Oh, the Holidays!

This past Friday I hung up our Christmas lights on our house. It seems like just last week I had put them away. This time of year, we do many things that can threaten our wellbeing, homes and lives but I don't want to sound like the Grinch. This time of year is my absolute favorite time. JeanAnn and I are already listening to Christmas music, and we started watching our collection of Christmas movies. One of my favorites is called "Fitzwilly." It's about a butler who provides for those he loves through swindling department stores. And then, there is Christmas Vacation. How crazy is Clark Griswold? How many people do you know who do things like good ol' Clark? Though both are comedies, they are great examples of how not to celebrate the holidays.

Think about what crazy things we do when celebrating the Holidays. How many of you deep-fry your Thanksgiving turkey? Do you buy a real tree and decorate it with electrical lights? What about hanging lights on your house? How far do you push safety while on a ladder or on the roof of your home? We have come a long way since the Victorian days of old when candles were used to light the tree. Who in their right mind would fill a pot with three gallons of oil, heat to 375 degrees over an open flame (many times in their garage) or hang off the side of a ladder to place that one last staple to hold the lights in place on their house just so they don't have to come down and move the ladder that one last time? Or move a tree that has been recently cut down into their home, placing it in a spot of prominence and, as I said, decorate it with electrical cords and incandescent lights that if we held in our hands could cause third degree burns, and finally, they place presents wrapped in combustible material under that same tree. We do many unusual things this time of year to celebrate with family and friends.

Here are a few safety tips to keep our holidays wonderful and memorable for all the right reasons and not create memories of catastrophic events like Clark Griswold experienced. How old are your lights? Did you know that the lights we use to decorate our homes and trees have a 90-day safety life? Most manufacturers put warning labels on the light sets that explain that the lights are not meant to be used more than 90 days, consecutively. So if your lights are older than 3 years, consider purchasing new LEDs for you house and tree. Not only will LEDs save you money on your utility lights, but they produce almost no heat, certainly not enough to cause injury or fire.

For old lights, make sure the jackets are intact and that there are no shorts in the wire as this can cause open sparks and arcing, leading to fires. Make sure the tree you purchase is as fresh as possible, since many trees in the lots are cut down a week or two before Thanksgiving. Take your hand, grasp a limb and pull towards yourself. Look at the number of needles that are in your hand. If it appears to be excessive, move on to the next tree. Also, when you bring your tree home, try to get all of the dry needles out of the tree.

When using turkey fryers, fill the pot with water. Place the turkey into it and premeasure the level of oil necessary to cook your bird. You don't want hot oil overflowing from the pot when you put in the turkey. Always make sure to completely dry your bird off and make sure there is no accumulation of water in the cavity. Adding water to hot oil is dangerous. At the very least, it can

cause popping of the oil which may cause severe burns or even cause a boil over that ignites into a ball of fire once it hits the open flame of the burner. Place the fryer in an open area, at least 25 feet away from your house and on a surface that is not combustible.

When decorating your home with lights, make sure your ladder is on level and solid footing. If you reach out to the side, avoid side loading your ladder which may cause it to fall, likely causing yourself injury. It might make you laugh when Clark falls off his ladder but if you fall from the upper stories of your home, you're not going to be laughing. In fact, we will most likely be calling for an air ambulance to transport you to the Trauma Center in Roseville.

Finally, remember that when shopping, either online or in a brick and mortar store, protect your ID and source of payment. Be careful when withdrawing money from ATMs and only do so during the daytime and ensure that when you walk away from the ATM, you have your card, that your transaction has been completed and all information into your account has been closed.

Most of all, enjoy the holidays! Remember the reason for the season, remember those less fortunate than us and reach out if you can. Sometimes just recognizing one's humanity is enough to change a life. JeanAnn and I want to wish you all a wonderful Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas filled with love, joy, the laughter of children and the wonderful blessings of a loving God who sent his Son for us. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!

Some Thoughts from the Editor

This month we are rerunning a very pertinent article from former Mosquito Byte editor, Candy Lupient, regarding Mosquito driving etiquette. I think that everyone has noticed how much the traffic has increased on Mosquito Road recently. I was hit head-on and my car totaled by someone who was distracted for just a few seconds and swerved into my lane. Driving Mosquito Road takes serious attention! While the plans for the new bridge are moving along, the road will remain a challenging drive even after the bridge is built. Here is her article which I hope will be a good reminder for long-term residents and informative for our newer neighbors.

Mosquito Driving Etiquette

Like many neighbors, I've noticed traffic on Mosquito Road has become not only more abundant but also much faster. To me it seems just a matter of time before two of the overly aggressive drivers meet each other from opposing directions, with possibly tragic results. Please slow down and drive defensively. As so many people are moving on and off the hill, I will periodically run an article concerning Mosquito driving etiquette. It would be helpful if you would share these rules of the road with expected guests and new neighbors. Many problems could be avoided simply with increased awareness. Here are a few suggestions and your Mosquito Byte editor welcomes your suggestions also!

1. Drive on the right side of the road. ALWAYS ASSUME there is oncoming traffic.
2. Yield to UPHILL traffic; they have the right of way.
3. Dim your headlights to oncoming traffic at night.

4. Keep a good distance from the car ahead of you. They may need to stop suddenly for wildlife. PLEASE DON'T TAILGATE.
5. Drive at a safe speed for the conditions. If it hasn't rained for a while, the roads will have oil on them which, when it rains, will be nothing but a slick surface. Ice is always a risk in the winter, especially on some of our tight curves.
6. If you have an aggressive driver behind you, find a safe place to pull over and let them pass. PLEASE DO NOT PICK A BLIND CORNER TO PULL OVER. Remember that the car behind you cannot see as far ahead as you may be able to. Choose a nice open stretch of road, as much as possible. When re-entering the road, beware of sharp road edges which may cause punctured tire sidewalls. If you are the one wanting to pass, give the car ahead of you time and space to pull over to a safe spot. Remember that drivers may not always pull over for you. These are usually people who are newcomers and not aware.
7. Remember, only one car at a time on the bridge. Always look to see if there is already a car on the bridge or a car waiting on the other side. Take turns! Neither side has the right of way.
8. Going toward town, if there is already traffic on or waiting for the bridge, pull all the way down to the guardrail nearest the bridge entrance, leaving room for exiting traffic. If you stop at the top of the curve on the Mosquito side, it makes it difficult for the car going up the hill to pass.
9. If you are expecting a large delivery, ensure that the company knows that following GPS directions to take Mosquito Road is a recipe for a painful situation (for the driver and residents.) Confirm with the driver that he knows the situation BEFORE he gets stuck on the bridge.
10. Smile and wave! I believe it encourages courteous drivers. It's a "Mosquito Thing"! Happy Holidays!
