Chief's Report

It has been a very long month so far. Your firefighters have made the difference in so many places, for so many people. Our personnel have been on the line of the Carr Fire where they were part of a taskforce that was credited with saving a small community very similar to ours. The community of French Gulch was hit by the fire. This single taskforce saved this town by maneuvering, standing and defending structures and a tactical fire front following response.



On the Bumper Fire in our county, we had personnel calling in air drops that helped save homes, and on more than one occasion, we were the only fire protection on the Divide in position to respond to Kelsey, Garden Valley, Georgetown, and other communities as well as our own.

This was all done while our personnel were also fighting fires and responding to emergencies in our community. We have had an uptick in medical emergencies in the Fire District this last month and a vegetation fire where excellent and decisive tactics immediately contained the fire. Then, exceptional management of incoming resources extinguished the fire managed the electrical hazard of downed live electrical power lines. Our Support Group was in place controlling the traffic flow around the fire and standing guard over the live power lines. This was a coordinated action with the incident commander.

Our Support Group is an integral part of our ability to respond to emergencies. They are a dedicated volunteer service group who, when called on, assists our firefighter personnel in fire, ground or emergency operations where firefighters are not necessarily needed. This frees up emergency responders allowing us to put more firefighters into operational position.



Some may say that our personnel are serving other communities and not Mosquito. This is far from the truth. Being active and responsive in the county has proven to be beneficial to our own fire district. I was recently speaking to another El Dorado fire chief and he told me that he had been in the County for 6 years and until I began going to county chief's meetings, he had never met a Command Officer from our department. These relationships have saved the district thousands of dollars. We received a donation of Self Contained Breathing Apparatus from the Diamond Springs Fire Protection District.

This equipment is a modern breathing air system with wrapped composite air bottles, and regulators. Even though used, they are in excellent shape and will save the district over \$30,000. The community also benefits with our personnel being assigned to taskforces across the state, the district receives nearly

\$1,000 daily just for equipment assignment. The state covers the cost of personnel, overtime and workers compensation coverage portal to portal. We also receive an income through administrative fees.

In the state we have lost nearly one firefighter a week since late July. It is not an easy job. But the support you all show our firefighters is amazing! On August 18th, our firefighters held a pancake breakfast where they served nearly 200 meals. Your donations will provide equipment and tuition coverage for the firefighters, and it truly lifts their morale. Personally, I thank you all who show such wonderful support to those who stand to protect you and the community. **Thank you!**

The next MFPD Board meeting is Thursday, September 13th at 7 p.m. at the Fire Station.



Notice: persons under the age of 18 are required to be accompanied by a parent or guardian age 21 or older at all MVFA events held at the fire station.

MVFA OPERATIONS UPDATE

Many rural communities across the country support non-profit organizations like MVFA: Granges, clubs, churches, community centers, etc. Similarly, these organizations are designed with a primary purpose, to provide an opportunity for community service, friendship and support. They are comprised mostly of volunteers willing to do the work necessary to continue the mission of the organization. MVFA is not a political organization nor designed to be politicized. In fact, MVFA is prohibited by its IRS charter from participating in any political activities or supporting any political candidates. Participation in MVFA events and fundraisers is voluntary. MVFA collects no dues and receives no taxpayer funds or Property Owners Association fees. MVFA is totally self-supporting from donations, fees and rents from Finnon Lake Recreation Area, which it owns and manages.

MVFA operates as a public benefit corporation pursuant to the laws of California. The state gives much latitude to the operations of 501c3 organizations. For example, these charitable organizations can:



- · Choose how many and what officers are on the board
- · Choose who is and is not eligible for offices
- · Choose how the officers are elected
- · Choose who can vote for the officers
- Determine different levels of membership and who can or cannot be members within the bounds of non-discrimination
- Decide what functions and voting rights the various member categories have
- Establish criteria for the removal of a person as a member based on the board's sole discretion

Like many communities in California, demographics are changing. To respond to these changes, it became necessary to update our by-laws. The main impetus for this was MVFA's increased legal responsibilities connected with Finnon Lake Recreation Area, and in particular, the new dam with continuing increases in dam fees. MVFA By-laws continue to maintain adherence to our Mission Statement. The revised By-laws were ratified and adopted by a quorum vote at of the general membership on August 2, 2018. They can be viewed on www.GoMVFA.org. See the left column of the Home page.

The primary update in our by-laws is the addition of a fourth Membership component, namely, Active MVFA committee members. Now, community members who have a demonstrated commitment to the MVFA mission will be prioritized in the nomination process of the Board of Directors election. The components in order of priority are: 1) Active MFPD Fire Fighters, 2) Active MFPD Support Group members, 3) Active MVFA Board and committee members and 4) General membership.

The second update concerns the nomination and election process. Elections will be given advanced notice, and nomination will be taken by U.S. mail or email. General elections will now take place at the regular December meeting to prevent interference with the MVFA Christmas Dinner.

The third updated item is the addition of a procedure to expel board members and/or general members. This procedure may be necessary to deal with board members who may have a personal agenda that is not in harmony with the mission or legal responsibilities of MVFA. Likewise, General Members may be expelled due to defamatory public comments directed towards the board or acts of public hostility toward other members.

The MVFA By-laws now more closely resemble the By-laws of the Mosquito Firefighters Association, also organized as a 501c3. There has never been a time when MVFA has not supported the Mosquito Fire District. At present, five of the seven MVFA board members are card-carrying members of the Mosquito Fire Protection District Support Group. The MVFA Station 75 Fund collects donations and a portion of proceeds from MVFA events in order to buy tools and equipment for the fire district, and to help offset the costs of off-budget expenses. In addition, MVFA is contributing to the matching grant of the Mosquito Community Fuel Reduction and Defensible Space Project with in-kind labor and support totaling over \$22,000.

One of the principle reasons that the Finnon Lake property was purchased in 1997 by the former Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department (MVFD) was to provide a large, unencumbered local source of water for wildfire suppression for our district. What's more, Finnon Lake provides a training ground for various county fire departments including the Mosquito Fire Protection District (MFPD).

MVFA continues the work that it began many years ago. MVFA volunteers are people who simply want to give back to their community and make it a better place. SCPOA Report

As always, this is my personal report and not a SCPOA board communication, check the SCPOA web site and newsletter. I trust you are all enjoying this lovely, busy summer. While it is hot, the lakes and Finnon are almost all full, so it is quite pleasant. Below are some recent noteworthy Association activities:

1. SCPOA indemnification insurance question.

The Board sought oversight of a social event adjacent to the airport. (See http://scpoa.info/presidents-messagePresident Connell Persico). To protect the Association, indemnification by the event host was requested by the board through its attorney. It proved to be unsuccessful because the event was on private property. Instead, by direction of SCPOA President Connell Persico, prior to the private party, the association purchased an additional \$2,000,000 of liability insurance on the airport policy as recommended by the insurance broker. This brings the policy liability to \$5m. The cost was \$250 and was purchased on managements purchase authority.

2. Pledge of Allegiance decision not popular.

At the August 16th SCPOA board meeting, led by Connell Persico, the Pledge of Allegiance motion (below) failed for lack of a second. On a motion to reconsider, each board member was asked, in turn, will you: "Set aside 15 second at the start of each meeting for an opportunity to allow those of us who wish to express their patriotic sentiment, to stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance." Directors Persico, Pullen, Beacham, Harris, Smith, and Butler each voted "NO". As director, I understand this was a board action and it should be accepted. On the other hand, individual members were quite unhappy and adamant in voicing their displeasure with the board action. They cited the board's lack of sensitivity. They found it odd that an old mailbox deserved deliberation for 5 minutes, yet this motion was dismissed without discussion in a rather cavalier way. There were concerns that the result, in effect, may limit the ability to practice constitutionally protected speech of those who wished to voluntarily express their patriotic sentiments.

3. Board approves investment of \$245,000.

At the July 21st board meeting, the board unanimously approved a motion to invest \$245,000 of the association reserve fund through Alliance bank in a 14 months CD. The board requested management provide further information on other investment options for CD's

4. Board considered meeting every other month.

The board considered a motion to meet in open session every other month to reduce the director workload. Executive sessions were to remain as is. After taking input from the members present who expressed their desire to see what the board is doing in open session every month, the motion failed.

5. Town hall comments to be posted on the SCPOA web site.

At the August 16th board meeting, the town hall meeting held on August 11th was lauded as well received by the community. Members were very interested in the raw comments made and wanted a way to review them. The board passed a motion to place these on the SCPOA website. Another town hall is tentatively planned to be scheduled for late September.

Mosquito Firefighters Association (MFA)

plates for the remainder of breakfast. Jerry Pullin set up extra tables to accommodate the arriving guests. Despite the additional seating, guests were sitting on the picnic bench on the lawn, on the fence and scattered in different spots in the station yard.

Captain Ryan Purves addressed the attendees with gratitude for their support. Chief Dwyer spoke to the community about the impact this department is making both on and off the hill. He mentioned the positive feedback he received from multiple agencies that worked directly with our task force deployment, as well as the good reputation our department is building beyond our county line.

Our local artists, business owners, large companies and community members contributed raffle prizes that filled three banquet tables full of various items!!! Prizes included concert tickets, airplane and helicopter tours, gift certificates to various local businesses and defensible space assistance provided by the Mosquito Firefighters. A portion of the raffle prizes came from businesses that learned of the breakfast through social media. Boeger Winery posted the event several times in the last few weeks bringing awareness to other businesses such as Lava Cap, Delfino Farms, Goat Mountain Farms, Max Muscle Placerville, to follow up with raffle donation.

Recipe of the Month

Need something to so with all those tomatoes popping up in your garden while the weather is still warm? Try some Gazpacho. You can practically pick this soup from your garden.

Gazpacho Soup

Ingredients

4 large fresh tomatoes, peeled and diced 1/2 En

1/2 cup finely diced red bell pepper

1 large jalapeno pepper, seeded and minced

1 teaspoon salt

1 pinch dried oregano

freshly ground black pepper to taste

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

salt and ground black pepper to taste

1/2 English cucumber, peeled and finely diced

1/4 cup minced green onion

2 cloves garlic, minced

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

1 pinch cayenne pepper, or to taste

1 pint cherry tomatoes

1 lime, juiced

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoons thinly sliced fresh basil

Directions

Combine diced tomatoes, cucumber, bell pepper, green onion, jalapeno, and garlic in a large bowl. Stir in salt, cumin, oregano, cayenne pepper, and black pepper. Place cherry tomatoes, olive oil, lime juice, balsamic vinegar, and Worcestershire sauce in a blender. Cover and puree until smooth. Pour pureed mixture through a strainer into the tomato-cucumber mixture; stir to combine. Place 1/3 of the tomato mixture into the blender. Cover, turn blender on, and puree until smooth. Return pureed mixture to the remaining tomato-cucumber mixture. Stir to combine. Cover and chill in refrigerator for 2 hours. Season cold soup with salt and black pepper to taste. Ladle into bowls and top with basil.

Cemeteries in Mosquito

Most residents of Mosquito are not aware that there are four cemeteries in the district recognized by the El Dorado County Office of Cemetery Administration. There are probably many other burial sites, however the county only recognizes four. Fred Adams relates that the previous owners of the property his parents purchased said that there are two horse thieves buried there. Names unknown.

Three of the cemeteries are private family cemeteries on private property. They are NOT open to public visitation. The Darr Family Cemetery can be seen from Log Cabin Lane and the Dickinson Family

Cemetery can be seen from Mosquito Road. The third family cemetery is that of the Goat Doctor, Franz Xavier Macek (Francis Macek André, AKA Frank André)* and his adoptive parents. This cemetery is not visible from any public road. These are all private family cemeteries on private property. DO NOT TRESPASS!

The fourth and only public cemetery in Mosquito is Nelsonville Cemetery. Prospecting and mining briefly flourished in Mosquito Canyon following gold discovery in Coloma in January 1848. By 1850 there were two settlements in the canvon. Nelsonville was established along Mosquito Road between Mosquito Cut-off Road and Buckboard. Big House (or Lower Town) was probably established westward along Mosquito Cut-off. Nelsonville burned down in 1865 and was never rebuilt.



There are no known remnants of Big House. Nelsonville had a thriving population of about 2500 and several stores and saloons. Among its remnants is the Nelsonville Cemetery. **, ***

This cemetery is still active with what I have been told is one legal interment remaining. The exact number of interments at Nelsonville is unknown because many graves are unmarked, and some are identifiable only by a depression in the ground. There are fourteen marked graves, including the Summerfield family. A listing of the graves therein can be found at -- www.findagrave.com. Click on "Cemeteries" at the top of the page and search for Nelsonville Cemetery, El Dorado County, California. Legend has it that there are several "dance hall" girls buried here, source and cause of death unknown.

There are easements from La Paz Road to the Nelsonville cemetery. Drive up La Paz from Mosquito Road about 0.15 mi. (750 ft.). There is a wide space on the right and a little further there is an ungraded dirt road on the left. Between these two parking places there is a telephone pole on the north side of La Paz. A path goes westward (parallel to La Paz) from this pole that will lead you to the cemetery on your right (north). Be careful of old downed barbed wire fences etc.

The family of Ron Stone lived in the nearby house and provided maintenance for the cemetery: however. none has been done since they moved. If you are interested in volunteering to provide maintenance for this cemetery, please contact the Cemetery Administration mentioned above or MVFA at mvfa95667@gmail.com.


