What a Year!

One year ago, August 22, 2016, I walked through the parking bay of the Mosquito Fire Station. It was 05:30 am. The morning was warm and the sky was clear. Literally within minutes the alarm went off for a medical aid. I readied my equipment as I waited for the first volunteer to arrive at the station. Firefighter Lisa



Hampton arrived at the station and climbed into the cab of the engine with me as we responded to the call. We arrived quickly where Volunteer Fire Captain Tom Stuart was on-scene and already rendering aid.

That was my first morning. Chief Hazlett was out of the District on assignment with an Incident Management Team. I set to work, inspecting the equipment and getting ready for the day's operations. My first assignment as Fire Captain was to assess the operational capability of the Fire District, including operational conditions of the fire apparatus and rescue equipment.

Over the next three weeks, I review and identified the Fire District's needs. I had just come out of a forced medical retirement from the Alameda County Fire Department; at that time I had been a professional Firefighter Paramedic for 37 years. Using the template from my previous position, I evaluated the personnel, their capability and their confidence levels. There were only full time paid staff were two full time personnel and a relief Firefighter, along with basically three active volunteers. The medical capability was one full-time EMT, one full-time Medical First Responder and one relief EMT.

One of our firefighters was on the hiring list for El Dorado County Fire District and was slated to start work for them. The Relief Firefighter was testing for another agency and our final full-time firefighter was planning on leaving to go to work for a company that provides rescue systems standby.

Daily staffing minimum was a single firefighter and that's all we had most days. Morale was nonexistent, Full-time staff earning wages were only \$6,000 above poverty level meaning that, when taxes were deducted, their take home pay was \$2,000 below poverty level for a family of three.

All the fire apparatus leaked water and had pump problems, and electrical and/or mechanical problems. We discovered that the maintenance supposedly being performed by a vendor was not completed. The fire station itself had significant electrical problems. On top of everything, we had a budget of roughly \$395,000. Basically, we were nearly non-operational. Any major impact on the fire department would have brought Mosquito Fire Protection District to a standstill operationally.

In my fourth week, Chief Hazlett called to inform me that he was resigning. I had barely even started here and was appointed interim Fire Chief.

Well, things didn't get any easier from that point. This community is different from any I have ever served before. The Fire District is small but has the mechanisms and problems of a much larger Fire District. For years the community has been under-served by the Fire District and unfortunately, still is.

Then the rains came early, literally and figuratively. So, while at the same time we were fighting the storms and mudslides of last winter, many times working while exhausted, and reaching maximum physical capability, we were also working on the needs of the community and the Fire District. For months we battled the mudslides, keeping roads open and borrowing equipment and personnel to provide paramedic services to the community when it was cut off from the world when our only two paved roads were closed simultaneously.

We worked to improve morale, increase staffing, and improve services provided to the community. We also worked on the fire apparatus and replacing outdated equipment and protective clothing. We sent personnel to the Fire Academy and courses to train them to become driver-operators and Rope Rescue Specialists. We hired Paramedic Firefighters as relief personnel, worked hard and petitioned the El Dorado County EMS and El Dorado County Emergency Services Authority (JPA) to allow us to become Advanced Life Support (ALS) also known as paramedic providers. We have re-engaged with the County Chiefs and JPA and have become Fire Engine Based limited time ALS (Paramedic) providers. We have applied for grants for equipment and hiring and we have turned this small fire district into a professional agency. We are constantly searching for ways to increase services and resources to this community.

We have increased the level of professionalism here at the fire station. The firefighters, both paid and volunteer, have taken ownership. They have pride in what they are doing and they give it their all. When you drive by the fire station you see firefighters in uniform. These are professionals, not because of the uniform but because of their attitude and their desire to be professional. They carry themselves and train and educate themselves as any professional would, with the volunteers training weekly and paid staff daily. While I am proud of what we've accomplished, I still believe the community deserves more.

We have applied for grants for apparatus purchases and hiring. We have also put in a bid to take on a half-time Paramedic Ambulance from a Joint Powers Authority since we are 45 minutes from any other emergency resource it takes a minimum of 45 minutes to get an ambulance into the district from Placerville, and that is if the ambulance is in Placerville.

It takes a minimum of 4 firefighters to initiate Fire Attack with Entry on a structure fire. To perform CPR, the average rescue requires 5 people to render care and transport and to perform rope or swift water rescue it requires a minimum of 10 people. To fight a grass fire, contain, control and extinguish, takes a minimum of 3 apparatus with wildland capability and a minimum of six personnel. This would be for a fire less than two acres with slow rate of spread. Most major wildland fires occur because the arriving first alarm resources are greatly overwhelmed by the spread of the fire, the fuel, winds and topography. I have been on fires where on arrival they were at 50 acres with such a rapid rate of spread that by the time we positioned for attack the fire had doubled in size, then within minutes tripled in size, and on final containment had grown to 10,000 acres and burned down two structures. My resources previously had included 10 Strike Teams from CALFIRE and multiple alarm resources from Alameda County and other local Fire Departments.

So how are we under-serving the community? We have two paid firefighters on duty daily from 8am to 5pm along with a Chief Officer. Hopefully, a volunteer will also be available daily in the district. Though our volunteers give their all, their availability is limited. I often stay at the fire station Monday through Wednesday, driving home Wednesday evening, returning on Thursday or Friday. Many times, I come in to provide command coverage at night when no other Fire Officer is available. We have had calls come in at night that went unanswered by our personnel so that now the paid staff has been directed to monitor all calls from home and report to the district if no volunteer reports within 10 minutes. I have driven my two-and-a-half-hour drive in the middle of the night to provide district coverage.

We are doing all we can to decrease the lack of coverage. Our volunteers have to travel outside the district for employment or they go on vacation or take weekend trips. Two of our volunteer firefighters are on staff with the US Forestry and are not available for response. So, after 5 pm, unfortunately, we never know what type of response we will be able to provide to the community. We may get a single firefighter, or three or five, or we may not. Our paid staff live outside the district and with Mosquito Road being closed, it takes 45 minutes or so to get to the station. Though we are doing everything we can to mitigate the issues, we are still failing.

I need to ask you, what do you want for emergency services? What are you willing to pay to ensure that there are 4 personnel including full-time paramedics on duty 24/7? So, I ask how many days a week do you buy a coffee from a coffee house and are you willing to pay the cost of your coffee to make sure your family has emergency resources available to them on 24-hour, 7-days a week through all holidays and at all times? Is that a cost that you are willing to pay? Yes, when you add it up it seems very expensive, so I

ask you how much is your home insurance? How many of you have lost your home insurance? Has your insurance doubled or tripled? Do you pay the \$60.00 annually for CALSTAR that may or may not be available? Over the last year, we have requested Air Ambulances multiple times, not once receiving CALSTAR.

On September 9th and 10th, we will be hosting <u>Fire Ops 101</u>. It is a weekend where you can come and work as a firefighter. We will put you through drills, structure fires, grass fires, medical aids, vehicle extrication, and rope rescue. If available, we will use the Georgetown Fire Training Burn Building and bring you into a hot atmosphere while wearing all the same protective equipment as our personnel. Fire Ops will be both Saturday and Sunday starting at 8am and going until 5pm, depending on how many people we get to take part. We will also offer segments for people who can't take part in the whole day. It will take place at the Fire Station, and if I can make it happen, also at the Georgetown Training Grounds for the hot classes. Please call the Fire Station at (530)626-9017 if you're interested and for more information. What I expect you will find out is that our personnel regardless of intent are stretched pretty thin and are underpaid as mentioned previously, with their pay falling just above the poverty level, What I expect you will find out is that our personnel regardless of intent are greatly understaffed and are under paid as their pay rate remains just above poverty level, but I think you will truly come to know the dedication necessary to be a firefighter and the dedication so freely given by the firefighters of the Mosquito Fire Protection District.

In closing all I can say is, "Hey, Sparky where are you going so fast?" Remember we all need to share the road. Please slow down. The life we may not be able to save could be yours!

Chocolate Zucchini Cake II

*Recipe By:*Sandi "A great cake for all that zucchini at the end of the season, and the kids love it too!"

Ingredients

1/2 cup butter, softened1/2 cup vegetable oil2 eggs1 teaspoon vanilla extract1/2 cup sour milk

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 3/4 cups white sugar
2 cups zucchini, finely diced
1 cup semisweet chocolate chips



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C), grease and flour a 9x13 inch pan.
- 2. Cream butter, oil and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, vanilla and sour milk. Beat until smooth.
- 3. Mix flour, cocoa, baking soda and cinnamon together and add to creamed mixture. Beat well. Stir in diced zucchini.
- 4. Pour into a 9x13 inch pan and sprinkle top with chocolate chips. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 40 to 45 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.
