#### A NEW THANKSGIVING TRADITION

Several years ago, our family tried something new for Thanksgiving that has evolved into an authentic tradition. As November rolled around each year, we constantly heard the importance of developing a spirit of gratitude and wanted that to be true for us. Yet, there was a definite disconnect between our good intentions and our implementation. Said another way: we didn't do anything. The result was an unsettled feeling, so the four of us decided to take action in order to truly live out our thankful spirits. To walk the walk. Practice what we preach.

Said another way: to finally do something.

If you remember the old T-Mobile slogan from a decade ago, then the phrase "Who's in your 5?" may sound familiar. The cell phone company encouraged its customers to select five personal contacts to call for free. Our family creatively enhanced the concept.

It's simple; each November, each of us looks back over the past year and chooses five people who made a positive difference in his or her life. After developing our personal lists (the only rule: the five people must be non-relatives), each of us specifically expresses thanks to each of the five via note, text, email, or call. It's nothing elaborate, nothing overthe-top. Just a quick description of the "Who's in your 5?" tradition, followed by a couple sentences of gratitude for the impact that person made in our lives that year.

On Thanksgiving, we share with one another "Who's in my five" and why. The new result: our family celebrates twenty individuals (25 this year, now that I'm married) and a spirit of gratitude fills our hearts and highlights the holiday. We look forward to this tradition more than anything else.

Who can you personally thank this holiday season? Whether you do it at Thanksgiving or Christmas matters little. It's a tradition any family can adopt. Now it's your turn: Who's in your 5?

### Christmas will be different this year.

As I type these words, my thoughts immediately go to "Wow! That's an understatement. Our lives have been different since March with no apparent end in sight."

And still, our lives go on. We live with the "normal" day to day challenges of life, along with those that go along with Covid-19. And the holidays bring with them new thoughts to ponder.

How can I celebrate Thanksgiving and Christmas without friends and family? If we do get together – even for just a short time – how do we do it safely?

Session and the worship team have been pondering the same questions when it comes to Christmas Eve worship. We know that despite all of the warnings to social distance, there will be those of us who will have extended family who will share time with us in our homes. Some may be comfortable joining us for worship, some will not. In our effort to minimize our exposure to any potential germs, we are limiting our time together in worship to 30-40 minutes. And there is just no way that we can have the kind of inspiring, moving music provided by the choir and soloists as is our tradition. It is not safe for the choir members, soloists and other musicians.

It would not be safe for those in attendance in worship.

Taking all these things (and others) into consideration, session has decided that there will be NO in-person worship in our building on Christmas Eve.

HOWEVER, for those of you with internet access, you will have the opportunity to worship in your home with your family – with music – at a time that works for you.

Rev. Marie will prepare a Christmas Eve worship document (like she did at the beginning of our quarantine time). The document will provide the elements of worship, with scripture and music, and will be emailed out to everyone on the morning of December 24.

Christmas will be different this year.

But it will be Christmas – whether we gather together as a church family under one roof or we find a new way of welcoming the Christ child of love into our lives. God is with us and God will be with us.

Joy to the World, the Lord is come...and comes over and over again. World without end. Amen.

## **ADVENT RESURRECTION**

The disciples had been sitting around Jerusalem for three days. The crucifixion had wiped out all their hopes and dreams. In their understanding, Jesus was dead and buried, sealed forever in a tomb. It's not that they were struggling to find some thin sliver of hope. They were totally hopeless, finished, wondering what to do with the world in which they had been left. Then suddenly, Jesus was alive. The whole world looked different.

I hadn't thought about this until recently. If you read the Bible carefully you will discover that, for some reason, God chooses to bury things before resurrecting them. There was no reason why Jesus couldn't have just come down off the cross instead of being buried. But God chose for Jesus to stay in the tomb three days, just as God chooses for the wheat seed or the tulip bulb to stay buried in the cold winter ground for a period before it germinates and grows.

Perhaps you have noticed in your own life that the sense of resurrection does not come easily. It usually follows a period of despair and hopelessness. New life springs out of the darkness of winter. It may seem odd to talk about Easter and Advent together, but in fact they are inexorably linked. The open tomb is the reason we know that our wintertime waiting is not hopeless. The coming of the babe of Bethlehem is our reminder that God does, inevitably, come. In the end God will come to restore earth to the perfection that was intended in the original creation. It will be the perfection of the Garden.

And so the liturgical seasons are all linked together in one great salvation drama. And our prayer, in each season of life, remains the same: "Come, Lord Jesus."
