# Curtis Daye February 1, 1952 - August 10, 2022

The WDHA Board of Directors was saddened to hear the passing of a long time WDHA member this past August 10: Curtis Daye.

Curtis was a member of WDHA for several decades, serving in a number of volunteer positions, including President of the club. Earlier in his association with the club, Curtis had been



President of WDHA when it was a coalition of three regions with an executive governing board. Curtis was especially helpful with activities held at the facilities in Oshkosh, including both Sunnyview and Glen Valley Farms. In assisting at the shows at Sunnyview, Curtis frequently provided tractor and ring drag; performed the necessary tasks throughout the show; and managed the shavings concession. He provided storage space for the dressage ring until we found a permanent place for it.

Curtis was creative in suggesting attractions for exhibitors, including invitations to vendors, silent auction and live bid auction sales, and exhibitor parties. He coordinated a T.A.I.L. program with volunteers from his workplace. He was a wealth of contacts for needed show services, including the food stand, shavings providers, and medical help.

Curtis owned and bred some very nice horses over the years; and frequently entered them in the WDHA Futurity Program. And he liked to share, donating limited edition prints and similar items to the WDHA Banquet Silent Auction and insisting others join him at special events, such as the Varian clinics, the Scottsdale show, and the U.S. Nationals when held in Louisville.

Curtis's enthusiasm for the Arabian horse and events promoting the breed was seldom rivaled. He will be missed.

# General Session I Convention Highlight Video - <a href="https://youtu.be/MagsSwztXQw">https://youtu.be/MagsSwztXQw</a>

President Deborah Johnson started out the General Session with the "State of the Association" (https://www.arabianhorses.org/export/content.export/nat-

show/convention/22Conv GS1 State Association.pdf) and informed membership that the



lawsuit brought by the Purebred Arabian Trust (PAT) is going to trial in December of 2022. AHA has an exclusive license to operate and maintain the Arabian Horse Registry (AHR) for purebred Arabian horses in the United States. The terms of this license agreement are defined in the Merger agreement and the License and Security Agreement between the AHA and the PAT. As a part of the agreement, AHA pays the PAT a 1/3 royalty of Purebred Registry income. When purebred horses are registered at the Arabian Horse Association PAT receives a portion of the fees. The PAT has again sued AHA, this time to terminate the purebred licensing agreement and AHA's management of the Arabian Horse Registry. PAT is again leveraging these royalty funds in the latest lawsuit against the AHA in what we believe is in direct opposition to our members' interests.

!! UPDATE!! as of December 8th "The Trial is Over -AHA Prevails", the court has determined that, just as the Arabian Horse Association has maintained for the past year and a half, throughout the legal proceedings, there was no evidence of a breach of contract or long-term inoperability that would entitle the PAT to maintain the registry.

Good news is no club charters were to be revoked for 2023.

AHA Operations FY18-FY20 Working Capital Report. Working capital is a measure of liquidity and of short-term financial health. Benefits of strong working capital include: Flexibility in operations planning; Enhances financial management; and Improved ability to react to both adversity and opportunities.

potential for a recession; Need for strengthening clubs and regions; Employee retention & compensation; Moving to a new & smaller office; Technology Improvements as Ongoing migration from legacy Oracle 8i platform, National show management systems & scoring programs, Worldwide ongoing cyber security, and Migration to the Multiview Cloud.

USEF conducted one-on-one meeting with affiliate leadership through the year along with holding group affiliate meetings to collectively engage and encourage discussion across all affiliate organizations. A topic of main discussion was "Looking to the Future of Social License or Court of Public Opinion." Social License to Operate (SLO) represents an intangible, implicit agreement between the public and an industry or group. The public may approve of an activity, in which case it can proceed with minimal formalized restrictions, or it may disapprove, and this may herald legal restrictions, or even an outright ban. Public scrutiny continues to grow, and as a result, competition and sporting activities involving horses continue to be endangered. It's important to remember that the general public sees little difference between and among equine activities. A scandal in racing or rodeo threatens the very existence and future of competition for virtually every breed and discipline. Some activities considered "normal" in your own breed or discipline might easily be viewed by the public as cruel or inhumane. We must look forward, recognize the changing environment, preserve the best of tradition and combine it with what's best for the future. The future of equestrian sport is in all of our hands and it's our collective



duty to protect our participants, our horses, and our sport.

**Julie Broadway provided the American Horse Council (AHC)** report and it is for me the most interesting and close to home report as it is the mission of the American Horse Council to protect and strengthen the Equine Industry. AHC continues to maintain horses as "livestock" for a number a reasons as; Horses are used commercially for agriculture and recreation; US Dept of Agriculture protection of herd health through programs to monitor diseases and conduct research (Government Funding programs); Tax benefits – farm tax exemptions and depreciation; Liability laws apply to livestock but not companion animals; Husbandry and humane treatment laws might not apply if horses were companion animals; Protection against animal rights groups who would like to eliminate animal agriculture. Trends since the last Economic Impact Study in 2017 are: Migration from urban to rural; Remote work patterns; Lack equitable youth sports programming that serves children at scale; Shifting demographics, rise of obesity and a heightened emphasis on healthy living; Diversity, Equality, Inclusion & Belonging; and Growth in horse populations on BLM lands and Native American lands.
