Government Overreach Disguised as Traceability

The USDA's new mandatory EID rule is a clear example of government overreach. This isn't about disease traceability—it's about control of the cattle industry. Just look at Denmark and Ireland, both of which have EID mandates. Denmark has imposed a "cow tax" under the banner of climate change, and Ireland is pushing for a 40% reduction in its cattle herd for the same reason. If that's not a warning, what is?

The USDA drastically underestimated the cost of implementing this program. Now, states are running out of tags, and the added costs are falling squarely on producers—many of whom are already operating on thin margins. The new Secretary of Agriculture needs to recognize this and repeal the rule.

The Beef Checkoff: Time for a Reset

The Beef Checkoff may have started with good intentions, but today it's a broken system. What was once meant to promote beef has turned into a cash cow for lobbying groups who siphon off millions through "administrative fees" and use those funds to advocate against the very producers footing the bill. It's time to demand full transparency—or better yet—scrap the current system and rebuild it as a **voluntary** program that truly serves producers.

Don't Confuse High Prices with a Healthy Industry

Yes, cattle prices are at record highs—but that doesn't mean we can rest easy. The same issues that drove tens of thousands of independent producers off the land are still here. Without serious reforms, today's high prices won't prevent tomorrow's decline.

Food Security Is National Security

Record beef imports from countries with weak safety standards pose a direct threat to our food supply—and, by extension, our national security. An America-first policy should mean that consumers can confidently know where their beef comes from, and that U.S. producers are rewarded for raising the safest, highest-quality beef in the world. That's why mandatory Country of Origin Labeling (MCOOL) is just common sense—and long overdue.

Fix the Market: Ban Unpriced Contracts

Unpriced fat cattle contracts have tilted the playing field in favor of large corporate feedyards and meatpackers, forcing independent feeders out of business. Over the years, this has gutted rural economies and destroyed competition. To restore a fair market, we must:

- Ban unpriced contracts
- Require 100% cash cattle trade
- Enforce the Packers and Stockyards Act (P&S Act)

If we want to keep young families in rural America and bring life back to Main Street, we need commonsense reforms—not more top-down mandates.

USCA Applauds USDA's Decisive Action to Close U.S. - Mexico Border in Response to New World Screwworm Threat

WASHINGTON — The United States Cattlemen's Association (USCA) expressed its sincere appreciation for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) decisive action to close live animal imports at the southern border, in response to the surge of New World Screwworm (NWS) cases across Mexico. This is an issue USCA members shared widely in Washington, DC last week across USDA agencies and congressional offices. This coordinated measure, grounded in scientific expertise and decades of cross-border collaboration, is critical to preserving the health of America's cattle herd and the future of the U.S. beef supply.

"We are grateful to Secretary Rollins and the USDA for recognizing the urgent threat posed by the New World Screwworm and making the hard decision to halt animal movement across the southern border," USCA President Justin Tupper said, following an in-depth USDA-APHIS stakeholder briefing that included USCA policy staff. "Closing the border to Mexico will protect the U.S. beef supply and U.S. producers from the New World Screwworm. This is an issue that was resolved in the 1970s after the parasite caused severe and lasting damage to America's cattle herd. Its re-emergence is a very serious issue with potentially catastrophic consequences if left unchecked."

According to recent APHIS data shared with USCA and industry stakeholders, there have been over 1,400 detections of NWS across Mexico as of May 9, with outbreaks progressing steadily northward. Notably, active cases are now present in Chiapas, Tabasco, and as far north as central Oaxaca — just 127 miles from Mexico's crucial secondary barrier. The ongoing increase in detections includes new cases in Veracruz, a major cattle movement corridor. Quick action is a necessity.

"Generations of ranching families remember the devastation the last NWS outbreak caused. Thanks to USDA's vigilance and strong partnership with Mexico, we have the tools, surveillance, and sterile insect technology to respond, but controlling animal movement and closing ports of entry are essential first steps," Tupper continued.

The NWS eradication effort relies on three science-based pillars: animal movement control, rapid identification and education, and the sterile insect technique. The USDA's sterile insect facility in Panama is currently operating at maximum capacity, releasing over 100 million sterile insects weekly in Mexico, with increased aerial dispersal flights and covering 3,000 – 6,000 insects per linear nautical mile — far surpassing historic levels. Technical teams are in the field, evaluating surveillance and helping Mexican partners expand monitoring and outreach. It is essential that the population of sterile flies is maintained for prevention efforts.

USCA also appreciates the regular and transparent communication with USDA and international partners, as well as the swift implementation of animal health safeguards, enhanced tick rider monitoring along the border, and ongoing evaluation of port activities to ensure safety is maintained at every level.

While understanding the significant impact this temporary closure may have on cross-border commerce and producers, USCA stands firmly behind USDA and APHIS in prioritizing animal health and the long-term viability of the American beef industry. Disease prevention and eradication measures will be more impactful and financially feasible than any emergency management strategy that would result from an outbreak.

"We must remain vigilant. The lessons of the past, combined with today's cutting-edge surveillance and eradication tools, give us the best possible chance to halt this outbreak," Tupper concluded. "USCA will continue to work hand-in-hand with USDA, state veterinarians, and our neighbors in Mexico to eradicate the New World Screwworm once again and safeguard America's cattle ranching heritage."

The main program opens Wednesday, June 18, following a convention welcome and prayer breakfast led by Max Thornsberry, D.V.M. Wednesday afternoon will include litigation updates from attorneys Kara Rollins on R-CALF USA's electronic ID eartag lawsuit, Patrick McGahan on its antitrust lawsuit against the Big Four packers, and David Muraskin on its beef checkoff lawsuit. A social and steak dinner will follow, featuring a presentation from international journalist Alex Newman.

Thursday, June 19, will begin with a membership breakfast and updates from R-CALF USA CEO Bill Bullard and the R-CALF USA committee chairs.

Speakers for Thursday will include Wyoming rancher and attorney Tracy Hunt; American Stewards of Liberty Executive Director Margaret Byfield; South Dakota ranchers Charles and Heather Maude; U.S. Rep. Harriet Hageman, R-Wyo.; and U.S. Sen. Mike Rounds, R-S.D.

Thursday afternoon will feature a live recording of the *Lonesome Report* podcast with Jim Mundorf and Shad Sullivan, followed by the organization's annual business meeting, where current R-CALF USA members will present proposed policy resolutions. Final voting will take place via mail-in ballot.

The convention concludes Thursday evening with the Denim and Diamonds Gala, which will include a steak dinner, live auction and dance featuring JJ Kent and the Aces and 8's. Cowboy cocktail attire is encouraged but not required.






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
