Chief's Report

Most of the personnel who make up the Mosquito Fire Protection District are not community members. We are professionals who have pledged to serve this community with very little benefit to ourselves. Yes, we are paid, but we are paid at the lowest spectrum of the county's fire service pay scale.



Our firefighter position pays about what a full time McDonald's employee will make annually with no real mechanism for increasing salary. The Fire Captain also is paid less than the lowest scale firefighter in the County, and the Fire Chief is paid less than the average midlevel Firefighter (Non-Officer) with only paid vacation and sick leave benefits. Our Volunteer Personnel are limited and again many of them do not live in the district. Yet despite the low pay, you are served with the highest level of professional service I have ever witnessed in my 38 years in fire service.

The Fire District operates on a budget established years ago. I'm sure that when the figures were reviewed, it was based on the thought that the MFPD would always be a volunteer service. Unfortunately, this is no longer an option for small fire districts like ours. Due to the requirements of training and regulated qualifications it takes over two years to train a Volunteer to an entry level firefighter. The burden of training makes it difficult to recruit and retain new volunteers. We have had over 15 residents start and stop the training process in the last year and a half. Our residents, as you all know do not work in the community. Many work "off the hill" in the Sacramento area. This commute makes it undesirable to work all day and then train to become firefighters.

I was asked what it is that the firefighters do for the community, what are they doing to keep costs down? Do they do nothing but work out all day? Do they watch TV? Why aren't they out weed whacking vegetative fuel? They must have downtime so what are they doing then? I have received many other similar questions such as, "if we hire 24-hour personnel what will they be doing in the night hours?"

To answer a few of these questions, I will begin with "What do the firefighters do for the community?" The personnel here wrote you, the community, a blank check which is payable in the fiscal terms of injury, disability and death. Some may think that is dramatic but it is true. When you call 911, our personnel will respond without hesitation to any person in need. They will physically place themselves between you and harm to provide medical and technical assistance. When available and on duty, our paramedic firefighters including myself, render hospital emergency department level medical care. We also arrange and coordinate the highest level of required medical transportation. Our paramedics maintain medical control throughout transport to ensure our residents receive the best medical care possible until delivered at the appropriate hospital.

What do paramedics provide you? In situations of cardiac emergencies, we are capable of providing global cardiac monitoring via 12 lead EKG. Based on the reading and interpretation, we can identify where the heart attack is occurring and initiate treatment. We can stabilize the patient using fluids or medication. We can increase your blood pressure to ensure preservation of the cerebral tissue in cardiogenic shock and we can stabilize/reduce the impact or actually prevent hypovolemic shock, reverse diabetic hypoglycemia, treat opioid overdose, and treat tricyclic overdose, Using our EKG equipment, we can electrically capture your heart information and, when needed, we can speed it up or slow it down, and administer medications that do the same thing chemically. In cases of respiratory distress, we can provide breathing treatments to open narrowed airway passages. We can control your airway in extreme situations through intubation. We can breathe for you as though you are on a ventilator. There is so much more, but I'm sure the editor would prefer I not go through all skills and care that a paramedic can provide the sick and injured.

We have brought paramedic care into the district on a limited basis, and now have paramedics on duty an average of 25 days each month, from 8:00am to 5:00pm. Many times, our paramedic personnel who are working two back-to-back shifts will stay at the station overnight. They consider themselves as on-call and unpaid, but if there is a call, they go back on the clock.

Paramedic services have been almost revenue neutral. We received donated equipment and by training to Paramedic Advanced Life Support levels, we increased the medical stipend we receive from the County JPA by \$2,500. Our paramedic personnel do not receive a pay stipend for their skills.

I employ my personal vehicle as a command vehicle. I have not received any compensation for the use of my vehicle except for the replacement of the windshield. The cost I have incurred on the district's behalf equals over \$9300 which includes fuel and maintenance costs, two sets of brakes, upgrading my brake system to withstand the roads and driving conditions in the district, two sets of tires shocks and suspension repairs and repairs caused by reckless drivers forcing me off the road into the cutback on several occasions. I still have about \$2200 of unrepaired cosmetic damage.

Our personnel, at their own expense, have repaired roofs and roof vents. While on and off duty, they have assisted elderly residents with clearing brush from their homes to provide a wider defensible space, cleared roofs of pine needles and participated in many requests for customer assistance. They are here every day, regardless of weather, working conditions, pay or benefits.

Our personnel do not "pump iron" all day. The state of California requires that firefighters have 90 minutes allotted per day to provide for physical fitness. In fact, during business hours, they have very little down time. Most days they go without a lunch break and they eat on the fly while working but are still charged an hour for lunch. They work nine hours but get paid for eight. On occasion, they cook a breakfast or lunch. Being that we only have two firefighters on duty during the day do you really want them out exhausting themselves, increasing the possibility of not being able to respond and increasing the probability of injury while weed whacking? I will never purposefully assign a task to our members such as this. It is not our responsibility to work to clear debris and weeds from private property, nor is it our responsibility to clear fuel from property managed by SCPOA, Finnon, or the county. This is not cost effective. That said, we have gone out on a voluntary basis to clear vegetative debris and fuels for lower income residents who could not afford to have it done. We have come upon downed trees on resident's property and assisted in cutting them up.

With only Captain Purves and three volunteers having more than 2 years of service, most of us have less with the district. When I started, the fire station was not to fire code. The fire apparatus was dangerous and should not have been on the road. Pumps leaked water and some were nearly inoperable. The vehicle motors leaked oil. All had electrical and mechanical issues, and on my first morning, when I walked up to the front of the fire station, water was flowing from under the large roll up doors. We had to borrow a fire engine from El Dorado County to keep the fire districts ability to respond to emergencies intact. We established an aggressive maintenance program with the fire station and the fire apparatus. Captain Purves received certification in Fire Apparatus Fleet Service and Management and we changed heavy repairs vendors from one who charged the district through the nose on a flat fee scale per unit to one who charges hourly regardless of extent of work required. This has cut our maintenance costs by nearly \$5000. Now, when you walk in the station, there is not a drop of water or oil on the floor.

During the worst winter in 20 years we fought to keep Rock Creek Road open. At all hours of the night from December 2016 to April 2017, we could be found clearing earthen slides by hand, assisting county DOT with the removal of downed trees, and pre-emptively removing dead trees to reduce danger to residents and roads. We have actively reengaged with the county and joined Garden Valley Fire District in a combined Services Agreement.

Last year, our personnel deployed on taskforce assignments which brought over \$70,000 back to the district, with nearly \$35,000 of those funds to be placed in reserves. Other income received included administrative fees.

This next budget year we have less than 5% cost increase to last year's budget, and we are under budget so far from Fiscal Year 2017/18, with less than a month and a half remaining in the current fiscal year. We have members who are certified in Confined Space rescue, HAZMAT Specialist, Rescue Specialist, Trench Rescue and Swift Water Rescue. We have a Certified Fire Marshal and Fire Investigator. My certifications include the above plus Hazards Strike Team/Taskforce Leader, Safety Officer and Paramedic. We staff the fire station overnight in times of extreme conditions.

So, when asked the question, "What has the district done to decrease costs or what does the fire district do for the Community?" My response to you is, what haven't we done?

The next MFPD Board meeting is Thursday, June 14th at 7 p.m. at the Fire Station. You are welcome to attend!

Finnon Lake Update

MVFA was recently notified by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) that the annual dam inspection fee at Finnon Lake was increased from \$8,000 to \$10,567 due July 1, 2018. DWR also stated that the dam fee will increase by another 20% in 2019. In addition to the dam fees, property taxes and insurance liabilities amount to over \$3,000 annually. The primary reason for reorganizing as a 501(c)(3) and changing its name to MVFA was to separate these financial liabilities from district taxpayers. At its May meeting, the MVFA board voted to raise the camping fees at Finnon Lake effective July 1, 2018. Single campsite fees increase from \$20 to \$25 per night. To rent the entire campground, the fee increases from \$250 to \$300 per night.

MVFA Organization

MVFA is organized as a non-profit tax-exempt entity and is funded entirely by grants, donations, fund raisers and rents and fees at Finnon Lake Recreation Area - which it owns. MVFA receives no tax revenues, nor any dues money from SCPOA. As per IRS mandate, MVFA gives no cash nor has any financial connection to any non-501(c)(3) organization or to the Mosquito Fire Protection District (MFPD). MVFA has no paid employees, and operates primarily with volunteers who donate their own time and often their own money to make our community a better place. If you would like to enhance your membership in MVFA, please become a volunteer.

If you can't volunteer, please consider a donation to MVFA. We have a Community Fund designed to help neighbors in need, and the MVFA Station 75 Fund that provides funds to purchase tools and other items at the Chief's request. And there are always maintenance and improvement projects at the fire station and at Finnon Lake Recreation Area. A letter stating your donation will be provided on request.

The MVFA board is continuing to review and make changes to its By-laws. The present By-laws are a carry-over from its pre-2006 days as the 501(c)(4) Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department (MVFD) which purchased the Finnon Lake property. The idea was to rebuild the original dam (which did not conform to earthquake standards) and restore

Finnon Lake as a principle source of water for fire control. Since the Finnon Lake dam was rebuilt however, MVFA's financial responsibilities have increased dramatically as indicated above.
