The Laurels Preserve and the Covered Bridges:

The ecological and historic values of the Laurels Preserve have been well documented, particularly the spring-fed, high quality waters of Buck and Doe Runs; the expansive, mature hardwood forests; exceptional wildlife habitat, and several rare species of flora and fauna. The Conservancy's management of the property protects this wealth of natural, cultural and historic resources. In 2007, the Laurels Preserve and King Ranch area along with the Stroud Preserve were designated as an Important Bird Area. This recognition for the area is primarily due to significant numbers of breeding grassland bird species that are increasingly rare across the Commonwealth. The woodlands, wetlands, and open fields in the Laurels Preserve and adjacent properties provide important habitat diversity for many birds. The Laurels Preserve is a wonderful place to enjoy nature and is open to all Conservancy members for hiking, jogging, bird watching, and horse and bicycle riding.

When the Conservancy became the owner of the Laurels Preserve, it was entrusted with the care of two unique covered bridges. Located in the heart of horse country, these iconic structures contribute to the aesthetic quality and solitude of the Laurels. The Speakman Bridge #2 (also known as the Mary Ann Pyle Bridge) spans Buck Run. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Built in 1881, this Queenpost Truss bridge was named for the daughter of James Pyle. The Speakman Bridge #2 once served the Jona-

thon Speakman gristmill, and was later part of the King Ranch. Its companion, the Hayes Clark Bridge, was originally a Burr Truss bridge and was rebuilt as a Queenpost Truss bridge by Buck & Doe Run Valley Farms in 1971 to replace the original bridge that burned in 1963. The Hayes Clark Bridge crosses the Doe Run.

Resource Conservation...

A study of the bridges' structural integrity undertaken by the Brandywine Conservancy and its engineering consult ants in early 2012 indicated that the bridges are starting to fail due to decay. Specifically, the bottom chordbearing point of the Speakman Bridge #2 is crushing and causing the bridge to twist. In addition, several stringers under both bridges are showing signs of decay and crushing. Based on advice from the engineers, safety barriers at entrances to both bridges and signs were posted limiting access to pedestrian use. The Conservancy received appropriate permits from the Department of Environmental Protection to improve a downstream crossing for an alternate route for horses and carriages. In addition to working with the engineer, the Conservancy engaged certified historic architects Frens & Frens to ensure that the reconstruction maintains the historic characteristics of the two bridges.

The goal of the proposed work is to repair the Speakman Bridge #2 and Hayes Clark covered bridges so that all user groups may enjoy them safely. Significant repair and protected by a conservation easement. restoration is needed to ensure the structural integrity so that that they will continue to be a fixture on the landscape for many years to come. Complete repair to the bridges will restore open transportation allowing horse and carriage crossing in addition to pedestrian use.

The project is estimated to be completed in approximately six months, including six weeks to order and receive the materials and 120 days to complete the work once construction begins. Exact dates may vary depending on funding and weather conditions.

Background on the Brandywine Conservancy:

For more than 40 years, the Brandywine Conservancy has been a leading local and national advocate for responsible land use, open space preservation, and water protection. Its Environmental Management Center focuses on integrating conservation with economic development through its Land Stewardship and Municipal As sistance programs. As a result, the Conservancy holds 445 conservation easements. It has permanently protected more than 45,000 acres of farmland, forests, water resources, historic sites, and scenic vistas in Chester and Delaware Counties, Pennsylvania, and in New Castle County, Delaware. The Conservancy's easement holdings in Pennsylvania represent 17% of the total acreage under easement in the entire Commonwealth.

The King Ranch Project:

In the early 1980s, the Brandywine Conservancy and a group of investors collaborated to buy and save over 5,400 acres of the Buck and Doe Run



Valley Farms property. Owned at the time by—and known locally as—the King Ranch, it was the largest contiguous privately owned property in Chester County, Pennsylvania. The Conservancy recognized the environmental importance of the unspoiled Buck and Doe Runs and made repeated efforts over more than a decade to protect the property. In 1984, the Buck and Doe Associates Limited Partnership was formed. In the largest conservation project in the Brandywine watershed, the partnership donated conservation easements to the Conservancy, permanently protecting 4,596 acres of natural, scenic and historic resources of the property. The partnership donated in fee title an additional 771 acres to the Conservancy to create the Laurels Preserve, which is also

Many of the original investors, still own property in the King Ranch area today. We are grateful to the 21 partners for their foresight and generosity in making this shared conservation goal a reality. We also greatly appreciate the role of the Buck and Doe Trust who worked toward a common interest in conserving the local countryside. The Trust helped raise endowment funds for the Laurels and was involved in the development of the conservation easement that now protects the Preserve. They also partnered with the Conservancy to encourage local landowners to conserve their properties and have been an active influence in the community.

The Conservancy's conservation easement on the former ranch lands permanently protects from development thousands of acres of grasslands and woods, plant and animal species, and, most importantly, the streams that run through the property. Over eight miles of the Buck and Doe Runs and many more miles of smaller streams, all draining to the West Branch of the Brandywine Creek, are located there. This remarkable water source was and still is critical to maintaining the quality of the Brandywine Creek, the drinking water supply for the City of Wilmington, Delaware and numerous communities in Pennsylvania.


