WHAT IS PRAYER?

In short, prayer is intentional communication with God. Because prayer is intentional it is not something to be considered haphazardly. Prayer is not meditation nor is it reflection, rather it is communication between the human soul to the Creator.

Prayer can be audible or silent, private or public, formal or informal. All prayer must be offered in faith (<u>James 1:6</u>), in the name of the Lord Jesus (<u>John 16:23</u>), and in the power of the Holy Spirit (<u>Romans 8:26</u>). As the *International Standard Bible Encyclopedia* puts it, "Christian prayer in its full New Testament meaning is prayer addressed to God as Father, in

the name of Christ as Mediator, and through the enabling grace of the indwelling Spirit" ("Prayer" by J. C. Lambert).¹

Prayer is meaningful and powerful. Meaningful in the sense that it shows a dependence upon God as Father. It is powerful because the sinner comes before a Holy God and He not only hears but answers.

FROM THE WESTMINSTER SHORTER CATECHISM²

What is prayer? Prayer is an offering up of our desires unto God, for things agreeable to his will, in the name of Christ, with confession of our sins, and thankful acknowledgment of his mercies. —Question 98

What rule hath God given for our direction in prayer? The whole word of God is of use to direct us in prayer; but the special rule of direction is that form of prayer which Christ taught his disciples, commonly called 'The Lord's Prayer.' —Question 99

What doth the preface of the Lord's prayer teach us? The preface of the Lord's prayer, which is, 'Our Father which art in heaven,' teacheth us to draw near to God with all holy reverence and confidence, as children to a father, able and ready to help us; and that we should pray with and for others. —Question 100

TYPES OF PRAYERS³

The Bible lists at least <u>nine main types of prayer</u>:

- a. prayer of faith (James 5:15)
- b. prayer of agreement (also known as corporate prayer) (Acts 2:42)
- c. prayer of request (also known as petition or supplication) (Philippians 4:6)
- d. prayer of thanksgiving (Psalm 95:2-3)
- e. prayer of worship (Acts 13:2-3)
- f. prayer of consecration (also known as dedication) (Matthew 26:39)
- g. prayer of intercession (1 Timothy 2:1)
- h. prayer of imprecation (Psalms 69)
- i. praying in the Spirit (1 Corinthians 14:14-15).

Why do we say Amen?

The Hebrew word translated "amen" literally means "truly" or "so be it." "Amen" is also found in the Greek New Testament and has the same meaning. Nearly half of the Old Testament uses of amen are found in the book of Deuteronomy. In each case, the people are responding to curses pronounced by God on various sins. Each pronouncement is followed by the words "and all the people shall say Amen" (Deuteronomy 27:15-26). This indicates that the people applauded the righteous sentence handed down by their holy God, responding, "So let it be." The amen attested to the conviction of the hearers that the sentences which they heard were true, just, and certain.

Seven of the Old Testament references link amen with praise. The sentence "Then all the people said 'Amen' and 'Praise the LORD,'" found in 1 Chronicles 16:36, typifies the connection between amen and praise. In Nehemiah 5:13 and 8:6, the people of Israel affirm Ezra's exalting of God by worshiping the Lord and obeying Him. The highest expression of praise to God is obedience, and when we say "amen" to His commands and pronouncements, our praise is sweet music to His ears.

The New Testament writers all use "amen" at the end of their epistles. The apostle John uses it at the end of his gospel, his three letters, and the book of Revelation, where it appears nine times. Each time it is connected with praising and glorifying God and referring to the <u>second coming</u> and the end of the age. Paul says "amen" to the blessings he pronounces on all the churches in his letters to them, as do Peter, John and Jude in their letters. The implication is that they are saying, "May it be that the Lord will truly grant these blessings upon you."

When Christians say "amen" at the end of our prayers, we are following the model of the apostles, asking God to "please let it be as we have prayed." Remembering the connection between amen and the praise of obedience, all prayers should be prayed according to the will of God. Then when we say "amen," we can be confident that God will respond "so be it" and grant our requests (John 14:13; 1 John 5:14).

Why do we Pray in Jesus' Name?

Prayer in Jesus' name is taught in <u>John 14:13-14</u>, "And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Son may bring glory to the Father. You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it." Some misapply this verse, thinking that saying "in Jesus' name" at the end of a prayer results in God's always granting what is asked for. This is essentially treating the words "in Jesus' name" as a magic formula. This is absolutely unbiblical.

Praying in Jesus' name means praying with His authority and asking God the Father to act upon our prayers because we come in the name of His Son, Jesus. Praying in Jesus' name means the same thing as praying according to the will of God, "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us—whatever we ask—we know that we have what we asked of him" (1 John 5:14-15). Praying in Jesus' name is praying for things that will honor and glorify Jesus.

Saying "in Jesus' name" at the end of a prayer is not a magic formula. If what we ask for or say in prayer is not for God's glory and according to His will, saying "in Jesus' name" is meaningless. Genuinely praying in Jesus' name and for His glory is what is important, not attaching certain words to the end of a prayer. It is not the words in the prayer that matter, but the purpose behind the prayer. Praying for things that are in agreement with God's will is the essence of praying in Jesus' name.

Does God Hear My Prayers?

God hears everything, including prayers. He is God. Nothing gets by Him (<u>Psalm 139:1–4</u>). He is sovereign over everything He created (<u>Isaiah 46:9–11</u>). So the question is not whether God is aware of every prayer (He is), but whether God is tuning in to our prayers with an intent to answer them.

God wants us to pray. He has created prayer as a means by which we can enjoy Him (Revelation 3:20), confess our sin (1 John 1:9), ask Him to meet our needs (Psalm 50:15), and align our wills with His (Jeremiah 29:11–12; Luke 22:42). One kind of prayer is guaranteed to be granted. Luke 18:13–14 describes the prayer of repentance. When we call upon the Lord in humble repentance, He is eager to justify and forgive us.

However, when considering <u>prayer</u>, it is important to remember that most promises of God in Scripture were written to His people. In the Old Testament, those promises were for Israel and all who united with them. In the New Testament, those promises were written to the followers of Jesus. It is a misuse of Scripture to pull out isolated verses and try to apply them to any situation we want, including prayer. Even though the Lord knows and hears all, He has given some circumstances in which He will not listen to our prayers:

1. When we are choosing to hold on to sin, rather than repent and change, God will not hear our prayers. In <u>Isaiah 1:15</u>, the Lord says, "When you spread out your hands in prayer, I hide my eyes from you; even when you offer many prayers, I am not listening. Your hands are full of blood!" <u>Proverbs 28:9</u> says, "If anyone turns a deaf ear to my instruction, even their prayers are detestable."

Example: A young couple are living together in sexual sin, yet they pray for God's blessing on their home.

- 2. When we ask according to our own selfish desires, God will not hear our prayers. <u>James 4:3</u> says, "When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures."
- Example: A man is dissatisfied with his three-year-old Toyota, so he prays for a brand-new Mercedes.
- 3. When what we ask is not in accordance with His will for us. <u>First John 5:14</u> says, "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us."

Example: We pray fervently for a new job, but God's plan requires that we stay where we are and be a witness to our coworkers.

4. When we do not ask in faith. In <u>Mark 11:24</u> Jesus said, "I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours." However, <u>faith</u> is not

believing for something; it is believing in Someone. Our faith is in the character of God and His desire to bless and comfort us. When we pray, we should have faith that He hears us and will grant every request that is in line with His will for us (1 John 5:14–15). Example: We ask God to supply a financial need but continue to worry and make faithless comments to our families and coworkers, such as "I'm probably going to go to the poorhouse. I'll never get that money."

God is holy and desires us to be holy as He is (<u>Leviticus 22:32</u>; <u>1 Peter 1:16</u>). When He knows that we are seeking that holiness as well, He is delighted to answer our prayers in ways that continue our spiritual growth. Jesus said, "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you" (<u>John 15:7</u>). The secret to prayer is abiding in Christ so that whatever we ask is in accordance with His heart (<u>Psalm 37:4</u>). Only then can we have the confidence that God does hear our prayers with an intent to answer them.

Does God hear / answer the prayers of a sinner / unbeliever?

John 9:31 declares, "We know that God does not listen to sinners. He listens to the godly man who does his will." It has also been said that "the only prayer that God hears from a sinner is the prayer for salvation." As a result, some believe that God does not hear and/or will never answer the prayers of an unbeliever. In context, though, John 9:31 is saying that God does not perform miracles through an unbeliever. First John 5:14-15 tells us that God answers prayers based on whether they are asked according to His will. This principle, perhaps, applies to unbelievers. If an unbeliever asks a prayer of God that is according to His will, nothing prevents God from answering such a prayer—according to His will.

Some Scriptures describe God hearing and answering the prayers of unbelievers. In most of these cases, prayer was involved. In one or two, God responded to the cry of the heart (it is not stated whether that cry was directed toward God). In some of these cases, the prayer seems to be combined with repentance. But in other cases, the prayer was simply for an earthly need or blessing, and God responded either out of compassion or in response to the genuine seeking or the faith of the person. Here are some passages dealing with prayer by an unbeliever:

The people of Nineveh prayed that Nineveh might be spared (<u>Jonah 3:5-10</u>). God answered this prayer and did not destroy the city of Nineveh as He had threatened.

Hagar asked God to protect her son Ishmael (<u>Genesis 21:14-19</u>). God not only protected Ishmael, God blessed him exceedingly.

In <u>1 Kings 21:17-29</u>, especially verses 27-29, Ahab fasts and mourns over Elijah's prophecy concerning his posterity. God responds by not bringing about the calamity in Ahab's time.

The Gentile woman from the Tyre and Sidon area prayed that Jesus would deliver her daughter from a demon (Mark 7:24-30). Jesus cast the demon out of the woman's daughter.

Cornelius, the Roman centurion in <u>Acts 10</u>, had the apostle Peter sent to him in response to Cornelius being a righteous man. <u>Acts 10:2</u> tells us that Cornelius "prayed to God regularly."

God does make promises that are applicable to all (saved and unsaved alike) such as <u>Jeremiah 29:13</u>: "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." This was the case for Cornelius in <u>Acts 10:1-6</u>. But there are many promises that, according to the context of the passages, are for Christians alone. Because Christians have received Jesus as the Savior, they are encouraged to come boldly to the throne of grace to find help in time of need (<u>Hebrews 4:14-16</u>). We are told that when we ask for anything according to God's will, He hears and gives us what we ask for (<u>1 John 5:14-15</u>). There are many other promises for Christians concerning prayer (<u>Matthew 21:22</u>; <u>John 14:13</u>, <u>15:7</u>). So, yes, there

are instances in which God does not answer the prayers of an unbeliever. At the same time, in His grace and mercy, God can intervene in the lives of unbelievers in response to their prayers.

Hinderances to a potent prayer life:

The most obvious hindrance to a potent prayer life is the presence of unconfessed sins in the heart of the one who is praying. Because our God is holy, there is a barrier that exists between Him and us when we come to Him with unconfessed sin in our lives. "But your iniquities have separated you from your God; your sins have hidden his face from you, so that he will not hear" (Isaiah 59:2). David concurred, knowing from experience that God is far from those who try to hide their sin: "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened" (Psalm 66:18).

The Bible refers to several areas of sin that are hindrances to effective prayer. First, when we are living according to the flesh, rather than in the Spirit, our desire to pray and our ability to effectively communicate with God are hindered. Although we receive a new nature when we are born again, that new nature still resides in our old flesh, and that old "tent" is corrupt and sinful. The flesh can gain control of our actions, attitudes, and motives unless we are diligent to "put to death the deeds of the body" (Romans 8:13) and be led by the Spirit in a right relationship with God. Only then will we be able to pray in close communion with Him.

One way living in the flesh manifests itself is in selfishness, another hindrance to effective prayer. When our prayers are selfishly motivated, when we ask God for what we want rather than for what He wants, our motives hinder our prayers. "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us" (1 John 5:14). Asking according to God's will is the same as asking in submission to whatever His will may be, whether or not we know what that will is. As in all things, Jesus is to be our example in prayer. He always prayed in the will of His Father: "Yet not my will, but yours be done" (Luke 22:42). Selfish prayers are always those that are intended to gratify our own selfish desires, and we should not expect God to respond to such prayers. "When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures" (James 4:3).

Living according to selfish, fleshly desires will also hinder our prayers because it produces a hardness of heart toward others. If we are indifferent to the needs of others, we can expect God to be indifferent to our needs. When we go to God in prayer, our first concern should be His will. The second should be the needs of others. This stems from the understanding that we are to consider others better than ourselves and be concerned about their interests over and above our own (Philippians 2:3-4).

A major hindrance to effective prayer is a spirit of unforgiveness toward others. When we refuse to forgive others, a root of bitterness grows up in our hearts and chokes our prayers. How can we expect God to pour out His blessings upon us undeserving sinners if we harbor hatred and bitterness toward others? This principle is beautifully illustrated in the

parable of the unforgiving servant in <u>Matthew 18:23-35</u>. This story teaches that God has forgiven us a debt that is beyond measure (our sin), and He expects us to forgive others as we have been forgiven. To refuse to do so will hinder our prayers.

Another major hindrance to effective prayer is unbelief and doubt. This does not mean, as some suggest, that because we come to God convinced that He will grant our requests, He is somehow obligated to do so. Praying without doubt means praying in the secure belief and understanding of God's character, nature, and motives. "And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Hebrews 11:6). When we come to God in prayer, doubting His character, purpose, and promises, we insult Him terribly. Our confidence must be in His ability to grant any request that is in accordance with His will and purpose for our lives. We must pray with the understanding that whatever He purposes is the best possible scenario. "But when he asks, he must believe and not doubt, because he who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. That man should not think he will receive anything from the Lord; he is a double-minded man, unstable in all he does" (James 1:6-7).

Finally, discord in the home is a definite obstacle to prayer. Peter specifically mentions this as a hindrance to the prayers of a husband whose attitude toward his wife is less than godly. "Husbands, in the same way be considerate as you live with your wives, and treat them with respect as the weaker partner and as heirs with you of the gracious gift of life, so that nothing will hinder your prayers" (1 Peter 3:7). Where there is a serious conflict in family relationships and the head of the household is not demonstrating the attitudes Peter mentions, the husband's prayer communication with God is hindered. Likewise, wives are to follow the biblical principles of submission to their husbands' headship if their own prayers are not to be hindered (Ephesians 5:22-24).

Fortunately, all these prayer hindrances can be dealt with at once by coming to God in prayers of confession and repentance. We are assured in <u>1 John 1:9</u> that "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." Once we have done that, we enjoy a clear and open channel of communication with God, and our prayers will not only be heard and answered, but we will also be filled with a deep sense of joy.

- Mark 14:38 Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."
- <u>Luke 5:16</u> But he would withdraw to desolate places and pray.
- <u>Luke 6:12</u> In these days he went out to the mountain to pray, and all night he continued in prayer to God.
- Luke 6:28 bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you.
- <u>Luke 9:28</u> Now about eight days after these sayings he took with him Peter and John and James and went up on the mountain to pray.
- <u>Luke 10:2</u> And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.
- <u>Luke 11:1</u> Now Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples."
- <u>Luke 11:2</u> And he said to them, "When you pray, say: "Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come.
- <u>Luke 18:1</u> And he told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart.
- <u>Luke 18:10</u> "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector.
- <u>Luke 22:40</u> And when he came to the place, he said to them, "Pray that you may not enter into temptation."
- <u>Luke 22:46</u> and he said to them, "Why are you sleeping? Rise and pray that you may not enter into temptation."
- Acts 8:22 Repent, therefore, of this wickedness of yours, and pray to the Lord that, if possible, the intent of your heart may be forgiven you.

- Acts 8:24 And Simon answered, "Pray for me to the Lord, that nothing of what you have said may come upon me."
- Acts 10:9 The next day, as they were on their journey and approaching the city, Peter went up on the housetop about the sixth hour to pray.
- Romans 8:26 Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words.
- <u>1 Corinthians 11:13</u> Judge for yourselves: is it proper for a wife to pray to God with her head uncovered?
- <u>1 Corinthians 14:13</u> Therefore, one who speaks in a tongue should pray that he may interpret.
- <u>1 Corinthians 14:14</u> For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays but my mind is unfruitful.
- 1 Corinthians 14:15 What am I to do? I will pray with my spirit, but I will pray with my mind also; I will sing praise with my spirit, but I will sing with my mind also.
- 2 Corinthians 9:14 while they long for you and pray for you, because of the surpassing grace of God upon you.
- <u>2 Corinthians 13:7</u> But we pray to God that you may not do wrong—not that we may appear to have met the test, but that you may do what is right, though we may seem to have failed.
- <u>2 Corinthians 13:9</u> For we are glad when we are weak and you are strong. Your restoration is what we pray for.
- <u>Colossians 1:3</u> We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you,
- <u>Colossians 1:9</u> And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding,
- Colossians 4:3 At the same time, pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison—

- <u>1 Thessalonians 3:10</u> as we pray most earnestly night and day that we may see you face to face and supply what is lacking in your faith?
- 1 Thessalonians 5:17 pray without ceasing,
- 1 Thessalonians 5:25 Brothers, pray for us.
- <u>2 Thessalonians 1:11</u> To this end we always pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of his calling and may fulfill every resolve for good and every work of faith by his power,
- <u>2 Thessalonians 3:1</u> Finally, brothers, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may speed ahead and be honored, as happened among you,
- <u>1 Timothy 2:8</u> I desire then that in every place the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarreling;
- <u>Philemon 6</u> and I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective for the full knowledge of every good thing that is in us for the sake of Christ.
- <u>Hebrews 13:18</u> Pray for us, for we are sure that we have a clear conscience, desiring to act honorably in all things.
- <u>James 5:13</u> Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise.
- <u>James 5:14</u> Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord.
- <u>James 5:16</u> Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working.
- <u>1 John 5:16</u> If anyone sees his brother committing a sin not leading to death, he shall ask, and God will give him life—to those who commit sins that do not lead to death. There is sin that leads to death; I do not say that one should pray for that.
- <u>3 John 2</u> Beloved, I pray that all may go well with you and that you may be in good health, as it goes well with your soul.

- <u>Psalm 17:1</u> A Prayer of David. Hear a just cause, O LORD; attend to my cry! Give ear to my prayer from lips free of deceit!

- <u>Deuteronomy 9:20</u> And the LORD was so angry with Aaron that he was ready to destroy him. And I prayed for Aaron also at the same time.
- <u>Deuteronomy 9:26</u> And I prayed to the LORD, 'O Lord GOD, do not destroy your people and your heritage, whom you have redeemed through your greatness, whom you have brought out of Egypt with a mighty hand.
- <u>Judges 13:8</u> Then Manoah prayed to the LORD and said, "O Lord, please let the man of God whom you sent come again to us and teach us what we are to do with the child who will be born."
- <u>1 Samuel 1:10</u> She was deeply distressed and prayed to the LORD and wept bitterly.
- <u>1 Samuel 1:27</u> For this child I prayed, and the LORD has granted me my petition that I made to him.
- <u>1 Samuel 2:1</u> And Hannah prayed and said, "My heart exults in the LORD; my horn is exalted in the LORD. My mouth derides my enemies, because I rejoice in your salvation.
- <u>1 Samuel 8:6</u> But the thing displeased Samuel when they said, "Give us a king to judge us." And Samuel prayed to the LORD.
- <u>2 Kings 4:33</u> So he went in and shut the door behind the two of them and prayed to the LORD.
- <u>2 Kings 6:17</u> Then Elisha prayed and said, "O LORD, please open his eyes that he may see." So the LORD opened the eyes of the young man, and he saw, and behold, the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha.

- <u>2 Kings 6:18</u> And when the Syrians came down against him, Elisha prayed to the LORD and said, "Please strike this people with blindness." So he struck them with blindness in accordance with the prayer of Elisha.
- <u>2 Kings 19:15</u> And Hezekiah prayed before the LORD and said: "O LORD, the God of Israel, enthroned above the cherubim, you are the God, you alone, of all the kingdoms of the earth; you have made heaven and earth.
- 2 Kings 20:2 Then Hezekiah turned his face to the wall and prayed to the LORD, saying,
- <u>2 Chronicles 30:18</u> For a majority of the people, many of them from Ephraim, Manasseh, Issachar, and Zebulun, had not cleansed themselves, yet they ate the Passover otherwise than as prescribed. For Hezekiah had prayed for them, saying, "May the good LORD pardon everyone
- <u>2 Chronicles 32:20</u> Then Hezekiah the king and Isaiah the prophet, the son of Amoz, prayed because of this and cried to heaven.
- <u>2 Chronicles 32:24</u> In those days Hezekiah became sick and was at the point of death, and he prayed to the LORD, and he answered him and gave him a sign.
- <u>2 Chronicles 33:13</u> He prayed to him, and God was moved by his entreaty and heard his plea and brought him again to Jerusalem into his kingdom. Then Manasseh knew that the LORD was God.
- <u>Ezra 10:1</u> While Ezra prayed and made confession, weeping and casting himself down before the house of God, a very great assembly of men, women, and children, gathered to him out of Israel, for the people wept bitterly.
- Nehemiah 2:4 Then the king said to me, "What are you requesting?" So I prayed to the God of heaven.
- Nehemiah 4:9 And we prayed to our God and set a guard as a protection against them day and night.
- <u>Job 42:10</u> And the LORD restored the fortunes of Job, when he had prayed for his friends. And the LORD gave Job twice as much as he had before.
- <u>Psalm 35:13</u> But I, when they were sick— I wore sackcloth; I afflicted myself with fasting; I prayed with head bowed on my chest.

- Isaiah 37:15 And Hezekiah prayed to the LORD:
- <u>Isaiah 37:21</u> Then Isaiah the son of Amoz sent to Hezekiah, saying, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Because you have prayed to me concerning Sennacherib king of Assyria,
- Isaiah 38:2 Then Hezekiah turned his face to the wall and prayed to the LORD,
- <u>Jeremiah 32:16</u> "After I had given the deed of purchase to Baruch the son of Neriah, I prayed to the LORD, saying:
- <u>Daniel 6:10</u> When Daniel knew that the document had been signed, he went to his house where he had windows in his upper chamber open toward Jerusalem. He got down on his knees three times a day and prayed and gave thanks before his God, as he had done previously.
- <u>Daniel 9:4</u> I prayed to the LORD my God and made confession, saying, "O Lord, the great and awesome God, who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments,
- Jonah 2:1 Then Jonah prayed to the LORD his God from the belly of the fish,
- <u>Jonah 4:2</u> And he prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD, is not this what I said when I was yet in my country? That is why I made haste to flee to Tarshish; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, and relenting from disaster.
- Matthew 26:39 And going a little farther he fell on his face and prayed, saying, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will."
- Matthew 26:42 Again, for the second time, he went away and prayed, "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done."
- <u>Matthew 26:44</u> So, leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words again.
- Mark 1:35 And rising very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he departed and went out to a desolate place, and there he prayed.
- Mark 14:35 And going a little farther, he fell on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him.

- Mark 14:39 And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words.
- <u>Luke 18:11</u> The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector.
- <u>Luke 22:32</u> but I have prayed for you that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned again, strengthen your brothers."
- Luke 22:41 And he withdrew from them about a stone's throw, and knelt down and prayed,
- <u>Luke 22:44</u> And being in agony he prayed more earnestly; and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down to the ground.
- Acts 1:24 And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen
- Acts 4:31 And when they had prayed, the place in which they were gathered together was shaken, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and continued to speak the word of God with boldness.
- Acts 6:6 These they set before the apostles, and they prayed and laid their hands on them.
- Acts 8:15 who came down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit,
- Acts 9:40 But Peter put them all outside, and knelt down and prayed; and turning to the body he said, "Tabitha, arise." And she opened her eyes, and when she saw Peter she sat up.
- Acts 10:2 a devout man who feared God with all his household, gave alms generously to the people, and prayed continually to God.
- Acts 20:36 And when he had said these things, he knelt down and prayed with them all.
- Acts 21:5 When our days there were ended, we departed and went on our journey, and they all, with wives and children, accompanied us until we were outside the city. And kneeling down on the beach, we prayed
- Acts 27:29 And fearing that we might run on the rocks, they let down four anchors from the stern and prayed for day to come.
- Acts 28:8 It happened that the father of Publius lay sick with fever and dysentery. And Paul visited him and prayed, and putting his hands on him, healed him.

James 5:17 - Elijah was a man with a nature like ours, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth.
James 5:18 - Then he prayed again, and heaven gave rain, and the earth bore its fruit.
Call on the Name of The Lord
Psalm 116:13 - I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD,

Psalm 116:17 - I will offer to you the sacrifice of thanksgiving and call on the name of the LORD.

Call upon the Name of The Lord

Genesis 4:26 - To Seth also a son was born, and he called his name Enosh. At that time people began to call upon the name of the LORD.

1 Kings 18:24 - And you call upon the name of your god, and I will call upon the name of the LORD, and the God who answers by fire, he is God." And all the people answered, "It is well spoken."

<u>2 Kings 5:11</u> - But Naaman was angry and went away, saying, "Behold, I thought that he would surely come out to me and stand and call upon the name of the LORD his God, and wave his hand over the place and cure the leper.

Zephaniah 3:9 - "For at that time I will change the speech of the peoples to a pure speech, that all of them may call upon the name of the LORD and serve him with one accord.

Call on the Lord

<u>2 Timothy 2:22</u> - So flee youthful passions and pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace, along with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart.

Cry out to me

Exodus 22:23 - If you do mistreat them, and they cry out to me, I will surely hear their cry,

Heard their cry

<u>Exodus 3:7</u> - Then the LORD said, "I have surely seen the affliction of my people who are in Egypt and have heard their cry because of their taskmasters. I know their sufferings, <u>Nehemiah 9:9</u> - "And you saw the affliction of our fathers in Egypt and heard their cry at the Red Sea,

Psalm 106:44 - Nevertheless, he looked upon their distress, when he heard their cry.
