




Diverse Populations Served: Female




First, we look at the percentage of women enrolled at forprofit colleges in the Mid-Atlantic Region in the 2022-23 school year. At less-than-two-year schools, for-profit colleges lead the way in female enrollment with 72% of students enrolled identifying as female. Female enrollment was roughly 59-60% across sectors for two-year schools.

Across all institutional levels, CECU member schools showed an average enrollment of approximately 52% women.




Diverse Populations Served: Students of Color



For-profit colleges had the highest enrollment of students that are Hispanic, ranging from 17% at four-year colleges to 21% at two-year and lessthan-two-year colleges. For-profit colleges also had the highest enrollment of students that are Black across all school types, with less-than-twoyear colleges leading the way at 43% Black enrollment.


At CECU member schools in The Mid-Atlantic Region, 55% of enrolled students identified as Black or Hispanic.



Diverse Populations Served: Low-Income

Other areas of underserved populations accommodated by for-profit colleges in the Mid-Atlantic Region include low-income students. For-profit colleges served the highest percentage of low-income students in the 2022-23 school year with 71% of enrolled students at less-than-two-year schools and 59% of enrolled students at four-year and two-year schools qualifying as low-income.

CECU member schools in the Mid-Atlantic Region enrolled 60% low-income students across all institutional levels.



Diverse Populations Served: First-Generation

For-profit colleges also served a large share of firstgeneration students in the 2022-23 school year, leading the way in first-generation enrollment with 50% of students at four-year schools and 53% of students at two-year schools being among the first generation in their family to attend college.



CECU member schools had a student population with 55% first-generation students.




Diverse Populations Served: Adult Learners

Adults aged 25+ are another key population served by for-profit colleges in the Mid-Atlantic Region as schools in this sector aim to adapt to the needs of older, more experienced learners that may have competing priorities as they've gotten older.

For-profit colleges showed the highest enrollment of adult learners in the 2022-23 school year at four-year (64%) and two-year (55%) schools. CECU member schools showed an enrollment of 34% adult learners.




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
Degrees Awarded in the Mid-Atlantic Region

Academic year 2021–22

For-profit colleges conferred 80% of less-than-two-year degrees/ certificates across sectors in the 2021-22 school year. They also conferred 17% of two-year degrees/certificates and 5% of four-year degrees/certificates.



Among Black and Hispanic students, for-profit colleges conferred 88% of less-than-two-year degrees/certificates. They also accounted for 22% of two-year degrees/certificates and 9% of fouryear degrees/certificates conferred to Black and Hispanic students.

The degrees/certificates conferred by for-profit colleges in the Mid-Atlantic Region align very well with the estimated annual nationwide worker shortages in occupations requiring some college or a postsecondary nondegree award. Healthcare is by far the occupation most in need of workers. In helping to meet this need, for-profit colleges in the Mid-Atlantic Region confer 79% of degrees/certificates to medical and clinical assistants.

Installation, maintenance, and repair occupations are also in need of workers. The Mid-Atlantic Region for-profit schools provide large percentages of degrees/certificates in the following fields to meet that need:

- Airframe Mechanics and Aircraft Maintenance Technology/Technician (97%)
- Plumbing Technology/Plumber (86%)
- Electrician (84%)
- HVACR Technology/Technician (53%)
- Welding Technology/Welder (25%)
- Automobile/Automotive Mechanics Technology/Technician (13%)
