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

Tommy 'Bama' Aldridge grabbed his black iron pot and cooked a sauce picaunte and sold plates at the Gonzales Country Club and raised \$800 plus dollars. He divided it up and delivered it to these families.

Here Nineteen years later he has fed thousands of families. Now it takes a village to restore hope to raise funds through jambalaya sales and donations.

This year the Feed the Needy of Ascension operation sold 640 plates. The final tally is not in yet but it is \$27,000 plus. Here are the audited numbers for 2023.

In 1968 all I ever really wanted was to be accepted and a part of this community. Now I have hundreds of friends with 'x's' in their names and they have a friend who's last name is still an 'adjective'.

This month's horticulture hint is to pick green tomatoes before a freeze and let them ripen indoors in a sunny window. The floral design tip is to cut stems of plant material at a slant (for greater water absorption) with clean, sharp scissors (to prevent damage and contamination to the stem) while holding them under cool water in the sink (to keep air from entering the stem's vascular system).

The GGC anticipates meeting next month with other local garden associations for an educational presentation in the club's ongoing mission to gain and share knowledge with fellow members and the community. In the meantime, the Gonzales Garden Club wishes everyone a joyous holiday season and success in the new year.



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Age-Appropriate Gifts for Children: A Physical Therapy Perspective

When selecting gifts for children, it's important to consider their stage of physical development to encourage healthy growth and motor skills. Age-appropriate gifts not only provide entertainment but also help foster physical abilities in ways that support their overall development. Infants (0-12 months)

Tummy time mats with bright, contrasting colors or attached toys help infants strengthen their neck, shoulder, and back muscles, which are essential for rolling over and later crawling.

Toddlers (1-3 years)

At this age, toddlers are refining their basic movement skills like walking, climbing, and balancing. Gifts that encourage walking or climbing are excellent for promoting strength and coordination. Push toys, such as walkers or

toy strollers, encourage stability and improve gait. Soft balls or large building blocks help toddlers practice bending, squatting, and throwing, which enhance gross motor skills. Toys that encourage fine motor development, like shape sorters or simple puzzles, also support dexterity and hand-eye coordination.

Preschoolers (3-5 years)

Preschoolers are refining their coordination and balance, making it a great time to introduce gifts that involve more complex movements.

Preteens (11-12 years)

At this stage, children are refining their physical abilities and increasing endurance. Gifts that support more complex physical activities, like skateboards, sports gear, or tools for dance, gymnastics, or swimming, promote strength, flexibility, and cardiovascular fitness. Balance or stability equipment, like a balance ball or resistance bands, can also be beneficial for core strength and injury prevention.

Reflecting on your Legacy with an Ethical Will

Most attorneys can write a list a mile long about why it's important to get your estate planning completed. The reasons range from the legal to the practical. However, when we ask our clients why they think it's important to do

their estate planning, their answer is almost always the same and more sentimental than you might think. What is it? I want to make sure my family will be okay after I pass away.

In order to make sure we understand your wishes for your family, lawyers have to ask you a lot of questions about things you probably would rather not think about. How do you want to divide your money and property after you die? Who do you want to be in charge of your estate? Are there specific items you'd like to go to specific people? When asked these practical questions, it's natural for broader questions to arise: What do I want my legacy to be? What knowledge do

I want to pass down to the next generation? How will I be remembered?

Once the ink dries on your signature and you leave the lawyer's office with your new will in hand, you may be left feeling that something is still missing. Sure, your documents direct your assets after you pass away, but, what about those bigger questions?

Legally, your will requires certain language to make it valid. While this language will ensure your assets are distributed how you choose, those larger questions about your legacy and what you want loved ones to remember about you aren't addressed. However, an ethical will can help you bridge that gap. Unlike your legal will, your ethical will has no legal effectmeaning, nothing you put in an ethical will can be enforced through the legal system. The purpose of an ethical will is to provide a means of communicating your non-legal wishes to your friends and loved ones.

Unlike your legal will, there are no rules about what can or cannot be included in your ethical will. However, here are some common examples of things people like to write about in an ethical will:

- Experiences that shaped you
- What you believe in
- Your family stories and memories
- Advice for future generations
- · Blessings or apologies
- Photographs, recipes, and other items with sentimental value
- Explanations about how you chose to divide assets


Sharing values, addressing past issues, and seeking forgiveness are common results of creating and sharing your ethical will. Past conflicts and misunderstandings often spiral out of control due to a lack of communication. In our experience, one of the biggest reasons estate plans fail is because of lack of communication.

When the people in your family do not understand your motivations for why you gave someone a particular item, or why you chose one person over another to be in charge of your estate, the result can be contentious. In the worst cases, this can result in years of litigation and complete estrangement.

Going through the process of creating an ethical will in tandem with your legal estate planning is a healing exercise for many and can allow you to identify areas of potential discontent among your family members and address it directly. It forces you to think beyond the four walls of the attorney's office and ask yourself: What do I really want to pass along to the next generation? How do I want my family and friends to remember me? Estate planning is a great opportunity to reflect on your relationships and mend fences, and an ethical will is a powerful tool which could inspire personal growth and solidify your lasting legacy.

Learning to Read with the SLP

Many people are familiar with speech therapists and the ways they can help children. They are best known for teaching a toddler to talk, helping a child who stutters speak more fluently, and correcting how a child pronounces their "r" sound. Lesser-known areas that speech-language pathologists are uniquely adept in targeting are reading and writing. The same sounds that SLPs correct in a child's speech are used to blend letters into words. Those words and their associated grammar are often taught during language sessions. Reading is receptive language, and writing is expressive language only through the modality of text. These skills are a special blend of sound production and language which means they are right up an SLP's alley!

Before a child learns to read. there are sets of skills referred to as phonological and phonemic awareness that help with learning to read. These are prereading skills that help a child understand the units of language - sounds, syllables, words, and sentences. SLPs often start by teaching these skills, some of which include rhyming, segmenting, and blending. Then graphemes, or letters, are built into lessons to help with letter-sound correspondence. The same skills that are practiced orally are then practiced within reading and writing activities. Once a child starts to write in

sentences SLPs also help with vocabulary, grammar, and organization in their writing. From when a child is first learning letters and sounds



all the way to writing complex sentences and paragraphs, SLPs have the tools to help children succeed!

Children with speech and language delays are more

likely to demonstrate difficulties with reading and writing at school. By ensuring that these children are monitored while learning to read and write, we are able to identify challenging areas and provide the support needed to overcome these difficulties. If your child struggles with speech sound production, expressing themselves, rhyming, or sounding out words to read, they may benefit from an evaluation with one of our speech-language pathologists. We utilize a systematic and multi-sensory approach to teaching reading and writing skills in order to allow the child to see, hear, and feel everything as they learn.





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

































HOLIDAY THEFT PREVENTION



PROTECT FROM PACKAGE THIEVES


Monitor when your packages are expected to arrive and don't leave them on your porch or in your mailbox. Sign up for delivery notifications. If possible, ship your packages to your workplace or have a neighbor who is home during the day collect your packages for safekeeping.

PROTECT FROM CAR BURGLARS

Keep the interior of your vehicle clean.

Never leave gifts or shopping bags in plain sight. Lock valuables in your trunk or remove them before exiting your vehicle.

Remove all gifts and items of value from the vehicle when leaving it overnight.





PROTECT FROM HOME BURGLARS

A Christmas tree in your front window is an invitation to a burglar. Set up your tree in a location not easily seen by passersby or cover your windows with blinds/curtains overnight and while you are away from your home. Another option is to wait to put presents under the tree until it's time to unwrap them.

PROTECT FROM HOME BURGLARS

After presents are opened, break down all boxes and place in the garbage or recycling. If packaging is too big to fit in the receptacles, drop it off at the dump. Do not leave packaging materials outside your home for garbage collection. Leaving a box for a brand new TV, or other gifts, outside your home alerts thieves to high-dollar items inside and puts you at an increased risk of a home burglary.



Time for New Year's resolutions

Now that the calendar has flipped, it's time for some New Year's resolutions. You could decide you're going to exercise more, lose weight, learn a new skill, reconnect with old friends — the possibilities are almost limitless. This year, why not add a few financial resolutions to your list?

Here are a few to consider:

- Reduce your debts. It may be easier said than done, but if you can cut down on your debt load, you'll increase your cash flow and have more money available to invest for your future. So, look for ways to lower your expenses and spending. You might find it helpful to use one of the budgeting apps available online.
- Boost your retirement savings. Try to put in as much as you can afford to your IRA and your 401(k) or other

employer-sponsored retirement plan. If your salary goes up this year, you've got a good opportunity to increase your contributions to these retirement accounts. And once you turn 50, you can make pre-tax catch-up contributions for your 401(k) and traditional IRA. You might also want to review the investment mix within your 401(k) or similar plan to determine whether it's still providing the growth potential you need, given your risk tolerance and time horizon.

- Build an emergency fund. It's generally a good idea to maintain an emergency fund containing up to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. Without such a fund, you might be forced to dip into your long-term investments to pay for short-term needs, such as an expensive auto or home repair.
- Keep funding your non-retirement goals. Your traditional IRA and 401(k) are good ways to save for retirement but you likely have other goals, too, and you'll need to save and invest for them. So, for example, if you want your

children to go to college or receive some other type of post-secondary training, you might want to invest in a tax-advantaged 529 education savings plan. And if you have short-term goals, such as saving for a wedding or taking an overseas vacation, you might want to put some money away in a liquid account. For a short-term goal, you don't necessarily need to invest aggressively for growth — you just want the money to be there for you when you need it.

• Review your estate plans. If you haven't already created your estate plans, you may want to do so in 2025. Of course, if



you're relatively young, you might not think you need to have estate plans in place just yet, but life is unpredictable, and the future is not ours to see. If you have already drawn up estate plans, you may want to review them, especially if you've recently experienced changes in your life and family situation, such as marriage, remarriage or the addition of a new child. Because estate planning can be complex, you'll want to work with a qualified legal professional.

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


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An Average Joe Christmas-A True Underdog Story

Kid 1- But how did you get here, Uncle Bill? I didn't hear your'68 Dodge with the broken muffler pull up?


Uncle Bill- No, I thought I'd go with a more seasonal transport this year so I came in a sleigh pulled by some "deer friends" of mine.





Do It Yourself Verses Guilded Outings



We can't go without thanking the people at New Song Community Church for their generous and ongoing support. They have been so kind to us and our community.






A special thank you goes to the ladies Bible group at Ascension Baptist Church for the check they brought to us. It was used to purchase food for our clients.


I would like to thank the owner of Cut-Rite Tree Service for our office space and all of the other things he provides for us.

























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Cooking Gourmet at Home with SNO'S SEAFOOD & STEAKS



Baked Brie Louisianne



Executive Chef, John Donaldson

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 5 minutes

Servings: 4 servings

Ingredients:

(1) Brie Wheel 8 oz
Pecan Pieces ½ oz
Golden Raisins ½ oz
Purple Raisins. ½ oz
Honey 1 oz
Steen's Cane Syrup 1 oz
Butter 14 oz

Instructions:

First remove the white film from the brie by scraping it with the back of a butter knife. Score the brie wheel with a chef knife four times diagonally. Preheat oven to 500 degrees. In a large sauté pan over medium heat melt the butter until slightly brown, then add pecan pieces and sauté for a minute, then add both raisins and sauté another minute. Add both honey and Steen's to the pan and allow to simmer over low heat about five minutes. Remove from heat and season with salt and pepper to taste. Pour raisin and pecan topping over brie wheel and place in oven for ten minutes on a baking sheet. Remove from oven and serve over warm bread or crackers.
