
Garden Gifts

Looking back, the club mourned the loss of Shirley Lyons in December. She was a 27-year member who happily served in many capacities. She contributed generously while making lifelong
















friends in the Gonzales Garden Club. The club sent condolences to Shirley's family.

Landscaping Don'ts

Knowing what not to do when it comes to your home landscape can save you time and money in long run.

Be sure not to commit the landscaping don'ts.

Thinking short term. No matter the size of your home landscape, developing a long-term landscape plan can save you a lot of headache down the road. Your landscape plan can be as simple as a list with your long-term goals. Do you plan to add a vegetable garden or chicken coop, build a shed, or put in a pool? Put those things on list and plan for them even though they may be years down the road. A more



detailed landscape plan may consist of drawings to scale of existing structures and plants, maps that include utilities and property lines, and list of desired plants.

Not considering a plant's mature size. Always determine a plant's mature size prior to planting. Try to envision the tree or shrub five or twenty years from now. When purchasing plants from a nursery refer to the plant's label, it should include the plant's mature height and spread. Plants that are too crowded or too close to a

structure may require additional pruning and eventual removal. Reduced air flow between plants can lead to increased disease pressure. Space for roots should also be considered.

Applying fertilizer without a soil test. Soil testing provides homeowners with the pH and nutrient value of their soil. It also provides recommendations on how to correct and improve the soil whether that be through additional fertilizer or changing the pH through the use of lime or sulfur. Applying fertilizer and other soil additives without a soil test is guessing game and can be quite expensive. Pick up a soil test kit in Ascension Parish at our LSU AgCenter Office, Louisiana Nursery, or Sac's Western Store.

Forgetting about wildlife. A landscape made up entirely of lawn doesn't provide food or habitat for wildlife. Instead,

work to create large natural habitats that are connected to each other. These are ideal and provide cover for many animal species. A variety of native trees and shrubs can provide berries, nuts, and shelter for birds and squirrels. If you don't have the space for large natural habitats consider adding a bird house, water feature, or other structure designed specifically for the wildlife you wish to attract. Dead trees that are not a hazard or an eyesore can be left as snags. Snags are trees left to decompose naturally.

Wildlife use nearly every part of a dead tree in every stage of its decay. For more information on creating wildlife habitat visit the National Wildlife Federation website.

OUR ESTATE MATTERS

Start 2023 Prepared: Reassess What Matters Most

If we have learned anything these past few years, it's that even the best laid plans may not hold up to whatever life has in store for us. For many, it's shown us who and what are truly important.

Estate planning allows you to reflect on your family, your priorities, and what actions you can take now to secure your future and that of your loved ones. With proper estate planning, you can find the thoughtful support you need to make choices

that best suit your specific situation. Start by asking yourself these critical auestions.

What Life Changes Have I Experienced Over The Last Few Years?

Significant life changes are a good reason to assess if prior estate planning documents you have in place need to be updated.

Alternatively, if you have recently come into assets or an inheritance and never had an estate plan, now is the time to put one in place. Consider the following examples.

 Seeing the final paperwork may have brought a sense of relief if you have gone through a divorce. But what if you have advance directives or a will that put your ex-spouse in charge of your affairs? While it is true that they may no longer have a claim on your assets, you may have appointed them as the person who should make medical decisions for you or who would be in charge of your estate. Is this still what you want?

For many people, the answer is no. If that is your answer, these documents should be updated, whether a will, health care proxy, power of attorney, or other directives.

 Suppose one of your parents has recently passed away. You may now be the owner of new property or be in receipt of insurance proceeds, savings, or other funds. If something happens to you, what would you like to happen to these assets? If you do not have a will, speaking with an estate planner is an excellent idea to ensure heirs of your choice benefit, instead of leaving the decision up to your state's default rules.

Many more life changes warrant evaluating whether an estate plan is right for you. Second marriages, the birth of a new child, or simply a change of heart as to who and what matters the most are all valid reasons to take a closer look at your current plan (or lack of a plan).

What Happens If I Become Incapacitated?

Another important matter to reflect on is what happens if you cannot make decisions for yourself. Instead of leaving your loved ones with the inability to act or an expensive court process to get the authority to act, you can execute a few simple documents now.

These documents are generally referred to as advance directives, but the terminology varies from state to state. They typically encompass three areas: power to act on your behalf to make medical decisions, power to act Happy New Year! on your behalf to manage your personal affairs, and access to information.

Many people with adult children are nearing a point in their life where they may need someone to look out for them. Having effective documents in place can make it less likely you are taken advantage of by others when you are in a vulnerable state. It also makes it more likely that those who know you best can communicate your wishes and manage your care, should the need arise.

 A power of attorney can give a trusted child power to help you manage your bills, help you apply for Medicaid, help you downsize your home, and much more.

 A health care proxy can tell doctors and hospitals who you want to make medical decisions for you.

 A HIPPA authorization can allow your children to remain equally informed about your health and ask medical doctors questions about your situation.

• Finally, a living will set forth what you would like to happen if a recovery is not possible.

A good way to look at the estate planning options discussed here is that they allow you to take control of the future and, once these decisions are made, put these worries behind you. The start of the year 2023 is a great time to sit down you're your trusted estate planner and review your options.

Can you count on Social Security?

If you're getting closer to retirement, you might be thinking more about Social Security. Specifically, can you count on it to contribute part of the income you'll need as a retiree? There's been an increase in alarming language surrounding the solvency of Social Security, but in reality, its prospects are not nearly as gloomy as you might have heard.

Here's the story: Under current law, Social Security is estimated to exhaust its trust funds by 2035, after which benefits could be cut by 20%, according to the 2022 Social Security Trustees report. However, the large cost of living adjustment (COLA) (8.7%) for 2023 could cause the trust funds to use up their resources sooner.

But this outlook may represent a worst-case scenario. For one thing, the cost of the 2023 COLA will be somewhat offset by higher taxes on workers contributing to Social Security. The maximum amount of earnings subject to the 6.2% Social Security tax jumped from \$147,000 in 2022 to \$160,200 in 2023. And in looking down the road, further increases in this earnings cap may also help reduce the gap in the trust funds. Increasing the payroll tax is another possibility for boosting funding to Social Security.

And here's a political reality: Social Security is a popular program and it's unlikely that any future Congress wants to be blamed for reducing benefits. Of



course, there are no guarantees, but it seems fair to say that you can reasonably expect some benefits from Social Security when you retire.

But perhaps the bigger issue is just how much you should depend on Social Security for your retirement income. On average, Social Security benefits will provide about 30% of a beneficiary's preretirement earnings, according to the Social Security Administration. But the higher your earnings before you retire, the lower the percentage that will be replaced by Social Security.

Still, you'll want to maximize the benefits that are available to you - and that means deciding when to start taking Social Security. You can begin as early as 62, but your monthly payments could be as much as 30% lower than your normal (or "full") retirement age, which will likely be between 66 and 67.

Even if you were to wait until your full retirement age before collecting Social Security, you'll also need to draw on other sources of funding. So, while you are still working, it's a good idea to keep contributing to your IRA and 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.

The amount you contribute should depend on your overall financial strategy and your financial needs, so, for example, you probably shouldn't put in so much into your retirement accounts that you feel significant stress in your monthly cash flow. But when you do get a chance to invest more in these accounts, such as when your salary goes up, you may want to take advantage of the opportunity.

Ultimately, you should be able to count on Social Security as part of your retirement income. You may want to consult with a financial professional to determine when taking Social Security makes the most sense for you and how you can also get the most from your other retirement accounts. You'll want a retirement income strategy that's built for the long run.


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Seeking to glorify God by helping people

We are run and staffed only by volunteers. We are always in need of people who can volunteer a few hours to sort










clothing and stock the pantry. If you are able to help and would like to volunteer please message us on our FB page CHC Closet & Pantry.

LSU No. 1 in Perfect Game Poll; Crews Named Preseason Player of the Year



LSU is ranked No. 1 in the 2023 Perfect Game preseason poll released Friday, and junior centerfielder Dylan Crews was named Perfect Game's Preseason Player of the Year.

The top ranking represents LSU's second in the past two weeks – the Tigers are also No. 1 in the Collegiate Baseball newspaper preseason poll that was released on December 20.

The Tigers will begin reporting back to campus next week, as full-squad preseason practice begins on January 27. The 2023 season starts on February 17, when LSU plays host to Western Michigan in Alex Box Stadium, Skip Bertman Field.

LSU returns six position players that started in a significant number of the



Tigers' 62 games last season, including Crews, the 2022 SEC Co-Player of the Year and a consensus first-team All-American last season.

Crews, also named Collegiate Baseball's 2023 Preseason Player of the Year, batted .349 last season with 11 doubles, four triples, 22 homers, 72 RBI and 73 runs. The Tigers' centerfielder was named a semifinalist last season for the Golden Spikes Award and for the Dick Howser National Player of the Year Award.

He finished the season as the SEC leader in runs scored (73), and he was No. 2 in the league in triples (4), No. 3 in RBI (72), No. 3 in total bases (172), No. 4 in home runs (22), No. 4 in slugging percentage (.691), No. 5 in hits (87), No. 5

in on-base percentage (.463) and No. 8 in walks (42).

Crews, a Longwood, Fla., native, also received 2022 SEC Community Service Team and SEC All-Defensive Team recognition. He played last summer with the U.S. Collegiate National Team, helping lead Team USA to a bronze medal at Honkbalweek Haarlem in the Netherlands.



Four Tigers Receive Collegiate Baseball 2023 Preseason All-America Recognition


Four LSU players received 2023 Preseason All-America recognition Monday from Collegiate Baseball newspaper.

Junior centerfielder Dylan Crews, junior right-handed pitcher/utility player Paul Skenes, and sophomore third baseman/DH Tommy White were voted to the First-Team All-America squad, and junior first baseman Tre' Morgan was granted Second-Team All-America honors.









LSU leads the nation with three first-team selections: Tennessee, Florida and Stanford each have two players voted to the first team.

Crews, also named Collegiate Baseball's 2023 Preseason Player of the Year, was voted a 2022 consensus First-Team All-American and the SEC Co-Player of the Year, batting .349

with 11 doubles, four triples, 22 homers, 72 RBI and 73 runs. The Tigers' centerfielder was named a semifinalist last season for the Golden Spikes National Player of the Year

He finished the season as the SEC leader in runs scored (73), and he was No. 2 in the league in triples (4), No. 3 in

Award and for the Dick Howser Award.

RBI (72), No. 3 in total bases (172), No. 4 in home runs (22), No. 4 in slugging percentage (.691), No. 5 in hits (87), No. 5 in on-base percentage (.463) and No. 8 in walks (42).

Crews, a Longwood, Fla., native, also received 2022 SEC Community Service Team and SEC All-Defensive Team recognition. He played this summer with the U.S. Collegiate National Team, helping lead Team USA to a bronze medal at Honkbalweek Haarlem in the Netherlands.

Skenes, who transferred to LSU this season after two years at Air Force, enjoyed an exceptional 2022 season both on the mound and at the plate, earning first-team All-America recognition.

Skenes, a product of Lake Forest, Calif., recorded a 2.96 ERA and 96 strikeouts in 85.2 innings (15 starts) for Air Force, limiting opponents to a .224 batting average. He also hit .314 with 10 doubles, 13 homers and 38 RBI. In 2021, Skenes posted a 2.70 ERA while batting .410 with 11 homers and 43 RBI.

White, a product of St. Pete Beach, Fla., transferred to LSU after an incredible 2022 freshman season at North Carolina State, where he was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Freshman of

the Year.


White hit .362 last season with 85 hits, 12 doubles, 27 home runs, 74 RBIs and a .757 slugging percentage, setting the NCAA freshman record for homers in a season. He had 26 multi-hit games and 19 multi-RBI outings, and he finished the year on 26-game reached base streak.

Morgan, a 2022 SEC All-Defensive Team selection, hit .324 in 2022 with 18 doubles, one triple, five homers, 54 RBI and 50 runs. The New Orleans, La., native joined Crews this summer as a member of the U.S. Collegiate National Team that claimed the bronze medal at Honkbalweek Haarlem in the Netherlands.

Morgan batted .500 (6-for-12) in the Tigers' three-game sweep at Vanderbilt (May 19-21) with four doubles, three RBI and five runs, and he delivered the game-winning two-out, two-run single in the top of the ninth inning at Mississippi State (April 8), erasing a 2-1 deficit and sparking LSU to a 5-2 victory.

As a true freshman in 2021, Morgan earned Freshman All-America, Second-Team All-SEC and SEC All-Defensive Team recognition.

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

















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East Ascension Sportsmans League Bass Club News

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








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















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Crab & Apple Bruschetta



Executive Chef, John Donaldson

Yield:

10-15 servings

Prep:

15 minutes

Cook:

10 minutes

Serving: 4

Ingredients:

8 ounces fresh Jumbo Lump crabmeat

1 small loaf French bread

1 Granny Smith apple

4 ounces Smoked Gouda (whatever cheese you like)

8 cherry tomatoes

1 ounce fresh basil

2 ounces extra virgin olive oil

2 lemons

Kosher salt & fresh ground black pepper to taste

Method:

First thing you want to do is get those toast points cooked. Set your oven on 375 and allow it to preheat. Take your French bread and cut it into $\frac{1}{2}$ inch slices then lay them out on a sheet pan/cookie sheet. Drizzle them with olive oil and bake for 5 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove them from the oven and allow them to cool and get nice and crispy.

Next, grab your crabmeat and put it into a small mixing bowl. Drizzle the crabmeat with a little olive oil, the juice of the lemon (no seeds), and salt & pepper to taste.

Now get your cheese. Here we are using Smoked Gouda, but you can use any of your favorite cheeses.

Shred the cheese and set aside until it's time to use.

Take out your cherry tomatoes and cut them in $\frac{1}{2}$ and add them to the bowl of crabmeat

Thinly slice the basil leaves

The last ingredient to prepare is the apple. Remove the core of the apple either with an apple corer or simply by cutting off each side of the apple. Cut the apple into small cubes and put them into the small mixing bowl with the crabmeat and tomatoes, then drizzle with the juice of the last lemon (no seeds). This will keep the apple from turning brown.

LET'S PUT IT ALL TOGETHER!!!

Lay out your crispy French bread toast points and top them with the crabmeat, tomato, and apple mixture. Sprinkle the shredded Smoked Gouda over the top then finish them off with the fresh basil. Serve immediately and enjoy this fresh and simple to make dish as an appetizer or accompaniment.
