When gynecologist Dr. Alan Johns is diagnosed with breast cancer, irony slaps him square in the scrubs. Thrust into a healthcare system he thought he'd mastered, he fumbles through treatment—giving new meaning to “doctors are the worst patients”—and navigates the hilarious discomfort of becoming Exhibit A to his all-female patients.

SYNOPSIS

The Lump is a sharp, heartfelt dramedy that follows Dr. Alan Johns, a respected gynecologist with a thriving practice and a seemingly perfect life—until everything shifts with a diagnosis he never saw coming. When a suspicious lump in his chest turns out to be invasive ductal carcinoma—male breast cancer—Alan is abruptly thrust from doctor to patient, forced to navigate a healthcare system he once thought he had mastered.

With years of experience telling his all-female patients what to do in similar scenarios, the irony isn't lost on him. Suddenly, he's on the receiving end of mammograms and mastectomy consults, fumbling through a surreal and darkly funny crash course in vulnerability, humility, and self-discovery.

Set against flashbacks to his small-town Texas roots, med school misadventures, and a butcher-block childhood that honed his surgical hands, the film charts Alan's physical battle with cancer—and the emotional transformation that comes with it. From cutting meat to cutting tumors, his journey is layered with self-deprecating humor, poignant reflection, and the bittersweet awkwardness of becoming "Exhibit A" to his own patients.

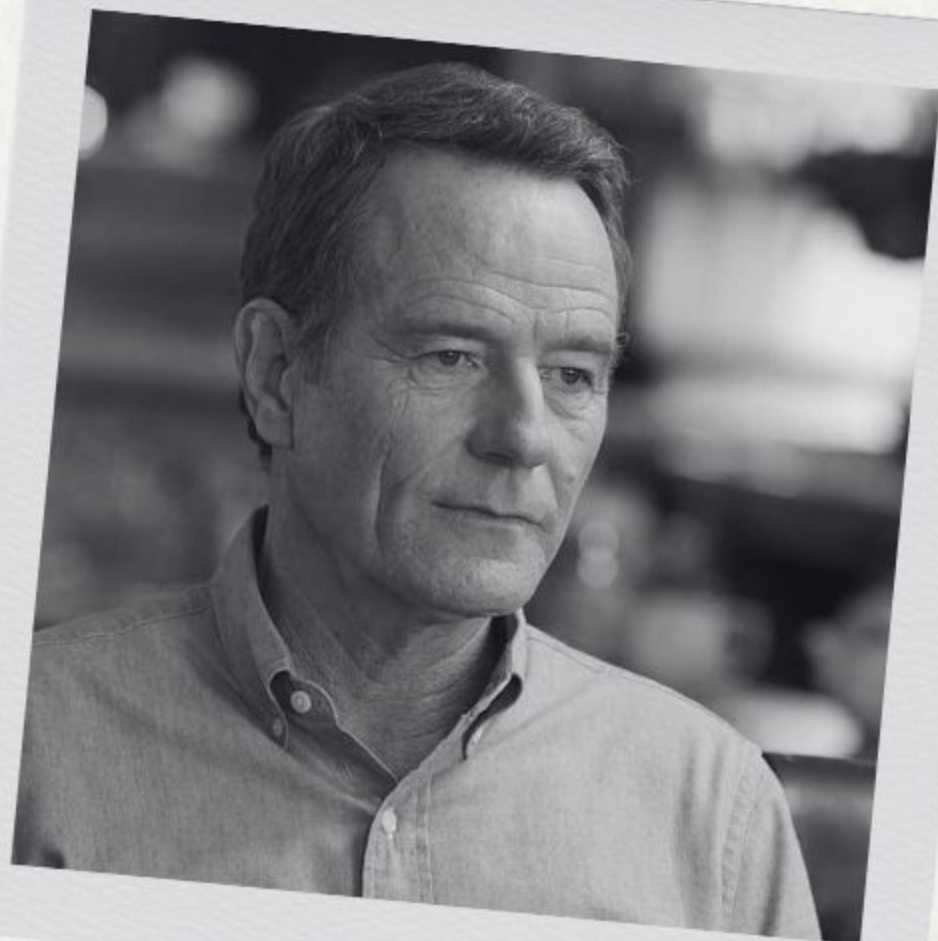
As treatment begins, Alan grapples with chemo, surgical drains, hot flashes, and the shifting perceptions of those around him. Stripped of his doctor's armor, he confronts old biases, battles self-doubt, and leans on his fiercely supportive wife, Jenny—whose quiet strength anchors him through his most unsteady moments.

More than just a medical story, The Lump is a tale of resilience, reckoning, and renewal. It shines a light on a rarely discussed condition, challenges gender assumptions, and offers a surprisingly uplifting perspective on what it means to lose control—and find something better in its place.

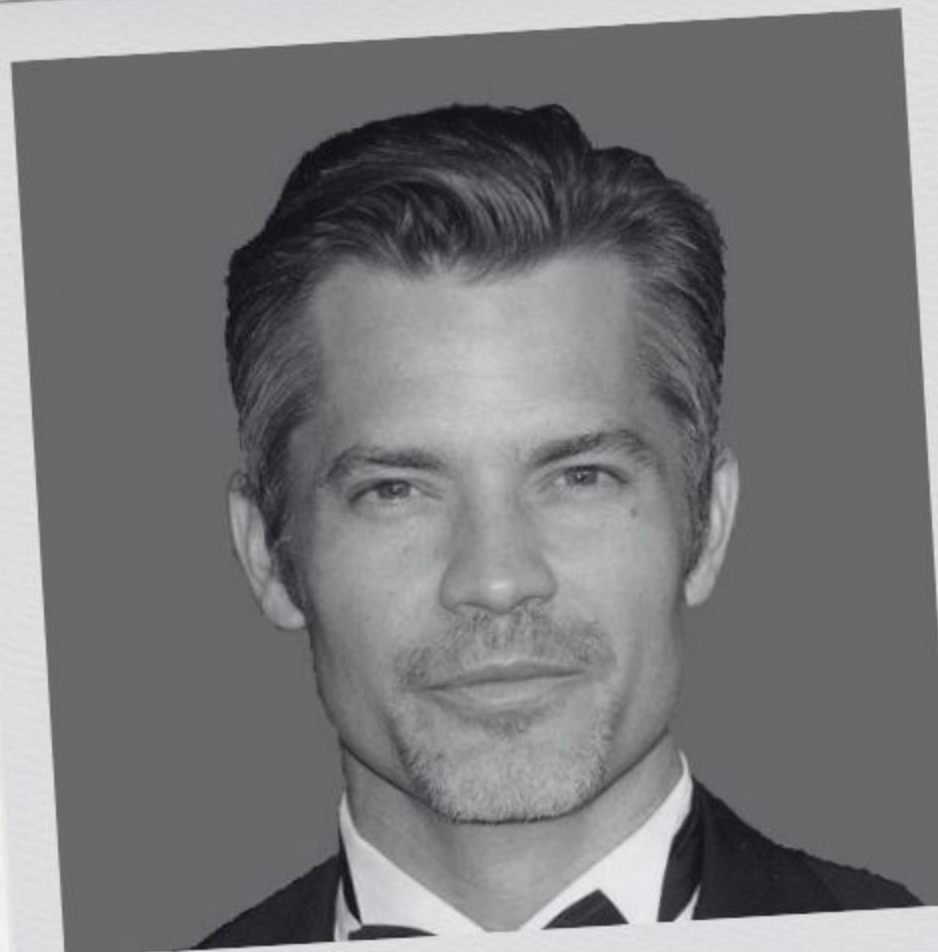

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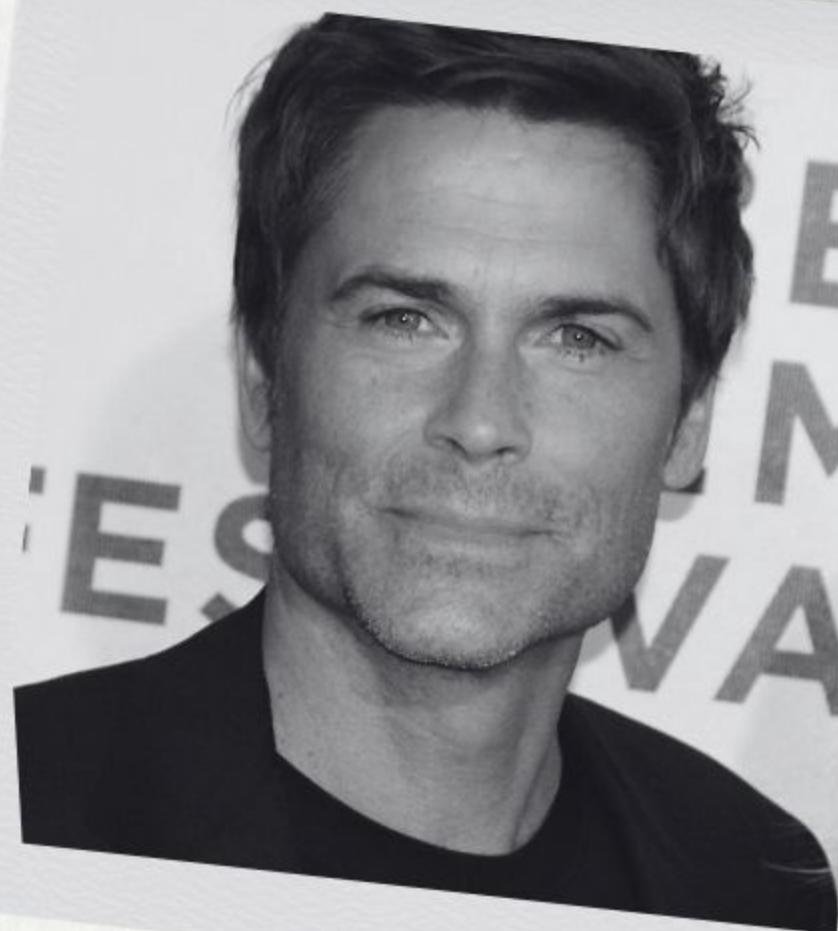

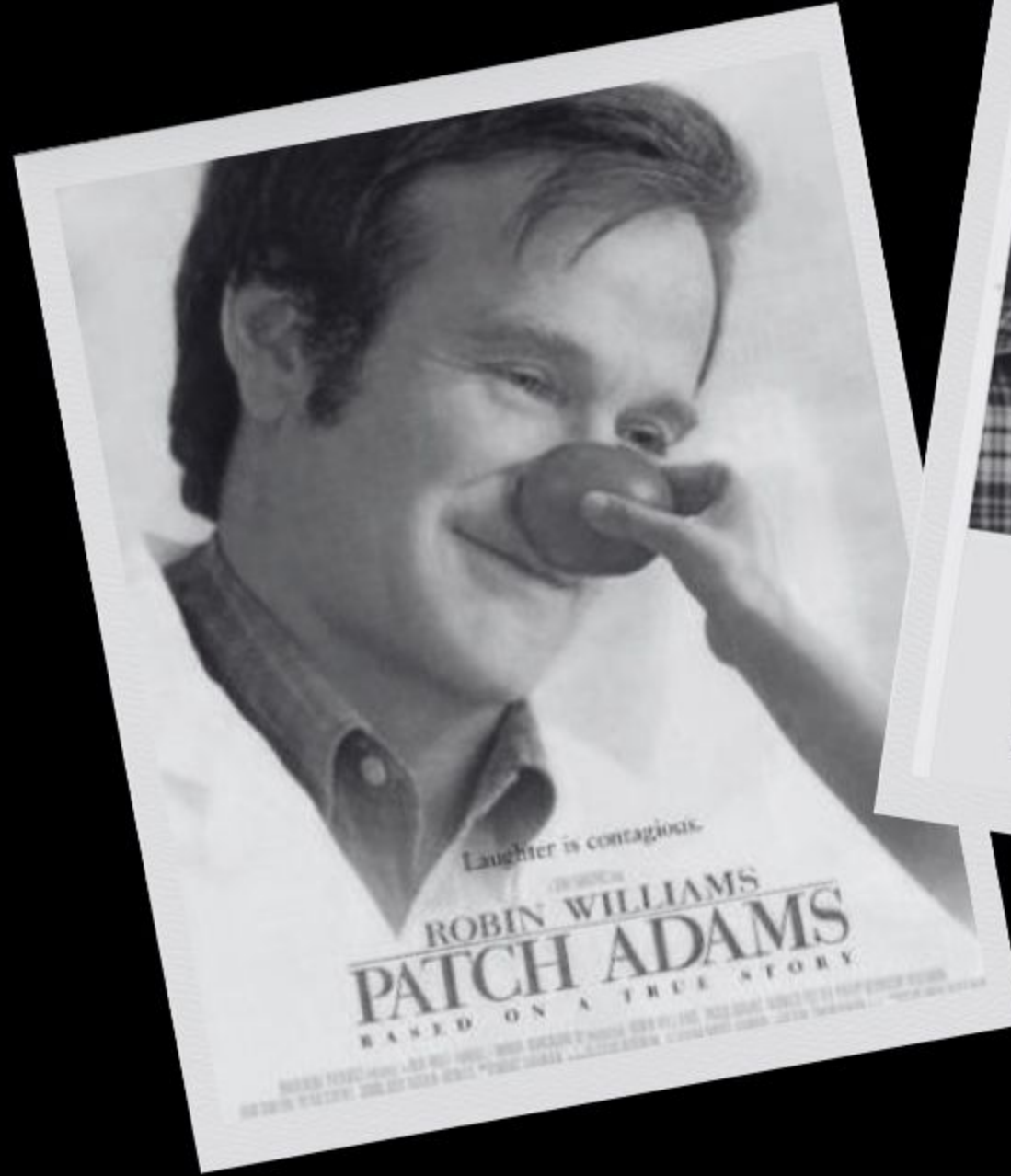
