God's Bright Star Light of Epiphany

The hustle and bustle of Christmas shopping, the planning of Christmas dinner, the wreckage of Christmas Day gift unwrapping amid shouts of joy and squeals of excitement slowly gives way to the 12 Days of Christmastide when people are reminiscing about the year that has past, the significant events, the generational family traditions we have kept or have reframed, and we begin to wonder about what happens next in the year ahead of us.

Yet too often we are surprised by Epiphany when is God is revealing to the world what God is doing in our midst through Jesus the Christ. We know the story of the three Magi or was it four or more who came searching for the newborn king of Israel by following God's bright star lighting their path toward the manger. They came bearing three gifts to the manger that begins telling more of the story of Jesus' identity using symbols like gold for a king, frankincense used by priests in the Temple, and myrrh used in burials.

Then, there is the story of Jesus' Baptism by John in the Jordan River where people lined the banks of river seeking to be baptized as part of the change in the direction of their lives. For Jesus, this is another moment when God reveals God's actions to be with us in the middle of our lives and when God reveals again Jesus' identity and purpose for his life. A purpose that comes in sharp focus as we read about Jesus making a wonderful proclamation in the synagogue in Nazareth: God's Spirit has anointed him to preach good news, to set

captives free, and to declare God's "favor" on the world. Beyond that, Jesus declares, "today this has come true in your hearing" (Luke 4:21b).

As we look at the world around us, at the year that has just ended, and at all that lies in front of us, what might it mean to be told that "today" all this wondrous scripture about God's activity in our world is coming true? How can we live that out?

There are intriguing clues throughout the readings for this Season after the Epiphany: for example in the first sign that Jesus performs in John's gospel, Jesus and the disciples attend a wedding and Jesus' mother Mary simply tells the servants, "do what Jesus tells you to do." Jesus then tells them to fill the empty wine jugs with water and take them out to the chief steward, who announces this is the finest wine, foretelling how wine will be the symbol for a new life flowing freely and abundantly in our midst.

Then at the end of the Season of Epiphany we read the story of how the eyes of Peter, James, and John are heavy with sleep, causing them to almost miss the moment of transfiguration. Yet, by God's grace they do not miss it, and thus have a whole new context within which to see Jesus - a context of history and heritage. The history and heritage of God acting on behalf of the people Israel in the middle of their daily lives, and the history and heritage of God calling people to act as God calls them and teaches them to do.

Here in this our Season of Epiphany, all these stories reveal God is calling us in this present moment that lies before us to participate in what God is doing in our middle of our lives because the truth is God's word is coming true today in our time. God will be anointing us to be witnesses to people being set free who are held captive to false prophets and to ideologies imprisoning them, and to preach God's news of compassionate freedom, loving kindness, and peace in the joy of God's presence.

Having said that, what exact part will we have to play?

- Well, imagine God's Spirit anointing you to act. What are some of the actions you might be called to take? Who will hear your witness statement about God's presence?
- Remember that many of the scriptures in this season carry a sense of urgency. What happens to the world around us if we "miss out" by not acting with our own sense of urgency?

As you ponder these questions, may brightness of God's light illuminate your path into Epiphany.
