## Celebrating Resurrection and the Quotidian Pentecost

From the blast of the birthing
Of ten thousand galaxies
Jesus, son of Joseph and Mary
And son of God,
Exploded outward from his tomb
In radiant light and love
to fill the earth and the whole cosmos
with the fullness of divine life.

Paul of Tarsus penned it well
In a letter to his Ephesian friends:
"God has put all things under Christ's feet
And made him head of the Church, his body:
The fullness of him
Who fills the universe in all its parts."

I look up into the Easter sky,
Beyond the limits of this small galaxy
Far beyond the boundaries of my mind
Into billions of galaxies that glow
Like flaming Easter flowers
Filling the garden of the universe.

Oh, beyond comprehension,
Too vast for my little mind,
Is the mystery of Resurrection,
Is the wonder of the Easter nighttime sky,
Is the body of the Risen Christ,

Edward Hays' "Psalm of the Resurrection" reminds us Easter is not contained within one day but has implications far beyond our Easter Sunday celebrations into the entire creation of life where God's vision for an abundant and sustainable life comes alive in the interdependent relationships between stars, sun, sky, wind, sea, mountains and valleys, flowers and vegetables and fruits, and humanity. This psalm captures for me the celebration of God's new life in Christ still unfolding during the Eastertide season extending from Easter Sunday to Ascension Sunday to Pentecost when the next element of God's new creation-the Church-springs forth with the Holy Spirit blowing over the gathering of disciples as over the watery chaos before God's Word spoke creation into existence.

While Eastertide does continue the truth-telling Lenten narrative, doing so with the disruptive awareness that the imperial power of domination and its imperial religion are unmasked as false hope, it also brings into sharp focus the good news of a resurrected life by a covenant-making God, who breathes life into Creation and whose spirit offers freedom and the real hope for peace and justice, drawing us into a life-giving relationship with each other and all life.

Easter Season call us to reflect on the ever-present possibility of transformation, turning points, and radical change that no one other than the spirit of the living Christ might imagine. On this journey, we are called to join the faithful witnesses whose lives and communities become testimonies to the realm of God for which we live forward, becoming the community empowered by the Holy Spirit to be the body of Christ in the overwhelming moment of Pentecost, coming just 50 days after Easter.

Just as Eastertide gives way to the fireworks of Pentecost, so will the loud rushing wave of apostles crashing into the street with their testimony of God's actions aimed at reforming God's people lead us onward to the daily faithfulness of Christ's followers living together as God's Beloved Community. Their struggles and trials to be the beloved community will instruct us along our own long, stony path of faith as we, too, seek to be God's beloved community in the quotidian reality of our lives when tasks of our daily living may be imbued with prayer, seeking the wonder of God's new heaven and new earth coming alive around us and within us.

May we seek resurrection in every waking moment and in our nights of healing rest and refreshment.

## PER CAPITA, JUST IN CASE YOU WERE WONDERING

Recently, the subject of our church per capita obligation was a topic of discussion at the session's monthly meeting. It came to me that I knew very little about per capita...how it's used...how it's determined...and why it matters. So, I thought I would share with you what I've learned. First, I went to the PC-USA website. It turns out that it's a wealth of well thought out information on this and many other topics concerning Presbyterians.

What is per capita? The official definition: Congregations, through their sessions, pay an annual amount of money per church member (per capita apportionment) to their presbyteries.

"Per capita is an opportunity for all members of the Presbyterian church, through midcouncils, to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians"

If you can say that sentence in one breath, you are doing better than me!! What it boils down to is that per capita money supports what we do, and how we do it, as Presbyterians. The many functions of our General Assembly, area Synods and Presbyteries are

supported by this funding in order that we mutually share the costs of coming together to discern how God's Spirit will lead us into the future. Some of these are:

- to bring our church's presence to ecumenical groups and gatherings in our nation and worldwide.
- to provide funding for expenses related to a General Assembly meeting, including the cost of holding the meeting.
- the costs associated with bringing together presbytery and synod church leaders for educational events and those who serve on permanent General Assembly committees.
- publish our Book of Order and develop other resources for our common spiritual growth including the administration of ordination exams.

Someone much wiser than me once told me "Don't tell me what you believe. Instead tell me how you spend your money and I can tell you what you believe." Today I invite each of us to review our per capita giving because it is vitally important that we have a loud and clear voice to bring Christ's message of compassion, service and love to places that now need it more than ever. Do it today because tomorrow depends on it.

# Attention all of you Singers, Instrumentalists and Music Lovers! SUMMER MUSIC SIGN-UP


