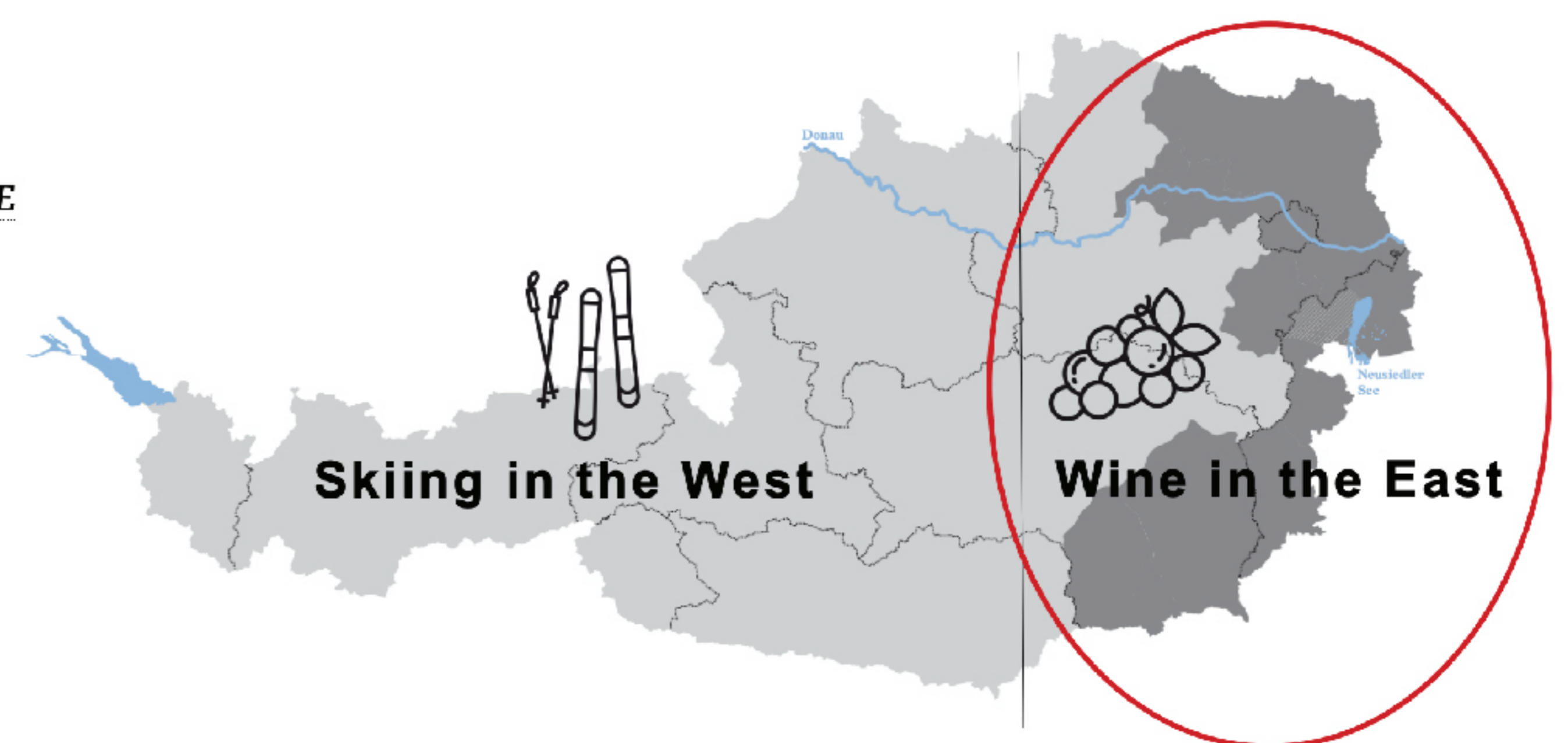

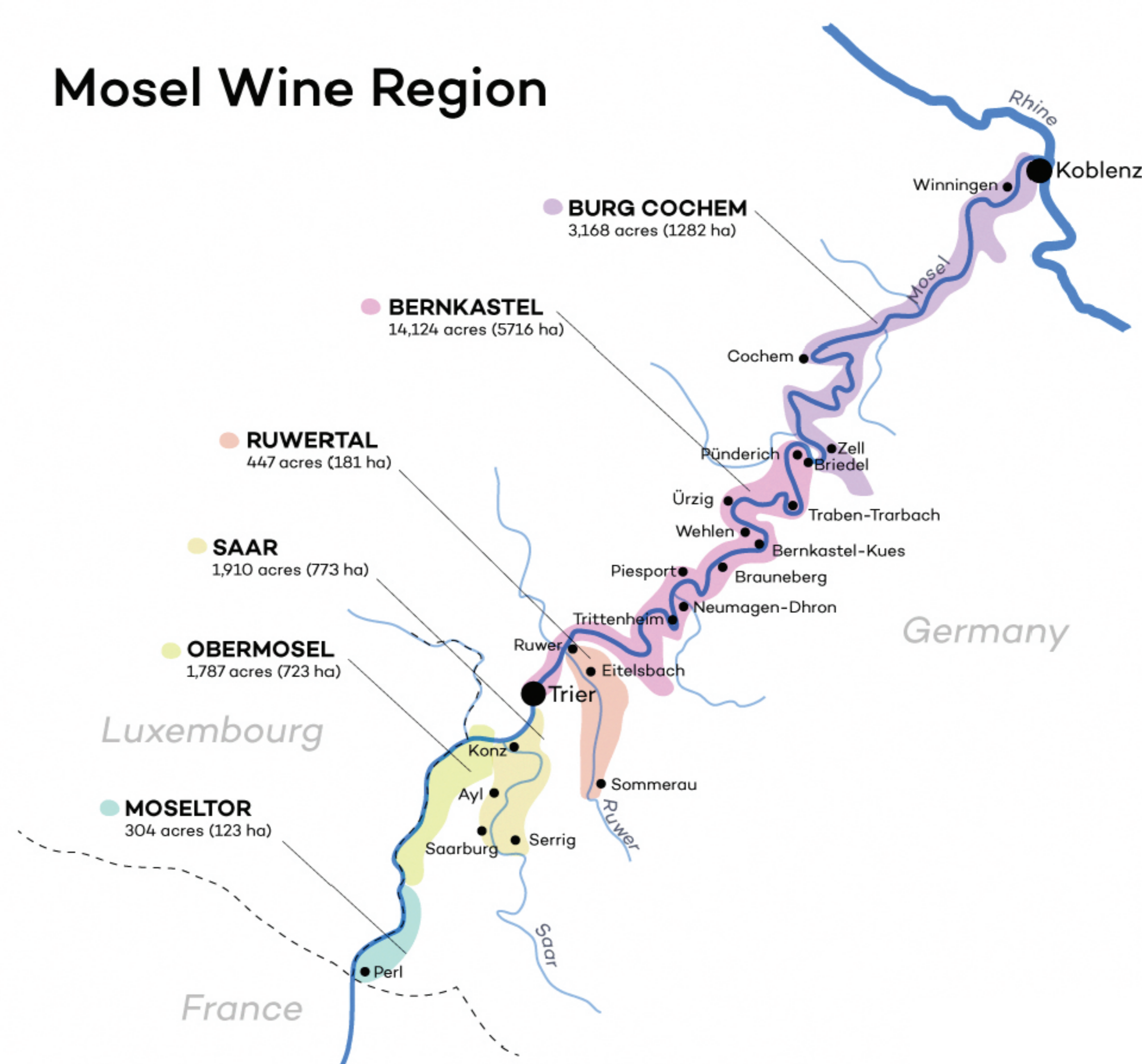

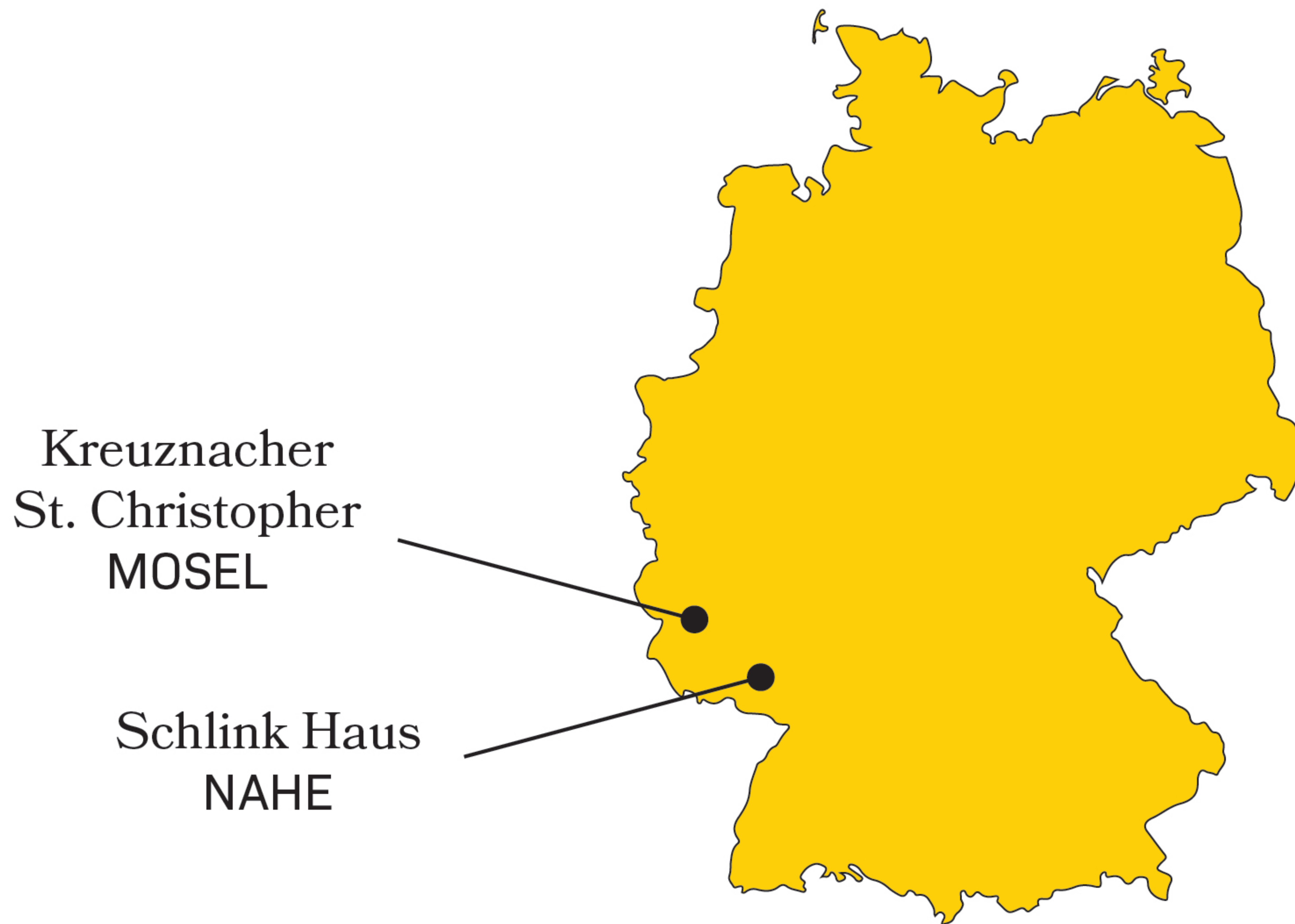


Mosel is famous for storybook-pretty villages and racy, delicate whites. South-facing steep vineyards of slate soil retain heat for ripening Riesling grapes.

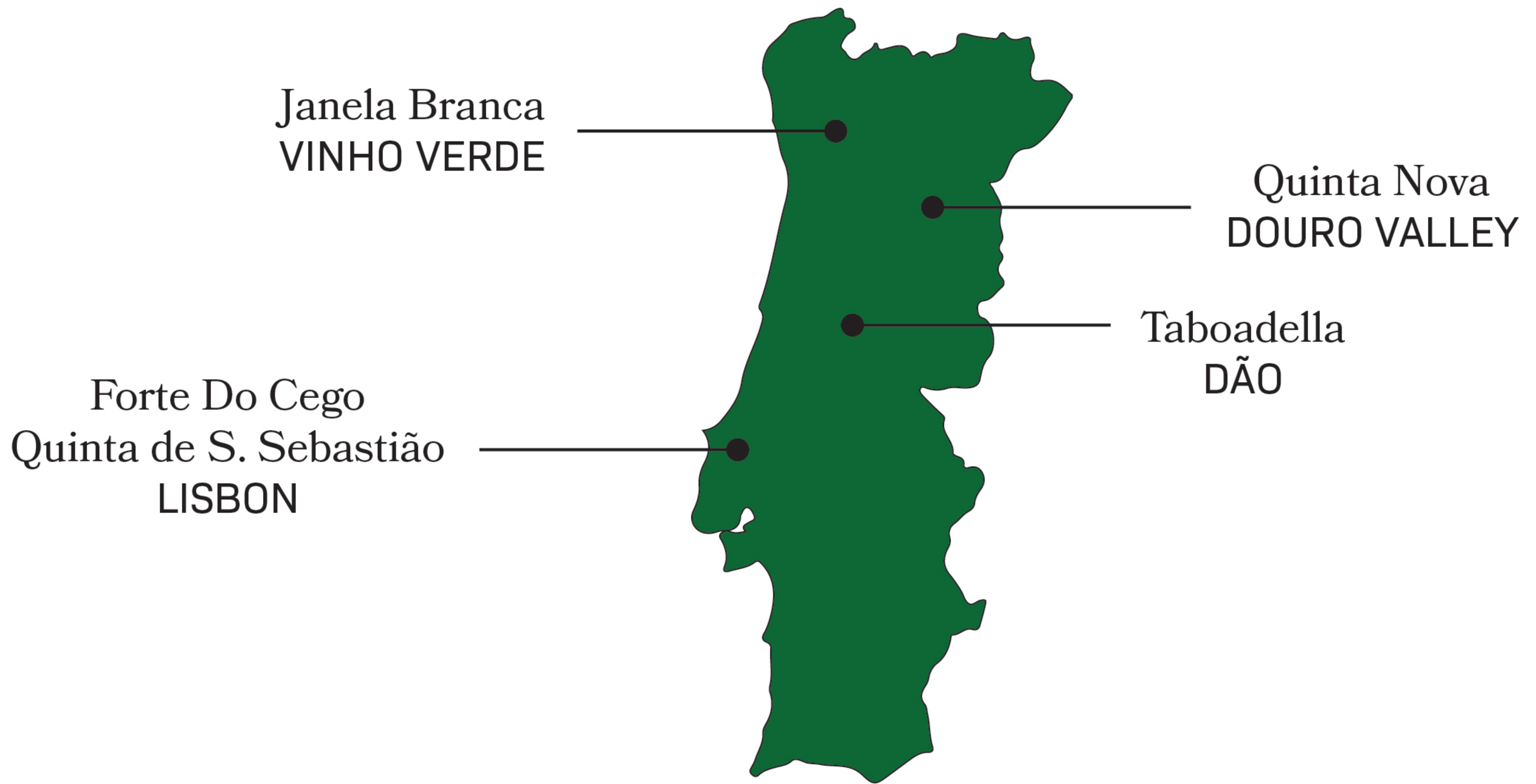
