Richey gave an informal talk about herbs. Janis focused on the differences among herbs, their growing seasons and particular characteristics. She distributed copies of the LSU



# **Giving Thanks** and Care

Every November, I find myself thinking about the families who sit across from me in my office, families trying to make sense of change they didn't expect. Maybe that's why this story from one of my clients, whom I'll call Laura, stayed with me. She told it not long

after a particularly difficult Thanksgiving some years ago, and I think about it every year around this

Laura's Thanksgiving had all the usual pieces: the smell of roasted turkey, cousins laughing in the living room, her mom humming in the kitchen. But this year felt different. Her mom, once the center of every holiday meal, was quieter. She moved a little slower. Earlier in the day, she'd forgotten where the serving spoons were kept something she'd known for decades.

Laura said she had been noticing changes for a while. Missed appointments, unpaid bills, stories repeated word for word. Her brothers said she was overreacting, but when her mom burned her hand on the oven door that afternoon, no one could ignore it anymore. It was a small accident, but it changed everything.

After dinner, when the house had finally settled, Laura gathered her family around the table. They talked honestly for the first time about what might come next-who would help with bills, who could take their mom to appointments, what she'd want if her health declined. Laura mentioned that she'd spoken with an attorney about powers of attorney, advance directives, and long-term care options. She thought maybe it was time to get those things in order. Her brothers resisted at first. They told her Not today and But it's Thanksgiving! But Laura reminded them that it was exactly the right time. They were all together, and they could talk before a crisis forced them to. By the end of the evening, they'd agreed to meet with an attorney after the holidays to put a plan in place.

That's the part I wish more families understood is that planning doesn't make these situations disappear, but it does make them gentler. A power of attorney makes sure someone can step in to handle finances or make health decisions if needed. Advance care documents, like a living will, give loved ones clear quidance about what kind of medical care is wanted.

And having a plan for long-term care and how to pay for it, whether at home or in a facility, helps families make choices based on love, not panic.

Holidays often bring these things into focus. When we gather, we notice small changes we might miss during the rest of the year, like a forgotten name, an unsteady walk, a repeated question. Those moments can feel scary, but they can also be invitations to start a conversation.

It's never easy to bring up topics like aging or illness around the dinner table, but planning ahead means fewer surprises, fewer disagreements, and more peace of mind for everyone involved. If you see signs that someone you love may need more support, talk about it. Not as a legal task, but as a family act of care. These conversations protect the very thing we value most: the time we have together.

Our firm's mission has always been to help families plan for life's unexpected turns so they can spend less time worrying and more time living fully. This Thanksgiving, as you sit around your own table, I hope Laura's story reminds you that love and preparation go hand in hand.

When Laura shared this story with me, I could hear the mix of relief and sadness in her voice. Her mom's memory wasn't what it used to be, but at least now, her family was working as a team. They were going make a plan.







# Three Social Security myths: What you need to know

Social Security is a cornerstone of retirement planning for millions of Americans. But with so much information floating around, it's easy to get confused about how the program really works. Here are three common myths that could affect your retirement planning.

Myth 1: Social Security is going bankrupt
Based on current projections, Social Security isn't going bankrupt.

According to the 2025
Social Security Trustees
Report, if no changes are
made to the program, it will

need to reduce benefits in 2033, paying about 77 cents per dollar of the projected benefit.

This might sound concerning, but Congress has options to fix the shortfall. They could remove the earnings cap on payroll taxes, increase the tax rate or adjust retirement ages. With 79% of Americans opposed to cutting Social Security benefits (Pew Research Center 2024), lawmakers may feel pressure to act before 2033.

• What you can do: Focus on what you control. Social Security typically replaces about 40% of pre-retirement income for median earners who claim at full retirement, per the Social Security Administration in

2025. The rest must come from savings. Consider working with a financial advisor to make sure you're saving enough. And don't claim benefits early just because you're worried about the program's future – early claiming can permanently reduce your monthly payments up to 30%.

# Myth 2: Budget cuts will delay or reduce your benefits.

Budget cuts and staff reductions at the Social Security Administration won't change your benefit amount. Only Congress can alter how benefits are calculated. According to the Social Security Administration, payments to those currently receiving benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) won't be delayed. You may, however, face longer wait times when calling or visiting Social Security offices.

• What you can do: When you're ready to apply for benefits, start the process up to four months early. Use online tools when possible and have all your documents ready. If you need to visit an office, schedule an appointment in advance.

# Myth 3: Social Security benefits are no longer taxed.



The One Big Beautiful Bill Act didn't eliminate taxes on Social Security benefits. If your combined income exceeds certain thresholds, you'll still owe taxes on part of your benefits.

The good news: The new law created a temporary deduction - available through 2028 - for people 65 and older. Whether you're an itemizer or non-itemizer, you can deduct \$6,000 per person if your modified adjusted gross income is \$75,000 or less for singles (\$150,000 for couples). It phases down for income above these thresholds and fully phases out at \$175,000 for single filers (\$250,000 for joint filers).



Understand whether you
qualify for the new
deduction. Consider
selectively using taxadvantaged accounts like
Roth IRAs to help keep
your taxable income lower,
and make sure you have
the right amount withheld
from Social Security
payments.

Don't let Social Security myths derail your retirement planning. Focus on saving adequately and making informed decisions. When in doubt, consult with a financial professional for help navigating these complex decisions.








# "No. They're Just Like Us"

"Well I think I'll go and check out my partners in the woods again in the morning" was the message that I whispered to my wife as I was preparing for my bedtime. I had been hunting this one particular spot for several days in a row and had become part of the group of creatures that visited that area of the forest quite often. Each morning I was entertained by a couple of songbirds, several wading birds that stalked in the shallow water, a couple of resident racoons and squirrels, along with five whitetails. All of the creatures mentioned had gotten used to my presence and had kinda accepted me as part of the group being that I had not advanced to harm them in any way on my prior visits.

The group of whitetails that came every day to the feeding zone consisted of two grown does, two yearlings and a loner four

yearlings belonged to the largest doe and the other female did not have a youngin with her. Those three would arrive together and the other yearling, a button buck, would show up shortly after their arrival. It didn't seem to me that he belonged to either of the does. The deer herd knew very well that I was there and put up with my company. The older deer had a very serious demeanor while the youngsters of the group chose to take a bite now and then between making noise, jumping, bucking, and chasing each other around the forest. At times the older doe would show her displeasure for the interference as if to say "that's enough of that racket for now and ya'll need to calm down". I have witnessed this scene play out time and time again through my many years of outdoor experiences. As I watch these kinds of things occur I realize that there is not much difference in the way their lives are in comparison to our own way of doing things.

In conversation with one of my friends I once





mentioned the fact that while observing wildlife I had come to the conclusion that in many ways they behave a lot like us. He immediately came back with, "No, we are a lot like them". There's probably a lot of truth in that statement. What's interesting is the fact that the same species of animals may act a little differently in other environments of which they inhabit. A buddy of mine once told me a story of how a group of fox squirrels that he had hunted in one locality acted differently than others of the same species in another location not far from where the others resided. I replied to him that I had noticed that scenario play out time and time again throughout my life. Squirrel hunting from one neck of the woods to another can be a totally different thing to experience although the animals of each area are from the same species. The bass bite from one body of water to the other can be drastically different in many ways. I've hunted turkeys in several states and for whatever reason, although they're all turkeys they surely can have different personalities from one zip code to the other. Whitetails can act much differently from one environment to the other. West Texas deer will do things that would really surprise me to see one of our homeland deer do. Waterfowl definitely can change the nature of their

activities from one region to the next. When was the last time that you've seen mallards or other puddle ducks grazing in dry grain fields?

To put it all in perspective of the way animals and humans differ from one area to another I must look at our own sense of being. Folks from my locality talk and act, to some degree, much different than those from our neighboring parish of Livingston. People there differ in many ways from those of New Orleans, Alexanderia, Belle River, Canada, etc. The list is world wide. We are all human beings and although we are the same in many ways we all are much different people in many other ways. Culture can change drastically with changes of the environmental landscape. These differences not only affect mankind and our way of doing things, they can affect all the creatures of our earth.

Whether we are like them or they are like us I don't know. One thing is for sure. Although us and them are just alike in many ways, us and them are much different in many ways within other parts of the world. So I guess that means that we're all alike. Figure that one out.



Part of my duties with the magazine along with sales was as Art Director and I put the pages together. At 4am I




was finishing the magazine and realized I had one ad space left and available. To fill the space I put an ad for myself and my portable DJ service in the space.





















