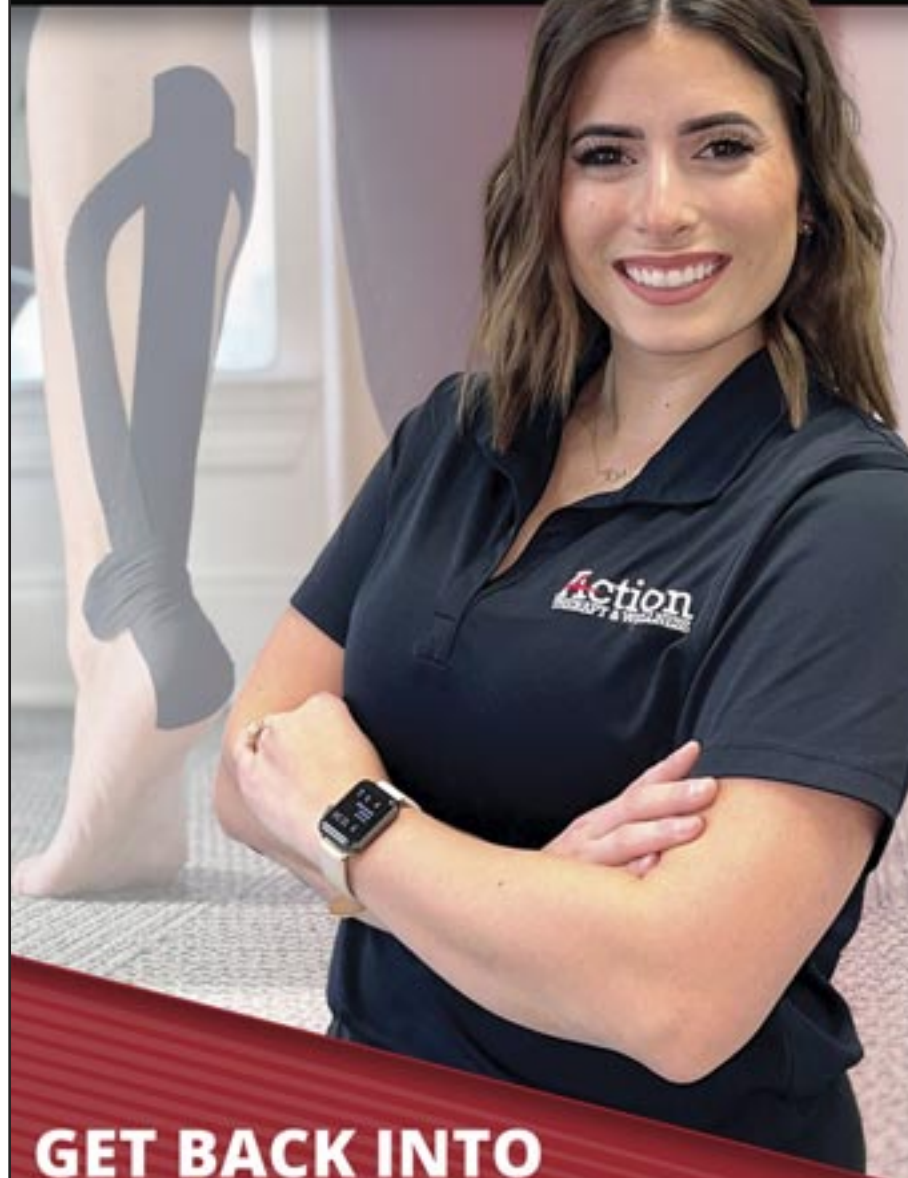

Know before you mow

Knowing the type of turfgrass you have is the first step in caring for your lawn correctly. The three most popular lawn grasses in our area of the state are St. Augustine, centipede, and

Bermuda. Other lesser grown turfgrasses include zoysia and carpet. All of these are considered warm season grasses, meaning

they grow faster and require more frequent mowing during the hot summer months. St Augustine is the most shade tolerant of the warm season grasses. However, even St. Augustine will struggle to survive in deep, heavy shade.

Mowing your lawn at the correct height is one of the most important practices when it comes to maintaining a beautiful and healthy

lawn. Reference the table to determine your correct mowing height. Scalping your lawn, or mowing too short, can result in a lawn that is stressed and more susceptible to pests and diseases. Additionally, weed seeds on the soil surface are exposed to more sunlight allowing for germination and growth.

The frequency at which you mow will also affect your lawn. Allowing your grass to grow too tall between

mowings can result in a thin, weak, and weedy turf as well. A good rule of thumb is to not remove more than 1/3 of the grass blade when mowing. For example, if your desired mowing height is two inches, you should mow before or when the grass reaches three inches.

Spring is a good time to ensure that your mower blades are sharpened and balanced. Mowing your lawn should result in an even, smooth cut. Leaf blades should not appear torn and jagged.

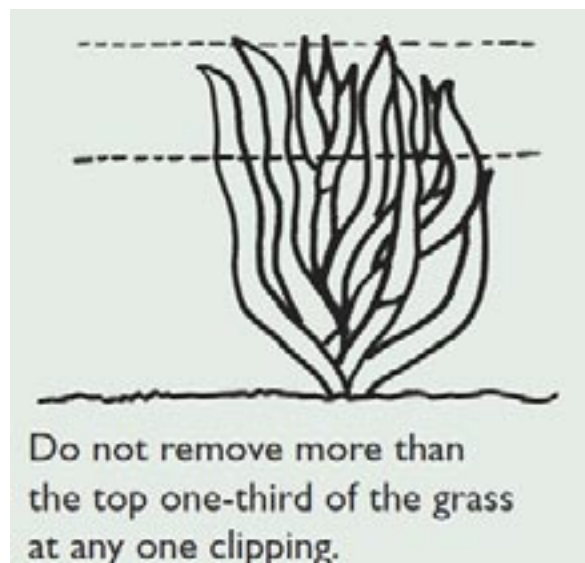
If your lawn has bare spots or holes resulting from last year's drought these can be patched at this time. Prepare the area by removing any weeds or debris and raking the surface until smooth. Soil can be added to fill in low lying areas. Patch the area

using sod or seeds. Homeowners with a St. Augustine lawn will need to purchase sod as St. Augustine cannot be propagated by seed. When purchasing seeds be sure to select the correct turfgrass species. Keep newly planted areas well-watered until the seeds have germinated.

YOUR ESTATE MATTERS

Crafting a New Path: Estate Planning Considerations After Divorce

Clients regularly ask me how often their estate planning documents should be updated. The best rule of thumb is any time a major life event occurs. Some of these major life events can be positive and fun, like moving to a new state or

starting a business. Of course, other changes, like divorce or a death of a loved one, are generally not positive and fun. Although divorces happen every day, when YOUR marriage is the one ending, it is not a common, ordinary event. Divorce can be a heated, contentious and emotionally draining time. With all the changes and upsets the divorce brings, it would be easy to overlook your estate planning. However, failing to check your estate planning documents and update them (if needed) to reflect your accurate, post-divorce wishes could be a serious mistake.

When we use the term “estate planning” we mean arranging for the management and distribution of your assets after you pass away, along with appointing people to manage your assets and make health care decisions for you if you become incapacitated. This process ensures that your

wishes are carried out and your loved ones are provided for according to your intentions.

In Louisiana, divorce automatically revokes gifts to a spouse in your will; however, until the divorce is final, an estranged spouse could still inherit. Also, divorce does NOT revoke gifts made in your will to your former spouse’s children or other relatives.

Also keep in mind that divorce does not automatically revoke beneficiary designations on certain financial accounts, such as retirement plans, life insurance policies and annuities. Gifts made to a spouse in a trust most likely will also not be revoked, nor will your ex-spouse be prevented from acting as the trustee of a trust you created.

If you named your now-estranged spouse to serve as your agent under a power of attorney, getting a divorce will NOT revoke that person’s right to act as your agent. By using this power of attorney, your estranged spouse could have an enormous amount of power over your assets or medical care. If you are considering divorce, it would be smart to verify the people who are appointed to act as your agents in your financial or health care powers of attorney, and take steps to change documents as needed to protect yourself and your assets from your soon-to-be-estranged spouse.

If your ex-spouse is named as a beneficiary of any of your accounts when you die, your ex-spouse will get these assets. Only you can prevent this from happening and you should start that process as soon as you are certain that a divorce is imminent.

During divorce, each spouse typically compiles a list of assets to complete a community property partition. Using this list of assets will be a good way to ensure you consider all assets you own post-divorce to update your estate planning. For assets that pass by beneficiary designation (such as annuities,

life insurance, and retirement funds), you should contact the companies holding the asset to change the named beneficiaries to receive these assets at your death. There may be some beneficiary accounts that cannot be changed until the divorce is final. For those accounts, you should update them once you receive the final divorce judgment.

In addition to changing beneficiary designations, you should meet with an attorney to review your wills, trusts, powers of attorneys and health care directives as complete revisions of these documents are often necessary. If you and your spouse used one attorney who jointly represented the two of you in creating your estate planning documents, that attorney may not be able to represent either of you without receiving authority from each spouse to waive any conflicts of interest. Therefore, it may be necessary for each spouse to find a new attorney for planning purposes.

If you are getting divorced and you don’t have any planning in place, that is also a good time to establish those documents to ensure you have taken control of your assets and decisions in the way you want.

Estate planning after divorce can be complex, requiring expertise in legal, financial, and tax matters. Attorneys who specialize in this area of the law can provide valuable guidance and assistance in navigating the legal and practical considerations involved in updating estate plans after divorce, tailoring estate planning to your unique circumstances and objectives, considering all the factors in your life, such as family dynamics, asset ownership, and tax considerations.

How is your retirement income taxed?

Once you're retired, you will likely need to draw on several types of income for your living expenses. You'll need to know where these funds are coming from and how much you can count on, but you should also be aware of how this money is taxed — because this knowledge can help you plan and budget for your retirement years.

Here's the basic tax information on some key sources of retirement income:

- **Social Security** — Many people don't realize they may have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits. Whether your benefits will be taxed depends on how much other taxable income you receive from various sources, such as self-employment, stock dividends and interest payments. You'll want to check with your tax advisor to determine whether your income reaches the threshold where your Social Security benefits will be taxed. The lower your total taxable income, the lower the taxes will be on your benefits. The Social Security Administration will not automatically take out taxes from your monthly checks — to have taxes withheld, you will need to fill out Form W-4V (Voluntary Withholding Request). Again, your tax advisor can help you determine the percentage of your benefits you should withhold.

- **Retirement accounts** — During your working years, you may have contributed to two basic retirement accounts: an IRA and a 401(k) or similar plan (such as a 457(b) plan for state and local government employees or a 403(b) plan for educators and employees of some nonprofits). If you invested in a "traditional" IRA or 401(k) or

similar plan, your contributions may have been partially or completely deductible and your earnings grew on a tax-deferred basis. But when you start taking withdrawals from your traditional IRA or 401(k), the money is considered taxable at your normal income tax rate. However, if you chose the "Roth" option (when available), your contributions were not deductible, but your earnings and withdrawals are tax-free, provided you meet certain conditions.

- **Annuities** — Many investors use annuities to supplement their retirement income. An annuity is essentially a contract between you and an insurance company in which the insurer pays you an income stream for a given number of years, or for life, in exchange for the premiums you paid. You typically purchase a "qualified" annuity with pre-tax dollars, possibly within a traditional IRA or 401(k), so your premiums may be deductible, and your earnings can grow tax deferred. Once you start taking payouts, the entire amount — your contributions and earnings — are taxable at your individual tax rate. On the other hand, you purchase "non-qualified" annuities with after-tax dollars, so your premiums aren't deductible, but just like qualified annuities, your earnings grow on a tax-deferred basis. When you take payments, you won't pay taxes on the principal amounts you invested but the earnings will be taxed as ordinary income. We've looked at some general rules governing different sources of income, but you should consult your tax professional about your specific situation. Ultimately, factors such as your goals, lifestyle and time horizon should drive the decisions you make for your retirement income. Nonetheless, you may want to look for ways to control the taxes that result from your various income pools. And the more you know about how your income is taxed, the fewer unpleasant surprises you may experience.

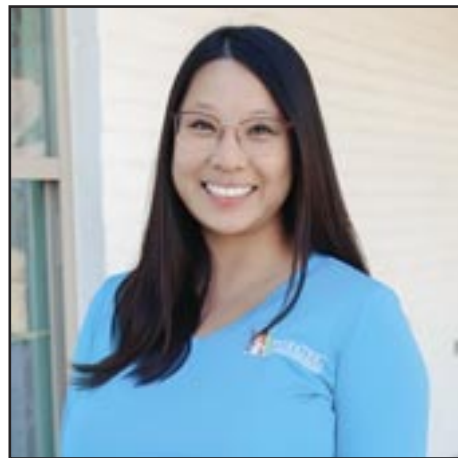
Juggling the Act of Parental Burnout: Don't Let it Take Your Flame

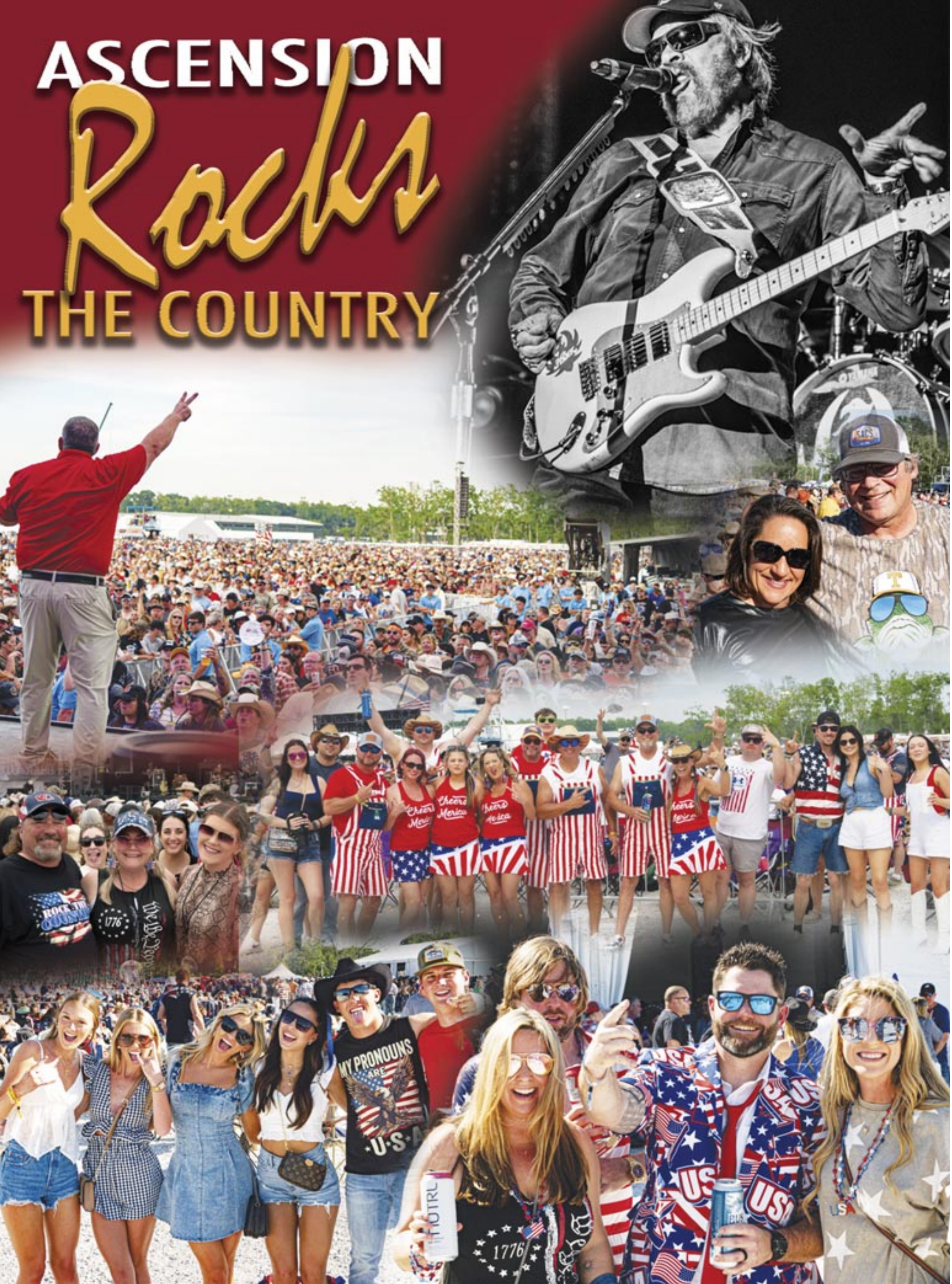

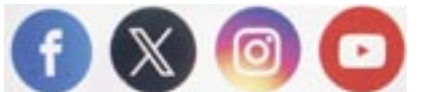


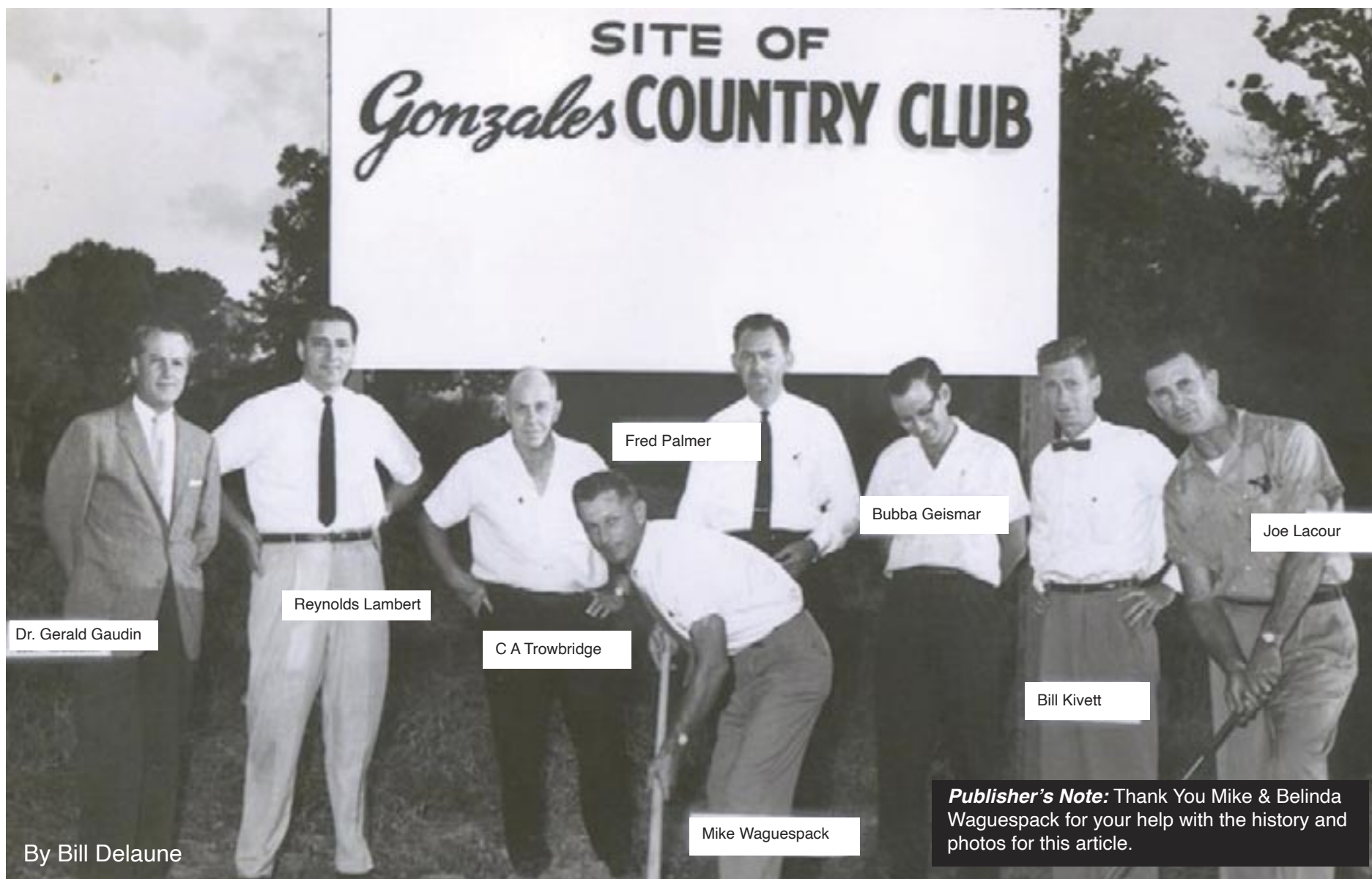

Remembering Gonzales Country Club-1961-2007

A simple one-line post by a Facebook friend-let's call him T-Fred-a few weeks ago struck a personal nerve. It read...

"Days like this make me miss Gonzales Country Club..."

Maybe it was after a bad round at Pelican. Or maybe he didn't make it over the water on 18 at Santa Maria and ended his round with a snowman.

But probably it was just that nostalgic feeling that haunts all of us who were a part of the "one of a kind" Gonzales Country Club (GCC) and the major part it played in our lives.

By the way, apparently I wasn't the only one-T-Fred's post got about 100 likes and over 35 comments in just a matter of minutes after posting.

Where does one even start...?

GCC was founded in late 1961 when a group of Gonzales businessmen composed a charter. The clubhouse was dedicated in 1962 and the golf course opened two

years later. Later, the club would add a swimming pool which became the social gathering spot for young people during the summer.

When the tennis courts were constructed, a new group joined in the growing membership setting up some memorable matches with a rival group at St. Amant Park.

The social event of the year was the Mardi Gras Ball-complete with a king and queen, a court and pages. There were also jesters to provide entertainment-a group that I participated in several times. I realize that idea of me playing a fool might not come as a shock to many of you.

But the crown jewel of the property was the 9-hole golf course located just out of town on West Main Street and bordered by New River on one side and Cornerview Road on the other. The course was not long by modern standards-the first hole was a very reachable par-5-but the small turtle-back greens were a challenge



for even the best golfers.

Trees lined most of the fairways and water collected wayward shots to the left of number 7 and the front of the devilish par-3 eighth. A cypress filled-slough in the middle of the course could affect shots off numbers 5, 15 or 7.

There was a morning game for the early risers, the big noon game for the gamblers and a 4 o'clock game

for the earlier losers to recoup their money.

As more women became involved, there was a "Ladies' Day"-usually on a Wednesday-and mixed scrambles that combined both sexes for holiday tournament fun.

The Club Championship was contested over Labor Day weekend and later an extremely popular Jambalaya Tournament was organized and held in conjunction with the Jambalaya Festival on Memorial Day weekend.

But the wheels of progress cannot be halted and GCC ceased to exist in 2007 sending the remaining golfers scattering in different directions and leaving some unforgettable memories to all who played there.

In one fit of nostalgia a few years ago, I conjured up my own tournament-complete with many of GCC's most colorful characters-and even some local TV announcers to call the action and called it..."The Tournament That Never Was..."

In the movie "Hot Tub Time Machine", four guys wake up after a crazy night of drinking in a hot tub which transports them back and forth from the present to the past.

Well, I had a similar experience recently when I went to sleep in the bathtub after celebrating Cinco de Mayo at Las Palmas on a night where the half-priced margaritas packed a bigger wallop than a Julio Chavez left hook.

The dream or vision or epiphany that followed mixed not only some elements of the present and past but also crossed over into my ill-fated announcing career, the old Gonzales Country Club and the now-you-see-it, now-you-don't Jambalaya Golf Tournament that was revived a couple of years ago only to disappear again in 2010.

Obviously my recollections are foggy at best but basically it seemed that my two favorite play-by-play cohorts Lyall Boudreaux and Kevin Shillings were working this year's Jambalaya Tourney at the old GCC and I was the roving reporter on the 9-hole course. Remember, at Gonzales there were only nine greens with two sets of tees for each hole to create an 18-hole tract.

Golfers-both living and deceased-were participating and they drifted in



and out like a scene from Dickens's "Christmas Carol". The strange part about it was that a sports psychologist once suggested I hear the voice of a television commentator saying positive things during my pre-shot routine (as if I needed to hear any more voices in my head). But during this fantasy, I could hear TV announcers but one of them was me.

Confused? Don't feel like Delaune Ranger. Anyway, this is sort of the way it looked-and sounded- during my night in the tub...

Lyall- Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen, broadcasting live from the 2010 Jambalaya Golf Tournament at the luxurious Gonzales Country Club on the banks of the picturesque New River, I'm Lyall Boudreaux and-hold on we already have some breaking news from inside the historical 1962 style clubhouse. Kevin, what do you have for us? Kevin-Lyall, we're in here with the Super Seniors who have just completed their rounds and there seems to be some controversy in the scoring. Donald and Jimmy Arceneaux, self-proclaimed "cousins all our lives", played in a threesome today with longtime golfing partner Weber Mansur. This is the same trio that once gained notoriety in the 1960's when they departed Gonzales Country Club on a Monday bound for an LSU-Rice game in Houston and

missed the seven o'clock kickoff due to numerous stops in between.

But now -as they anxiously await a foursome anchored by Boogie Babin-several adult beverages have been consumed and the group grows restless while waiting not only the outcome of the tournament but more importantly the outcome of the side bet.

Jimmy, could you tell us about the holdup.

Jimmy- Four scores. All we need are four scores and we can figure all the bets. And I've already had seven beers. Hey, wait a minute. Four scores and seven beers ago-isn't that from the Bible or something.

Kevin- As you can see, Lyall, confusion reigns supreme in here. Let's see what Bill has on 18.

Bill- Kevin, we've got plenty of excitement out here as "Fast Eddie" Wilson is lining up an 18-inch par putt to win a Coors Light from playing opponent Bud Lambert. Lambert has refused to concede the putt even though both players are hopelessly out of the running because a beer changes hands on every par made in this brutal 2-man competition. Lambert seems to be saying some- thing-let's see if we can pick it up.





Bud- Won't take you but a second to sweep that in, you goober.

Bill-Wilson ignores the barbs and strokes it. The ball hits the right lip, makes a 360 around the hole and drops in. What a finish! Eddie can you describe that last effort.

Eddie- All-around good putt is all I can say. We may be high handicap golfers but we're scratch drinkers.

Bill- Lyall, is that some trouble at the pond on number eight?

Lyall- Unfortunately yes, Bill. After hitting three consecutive balls into the water, my uncle Lefty Boudreaux has thrown his entire set of clubs-bag and all into the pond surrounding the eighth green. Then remembering his wallet and car keys were still in the bag, he has crawled into the muddy slime with assistance from his brother Roland in an attempt to retrieve those articles.

Let's hope their LSU season baseball tickets weren't in that bag although this might not be a bad year to dispose of those ducats.

Kevin, looks like you have more confusion around the number two green near Cornerview Road.

Kevin- Yes, Lyall, a 3-man rules committee is trying to figure out where to place a ball hit by Pete Robbins that landed next to the woods and was carried off by a stray dog to Henry's Bar. The head of the committee-former judge Pegram Mire- has recused himself from the matter citing a close friendship with the defendant. That has created a stalemate between members Johnny "Tournament" Dupree and Myles "Catman" Bourque who have been fighting like-well, cats and dogs. Dupree wants the ball to be played at a "dogleg" to the hole while Bourque

favors Robbins going into the bar to play it as a "sleeping dog lies"-as long as he uses a designated driver.

The fast-playing Robbins has become frustrated with the delay-Pete, did you see what kind of dog took your ball?

Pete- Well, it looked like a cross between a bulldog and a shitzu which is appropriate because this is all a bunch of bull...

Kevin- Thank you, Pete, and Lyall, is that you down at the mouth of the Grand Goudene where it empties into New River?

Lyall- It certainly is, Kevin and in a startling turn of events, two of the tour's most visible players have withdrawn from the tournament. Mike Waguespack, who along with wife Belinda and Chad Braud, was instrumental in reviving this event in 2007, has just hit what he described as a "small bucket of balls" out of bounds here on number 10 and has dropped out.

Then seconds later, another battery of balls from the other direction-namely, the 15th tee-came off the driver face of Randall Aldridge and found the waters where he and his brothers once ruled the hunting and fishing world. Guys, can you briefly sum up what happened?

Mike- Lyall, it's just impossible to try and run a tournament and focus on playing too. That's why Jack Nicklaus never wins his Memorial Tournament-or maybe it's because he doesn't play any more.

Randall- I'm headed in to help brother Bama under that pavilion over there with the preparation of tonight's meal. Let's just say I'd rather cook than hook anyway.





Lyall- So there you have it. Bill, is everything all right over at the number six green. I see quite a crowd gathering.

Bill- All right is not the term I'd use right now, Lyall. A wayward shot hit by Nathan LaPorte off the number one tee ricocheted off some cement blocks and nicked short-game expert Lionel Glaze on the ear as he putted out on six.

But-unfazed by the graze, Glaze came out of a daze and continued to amaze with his putter ablaze.

Lyall- Statements like that are why you're always looking for work, Bill. Is anything being done to rectify the problem?

Bill- Right now club manager Woody Brown and former manager Tom Marchand are exploring some

possibilities. Let's listen in...

Woody- Maybe we could stretch a shrimp net between those two trees right there.

Tom- For what, Woody? You're not going to catch any shrimps out there.

Woody- You see. That's why we don't have any common robbery around here anymore.

Bill- Not since Wayne Delmore left anyway. What's all the excitement down in the slough, Kevin? Are the wetlands people up in arms again about some nearly-extinct palmetto?

Kevin- Not this time, Bill, but we may have just witnessed the shot of the tournament. Al "Chooky Looky" Kling hit his second shot on number five deep into these cypress trees and his ball wedged in the roots. Appearing

to have no shot, Kling assessed his situation while wielding two or three clubs like chopsticks when a roar from number seven distracted everyone for several seconds.

We were informed that Bubba Worsham had holed out his second shot for a double eagle on the par five. But that shot paled in comparison when everybody looked back to see Kling's chip shot come out clean as a whistle and nestle into the hole for a three.

Gee, Al, I thought you were stymied back there with roots all around and trees in front of you. How did you even get a club on that ball?

Al- Sheer talent, my lad, sheer talent.

Kevin- Lyall, what's all the commotion at 18?

Lyall- Kevin, another game-within-a-game situation. Hubbie Lavigne is claiming victory in the prestigious "Reindeer Games"-the brainchild of Chick Edmonston that involves longest drive and closest to the hole on the final hole of play. As I understand the rather ambiguous rules, a player must be on the green to qualify which would make Hubbie the winner. But Chick is claiming victory because he is closer to the hole but just off the putting surface-and because of his status as the games organizer.

Chick, how can you openly change the rules to allow you to win this time?

Chick- Let's just call it "fringe benefits" for the time being, Lyall. And don't forget, these rules are radioactive to last January.

Lyall- Did they ever get that mess cleaned up on two, Bill.

Bill- About like BP did with the oil spill. Robbins flexed his ample muscle and got a favorable ruling.

And I'm certain Johnny Dupree will still make his next Southpaw's gig despite the broken arm. But the big news here is that Mike Roussel shot himself out of contention with a 13 on this hole despite having a floating mulligan that he hadn't used. A mulligan, of course, is a one-time do over usually used on the first tee. But in this tourney, it could be used at any time. Mike, can you tell us why you didn't use your mulligan on that horrendous hole?

Mike- Well, Bill, I didn't think I was ever in trouble.

Bill- Okay, guys. Any ideas on who might win this thing?

Kevin- I think it will be a family affair with either one of the Brown boys-Dennis or Ronnie-or one of the Lavignes as in Sam or Jamie.

Lyall- I like the consistency of Chad Braud and Don Dixon right now. What about you, Bill?

Bill- I like Terrell Bourgeois-in a close shave.

And that's when I woke up. In the spring of 2010 with more wrinkles on me than the winner of the "Mr. Prune" contest. Still without an announcing job due to some incredibly bad puns. And still without a Jambalaya Tournament either.

The legendary Texas sportswriter Dan Jenkins ("Semi-Tough", "Dead Solid Perfect") often wrote about the Fort Worth golf club he grew up on called Goat Hills and the colorful array of characters that played there.

My personal favorite was Cecil the Parachute whose leaping swing often resulted in his falling off the front of the elevated tees.

However, with apologies to Mr. Jenkins, I believe the cast of characters that once roamed the hallowed grounds of Gonzales Country Club (GCC) would rival almost anyone.

The nicknames were as unique as the players themselves and a list of many of those pictured here would bear that out.

Also, the participants in the numerous betting games had a lingo all their own that the untrained ear might not be able to identify. For example, if you walked into the clubhouse for lunch before the noon game (that went off 15-20 minutes

before 12) on any given day, you might hear a variety of side bets being lined up.

"Okay, so Spit and Cheese got Lion and Cub 2-2 and 2 and Dr. Wedge and Fast Eddie are swinging the robin-all combos..." Don't try to understand-it was like speaking in tongues.

Of course, like GCC, Oak Hills was replaced by a subdivision. As Jenkins wrote, "It was swallowed up by the bulldozers of progress and in the end, it was nice to learn something could take a divot out of those hard fairways."

That sound familiar, guys? And just as Jenkins could not say goodbye to his beloved Goat Hills without writing endless stories about it, I couldn't say goodbye to GCC without one of my silly songs to try and immortalize its characters and their language. There will never be another place like it...

"Goodbye Gonzales Country (GCC)"

Jammin' with Goosie

The Amite River Wildlife Sanctuary

About a year or so ago I discovered that Ascension Parish is now the home of a beautiful piece of cypress-tupelo swampland known as The Amite River Wildlife Sanctuary. The property was purchased in 2020 by the Baton Rouge Audubon Society and has been opened to the public for the use of viewing wildlife in its natural environment since April of 2021. The area is approximately forty acres in size and is located in Port Vincent, La. on Many Gautreau Rd. of which basically intersects the traffic circle of La. 42 and La. 431. From the time of its beginning until now a significant amount of work has been done to the area by several volunteers along with the aid of scout troops etc. The mission here is to provide protection of diminishing habitat for birds, butterflies and other wildlife with special emphasis on neotropical migrants. It will also promote wildlife education, research, and conservation in cooperation with others of interest from our state as well as the residents and organizations of Ascension parish. The site appears to be an excellent place to view, photograph and study wildlife in their natural habitat.

You may think that exploring an area of such mention for someone like myself who has hunted and fished in many areas of our great country would not have much interest in areas of land that don't allow those activities to occur. That assumption would be far from the truth. I've had more remarkable experiences than I can count from my hunting and fishing experiences of the past but I do believe that

while being caught up in the moment sometimes you don't see the forest for the trees, so to say. Sometimes I believe it's good to leave the gun and fishing pole at home and enjoy God's beautiful creation of nature in another way.

I truly enjoy checking out areas of forest that are new to me. After discovering the existence of the newly acquired piece of land I decided to put on my knee boots and take a walk along the newly cut trails that offer viewing of the property and its wildlife. The site, although accessible, is in its early stage of development. The path offers a picnic table, walking sticks, several



benches for resting and numerous bird nesting boxes for wood ducks and warblers have been placed along the way. The ridges are occupied by pine and hardwood and the swamp land consists of tupelo and cypress. The trail basically skirts along the edge of the ridge and the swamp. During the walk you will encounter the existence of a couple of very old trees that have been in that forest since the Chitimacha Indian Tribe resided in the area many years ago. The large cypress tree along the trail was dated by the Louisiana Purchase Cypress Legacy Organization and is estimated to be between four hundred to six hundred years



of age. The gigantic live oak is believed to be at least three hundred and fifty years old. Looking at those old trees was mind boggling to me. As I stared at those monsters I just had to wonder what many events of things they must have encountered in their past lifetime. To this point of their

wild in its natural state forever for the public to enjoy. It would be nice to see more of the same in the future. Just recently the East Ascension Sportsman League made a monetary donation to the Audubon Society for the construction of one of the needed walking bridges along the trail. Several more small bridges along with other things as well are needed to make things more comfortable toward the completion of the project. The construction of these future needs could serve as fantastic projects for some groups of interest. Donations of cash, time or material for improvements would be appreciated by all means. The Baton Rouge Audubon Society has a great website and a very active email program that keeps all of interest in the news of what's going on and what is needed at the site.

I truly enjoyed my walk around the loop on that beautiful April day and I must say that it won't be my last time to do so. Parts of the area can be damp so if you decide to check it out please wear some small waterproof boots for the time being and bring along a picnic lunch as you enjoy a piece of property that is available to all of us for the future.

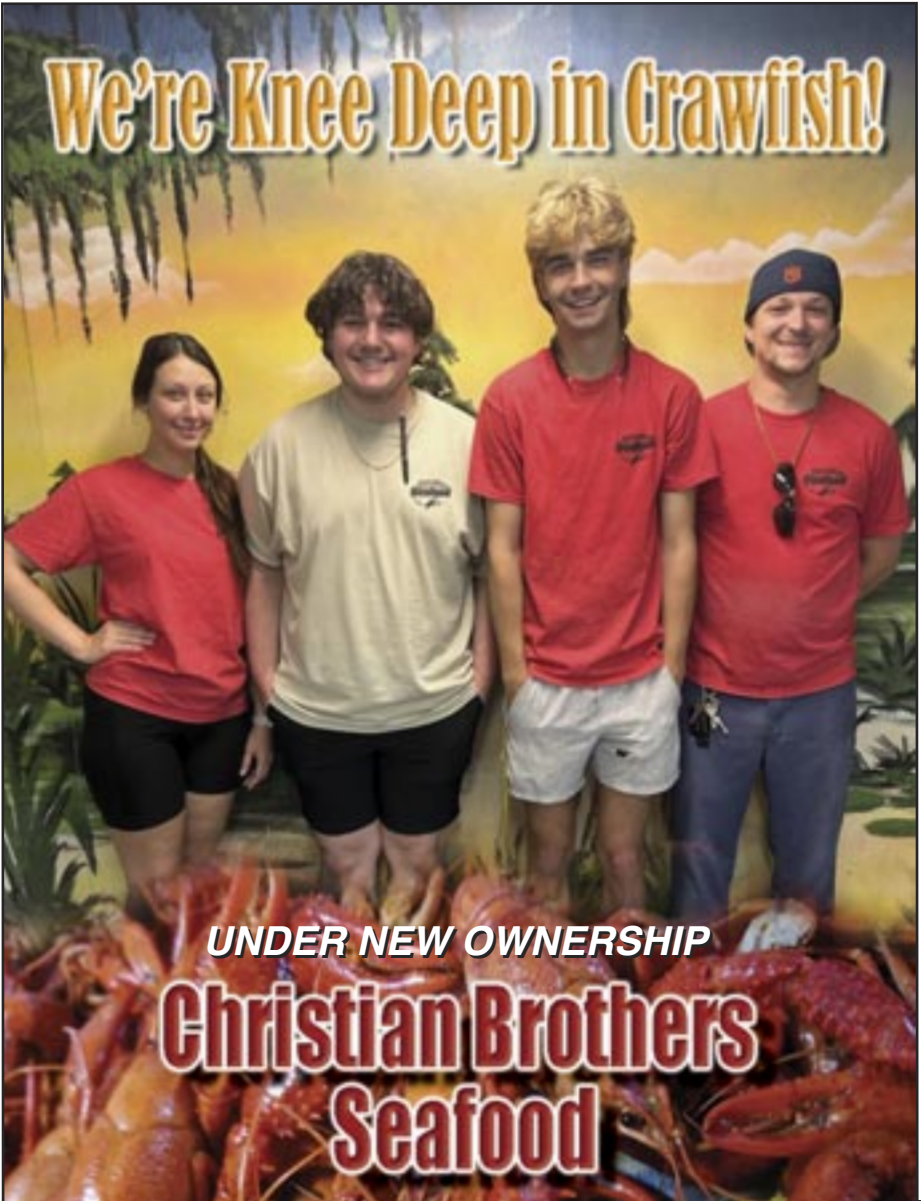
a two day total of 27 lbs. Big Bass winner was Warren Hebert with his Lunker that weighed 9.56 lbs.

The lights came up and Gene Simmons dropped his



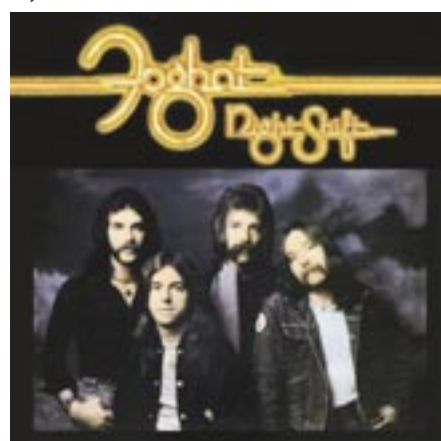

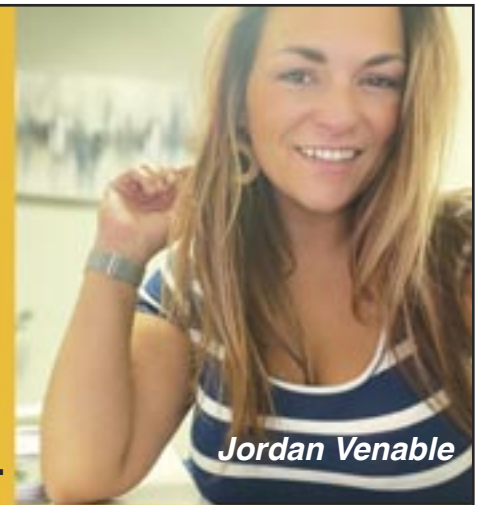

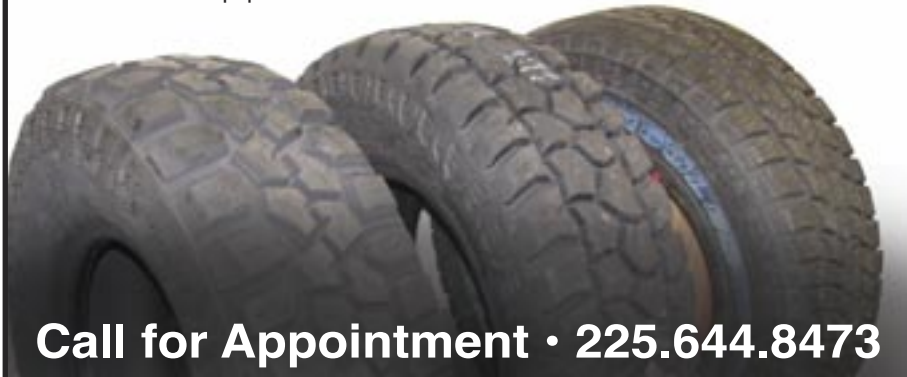

Heart of Romaine “Wedge” salad



Executive Chef, John Donaldson

Yield: 2

Prep: 20 minutes

Cook: 15 minutes

Serving: 2

Ingredients:

- 1 Head Romaine Lettuce
- 6 Grape Tomatoes
- 1 Red Onion
- Bleu Cheese Crumbles
- ½ cup Balsamic Vinegar
- ¼ cup Sugar
- 1 tsp Corn Starch
- Salt & Pepper
- Favorite Salad Dressing
- 6 Strips of Bacon (cooked crispy)

Method:

First let's get the Romaine lettuce washed up really nice. Run the whole head of lettuce under cold water, allowing the water to get in-between the leaves, then cut the Romaine in half length ways, and trim any brown discoloration off of the bottom core. Next, let it soak in an ice water bath to get nice and crisp. While the Romaine is crisping, prep the rest of your ingredients. Thinly slice or shave the red onion, cut the grape tomatoes in half, and chop up the crispy bacon. In a small sauce pan, bring the balsamic vinegar and sugar to a simmer. In a small cup or bowl, dissolve the corn starch in 2 tsp cold water then add to the vinegar. Stir the vinegar mixture until it returns to a simmer then remove from the heat and allow time to cool.

Put it all together!! Remove your Romaine from the ice bath and drain off any excess water. Place the Romaine in the center of a large plate and creatively place the remaining ingredients around or on top of the lettuce. Finally, drizzle with your sweet balsamic syrup and serve with bleu cheese dressing, or any one of your favorite dressings.

Top with grilled shrimp or chicken for a meal or serve as an hgacompaniment with a hearty meal.
