<u>Association Challenges Spark Remarkably High Interest to Serve on the SCPOA Board.</u>

Nominations closed December 14th for the four open seats on the SCPOA Board. At first it appeared that only one incumbent was willing to serve another term. Fortunately, in the last week, eight more folks were nominated to serve on the board. This is really good! The Association will have a more

choices from which to elect their board members. I thank them all, because without their service, Swansboro would not be this beautiful place here in the sierra foothills. Interestingly, all candidates were self-nominations! This unusually high level of interest to serve on the SCPOA Board appears to indicate that folks may want a change of direction. The candidates are:

Tom Best
 Rob Kirkpatrick
 David Blain
 Robert Keel
 Frank Surface
 Milo Laguna
 Scott Butler (Director) – Incumbent
 Jerry Pullin (Treasurer) – Incumbent

The Challenge: Board members commonly are not professional board directors, accountants or attorneys, so they must by necessity rely on our management company for guidance. While the board meets just once a month, it is a big job! A lot of the work involves committee meetings, receiving input from the community members, working through the multifaceted problems, proposals, and recommendations, which are then forwarded to the board for consideration. Your board bears the responsibility for taking care of our finances and collecting our dues. They manage, operate, repair and maintain SCPOA's common areas, such as our lakes, parks and airport, owned in common by all the Association's property owners. Finally, the board can't please all its members all the time; there will always be differences in opinion how things should be done. The board may not, nor will I, endorse one candidate over another. You should make your own informed decision.

Financial Challenges: The board wrestled with and made some difficult financial choices during the recent past. As a result, members questioned some of the board's decisions such as: spending about \$35,000 on a non-budgeted playground; incurring excessively high legal expenses of about \$26,000; allowing budget overruns estimated to be between \$65,000 to \$90,000; budgeting 40% from the reserve account for employee payroll expenses for FY 19-20; making an approximated \$12,000 accounting error (assigning expenditures for recreational facilities to the reserve account), thus shorting reserves. They question the wisdom of spending surplus funds from last year, which may have put the association in a financially tight position going into the next year; reducing the contribution to the reserve account and a budget reduction in the contingency amount. Some view this as an effort to keep our dues artificially low.

Procedural Matters: Your board must operate under the provisions of the Davis Stirling Open Meeting Act (Civil Code *4900 et seq.*). It ensures that all business, with a handful of exceptions, must be conducted in an open meeting session, allowing all members to attend. It is sometimes tempting, for efficiency sake, to meet with a smaller group in executive session. As a result, members were becoming concerned by some of the board's practices with respect to Civil Code *4900 et seq.* An example is the board approval of expenditures in executive session. The board and the concerned members worked through these matters via an IDR (Internal Dispute Resolution) Agreement of December 4th, 2018. As a result, this and future boards, will conduct their business with more transparency. This is a big benefit to the Association. Thanks go to the participants for resolving the issues amicably.

The Firesafe Grant: Local organizations, such as MVFA, SCPOA, MFPD, including Station 75 Chief Eddie Dwyer, supported the effort to win a \$300,000 wildfire prevention/control related grant. The grant was written and coordinated by Chuck Schnell. A big thank you to all who made this possible. From the information available, it appears the grant is contingent on cash contributions of an annual \$40,000 from SCPOA and other in-kind amounts. The grant provides assistance to property owners to create and improve their defensible space for wildfire safety. It also assists with dead tree removal, chipping, cutting fallen tree limbs and splitting firewood. SCPOA, in their newsletter, cited a larger amount and different involvement in its acquisition. "\$420,000 Grant Awarded to Benefit SCPOA. SCPOA's partnership with the Mosquito Fire Safe Council...". As of this writing, it is not clear how the discrepancy between the \$300,000 and \$420,000 can be reconciled. Furthermore, so far, no details of

this "partnership" involvement was available, nor is it clear if the grant is for the sole benefit of SCPOA.

Election Politics: No doubt, there will be folks campaigning. There may be signs, meetings and opposing positions taken. As is always the case in even local politics, there will be lots of information distributed. Some of it may seem a little far-fetched. Consider all campaign information with a grain of salt and consider the source. It is better to dig down and examine the record for yourself than rely on hearsay and uncorroborated gossip. Ask yourself, what actually transpired? What was actually done? Was our money well spent? Were member questions and opinions taken into account in larger monetary decisions? Were board meetings transparent and productive? Who were the folks in charge? Did they appear to have an agenda? How did their votes and decisions affect our community?

The board has scheduled a Candidates' Meet-and-Greet for January 5th, 2019, 1pm-3pm at the fire station. I encourage you to attend this event. Consider your questions based on the candidates past decisions, and their proposed agenda. When considering the merits of incumbent candidates, look at their decisions and voting record. Would you want them to repeat it and serve again? If you are evaluating new candidates, look at their past experience and their stated agendas. After weighing all the facts, then make your choice. Trust your instincts and cast your vote. It may not be perfect, but it will be the result of an objective consideration.

Spicy Corn Chowder

Total: 1 hr Prep: 15 min Cook: 45 min Yield: 4 servings Level: Easy

Ingredients

4 pieces thick-sliced bacon, chopped
1 medium red bell pepper, chopped
1 small jalapeno, chopped seeds and ribs removed
1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 medium Vidalia onion, finely chopped
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
4 cups chicken stock

2 large red potatoes, well-scrubbed and small diced 1 cup heavy cream

16 ounces frozen corn 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 bay leaf

Directions:

In a small saucepan over medium heat, sauté the bacon until crisp and the fat is rendered. With a slotted spoon, transfer bacon to paper towel and reserve. There should be about 4 tablespoons of bacon grease in pan.

Add the onions and red pepper to pan. Sauté until tender and translucent, about 4 minutes. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.

Add the jalapeno and garlic and sauté until fragrant, about 1 minute.

Stir in the flour until thoroughly combined. Cook the flour until it reaches a slight blonde color, about 1 minute.

Stir in the chicken stock and potatoes and simmer for 10 minutes; potatoes will become soft. Add the cream, corn, cayenne and bay leaf.

Simmer for 15 more minutes.

Pour into a serving bowl and garnish with the reserved bacon.
