

Convention Speakers



Susan Keller DVM, North Dakota State Veterinarian

Dr. Susan Keller graduated from Kansas State University with a B.S. in Animal Science and a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from K-State in 1985. She first practiced in Bowman and Mandan, ND, before operating the Countryside Animal Clinic located south of Mandan from 1987 to 1997. She served on the ND Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners from 1990 to 1993. Dr. Keller was appointed to the ND Deputy State Veterinarian position in 1997 and then in 2004 was appointed to the position of ND State Veterinarian. Dr. Keller was trained to be a Foreign Animal Disease Diagnostician, a Tuberculosis and Brucellosis Epidemiologist and is the past president of the National Assembly of State Animal Health Officials. Susan and her husband Dwight and their children Luke & Katy, Jake and Tess, live and work together on the Keller Broken Heart Ranch.



Kevin K. Sedivec, Extension Rangeland Specialist and Range Science Professor – North Dakota State University, and Interim Director – NDSU Central Grasslands Research and Extension Center

Tracy Hunt, Attorney

Tracy Hunt is rancher and attorney from Newcastle, Wyoming. He obtained a degree in professional agricultural economics and a law degree from the University of Wyoming. During his entire professional career Hunt has been active in public service, having been elected by the voters of Weston County, Wyoming to serve two terms each as county and prosecuting attorney and county coroner. He was also appointed by the governor to serve a six year term on the highly contentious Wyoming Game and Fish Commission. He is presently serving a second term as county commissioner.

Hunt took an interest in the collusive Global Roundtable for Sustainable Beef while his wife, Donna was battling against repeated efforts to impose mandatory traceability in Wyoming producers during her service on the Wyoming Livestock Board. Their son, Hans was the youngest person ever elected to the Wyoming Legislature and is currently midway through his fourth term in the House of Representatives. Together they run a cow/calf operation grazing on deeded and leased private ground and state and federal lands in the Black Hills of Wyoming and South Dakota.



Jess Peterson, Western Skies Strategies

Jess Peterson is the President and CEO of Western Skies Strategies (WSS). For over a decade, Peterson has specialized in executive management, strategic consulting and government relations for a number of clients focused in the agricultural and natural resource arena.

Peterson and his team at WSS provide strategic consulting services that enable clients to successfully navigate Congress, federal agencies and the media.

Peterson also serves as a spokesperson for various membership groups and frequently appears on national media forums and industry panels representing agriculture and natural resource interests along with updates on executive management. In his travels he has given more than 250 speeches in nearly 30 states.

Jess and Laura along with daughters Cadence and Chloe manage a cattle herd that is part of Peterson Land and Livestock, a cow-calf operation based near Custer, MT (Yellowstone County). 



In Memory of Jim Roshau...

1951-2018

...one of I-BAND's Biggest supporters



"Couple of stories come to mind that started the idea of why I made this project. It was memories from my dad. As I grew up, my dad explained to me that Japan was buying all our rubber (tires) and our copper. Everyone thought it was funny because they could take their used tires to junk yards not knowing that Japan was buying our rubber and copper. Well guess what they did...? WWII started. Japan attacked America on American rubber using American copper in their bullets. That brings another point to mind. Germany; Dwight Eisenhower over there. He could have, by the remarks my dad had made, he could have shortened up the war if the roads were adequate. My dad was

with him when he walked into the first concentration camp. No one had been in there. No food, no doctors, nothing. It was just Eisenhower and my dad, not his staff, he was there and they walked in. No big cigar, no jeeps; they walked in. It was unreal; the thin survivors, the furnaces, gas chambers and the pits where they were buried. It was just a sight to see. My dad made us go see the movie, he used the documentary that was made with the Germans on trial at Nuremberg. After the war, when Eisenhower became president, he completed the interstate road structure in America, Alaska and Hawaii so we could move our military any direction any time. It was required in defense to protect America, our interstate system was designed for that, not for public use. Thank God we've got it, it's

a wonderful aspect to our industry, to our lives. It needs to be said, that most people don't understand that's why the interstate system was made in America.

With that, the only thing to do now is to break down the project I made. Coming from my ideas and thoughts from my dad. The base of the structure is designed so when you look at it in the center it's a star. That star represents us, Americans. The horseshoes used to make the base and the upright are all American made, used on American horses doing American work.



The singletrees that balance on top is Studebaker made, an American Studebaker singletree. Each side of that is made by Studebaker, American manufacturer. On each of the sides is a bell. The bells are a balance. Everyone can understand what the balance is. We need a method to ring the bells. We are sending things elsewhere to just to buy back our products. That's why I built it. Wake up call; we are letting it happen again. One last thing I want to mention. The last time we won a war was WWII. We've never accomplished anything anywhere. We have lost American lives, its cost us American money and with no recourse. We don't go out and finish what we've started or what we had to start we just walk out. That's all. This is to identify COOL. Americans need to know they are buying American beef."
