




Diverse Populations Served: Female




First, we look at the percentage of women enrolled at forprofit colleges in New Jersey in the 2022-23 school year. Forprofit colleges lead the way at institutions conferring primarily four-year degrees and less-than-two-year degrees with 80% and 67% female enrollment respectively.

Across all institutional levels, CECU member schools boasted an average enrollment of approximately 55% women.




Diverse Populations Served: Students of Color



Additionally, for-profit colleges conferring primarily four-year and two-year degrees had the highest enrollment of students that are Black (56%) and Hispanic (64%).


At CECU member schools in New Jersey, 66% of enrolled students were Black or Hispanic.



Diverse Populations Served: Low-Income

Low Income Other areas of underserved populations accommodated by for-profit colleges in New Jersey include low-income students. For-profit colleges served the highest percentages of low-income students in the 2022-23 school year at four-year colleges (56%), two-year colleges (68%), and lessthan-two-year colleges (76%).

CECU member schools in New Jersey enrolled 65% low income students across all institutional levels.




Diverse Populations Served: First-Generation

For-profit colleges also served a large share of firstgeneration students in the 2022-23 school year, leading the way in first-generation enrollment at schools conferring primarily four-year (52%), two-year (52%), and less-than-two-year (59%) degrees.



CECU member schools alone had a student population with 59% first-generation students.




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Diverse Populations Served: Adult Learners

Adults aged 25+ are another key population served by for-profit colleges in New Jersey as schools in this sector aim to adapt to the needs of older, more experienced learners that may have competing priorities as they've gotten older.

For-profit colleges conferring primarily four-year and two-year degrees lead the way in enrollment of adult learners in the 2022-23 school year with 64% and 63% of enrolled students aged 25 years or older, respectively.




Degrees Awarded in New Jersey

Academic year 2021–22

For-profit colleges conferred the majority of less-than-two-year degrees/certificates across all sectors in the 2021-22 school year. They also conferred 17% of two-year degrees/certificates and 3% of four-year degrees/certificates.



Among Black and Hispanic students, for-profit colleges conferred the majority of less-than-two-year degrees/certificates. They also accounted for 23% of two-year degrees/certificates and 5% of four-year degrees/certificates conferred to Black and Hispanic students.



For-profit colleges contribute significantly to the workforce in New Jersey, conferring over 95% of degrees/certificates in the following fields:

- Aesthetician/Esthetician and Skin Care Specialist
- Nail Technician/Specialist and Manicurist
- Barbering/Barber
- Phlebotomy Technician/Phlebotomist
- Massage Therapy/Therapeutic Massage
- Automobile/Automotive Mechanics Technology/Technician
- Medical/Clinical Assistant

In-Demand Career Training in the US: Non-Degree

Projected Shortage of Workers by Group



The degrees/certificates conferred by for-profit colleges in New Jersey align very well with the estimated annual nationwide worker shortages in occupations requiring some college or a postsecondary nondegree award. Healthcare is by far the occupation most in need of workers. For-profit colleges in New Jersey confer a large percentage of degrees/certificates in the following healthcare-related fields:

- Medical/Clinical Assistants (96%)
- Dental Assisting/Assistant (85%)
- Licensed Practical/Vocational Nurse (70%)
- Registered Nursing/Registered Nurse (20%).
