

Collective Remarks

Member Pick! What video(s) do I watch in the Dressage Naturally Video Classroom?

This month I was asked for haunches-in videos. Doing a search in the Classroom showed 25 videos that talked about haunches-in. There are lots of riding videos. at least one on long-lining and another inhand version. The in-hand video was the longest of the ones I watched at 20 minutes. This video showed you how to use a fence line to help you create the haunches-in inhand. This is a great skill to learn to help you, the rider, get a visual of what is going on when your horse is trying the haunches-in. Karen demonstrates with different horses, so you can see how it may look different with horses of different types and different training stages.

I picked 3 of the riding videos to watch and they are packed full of information! The first one, The Secret to Shoulder-In and Haunches-In, explained how the haunches-in is biomechanically the same as renvers and how you can use this knowledge to make a better haunches-in. Often, people feel like they are doing a good haunches-in because the horse easily swings its rear end around. Typically, this is because the horse is heavy on the forehand, thereby making it easier to move the haunches. Karen talks about how to recognize that problem, correct it, and gives some tips for "cheating" your way into the haunches-in during a test. She also talks about how not to get wrapped up in the terminology. Sometimes we focus too much on what the term says than what the exercise should be. Then, Karen demonstrates an exercise on the circle to help improve coordination in your horse, thereby improving your haunches-in.

The second video I watched was Creating more bend in the Haunches In. I thought, who hasn't seen that written on a score sheet?! Again, it turns out that lack of bend is the horse falling onto the inside shoulder in the haunches-in. Karen worked with two different riders in this video just learning the movement. She encouraged them to SLOW DOWN teaching the horses the movement through the halt and walk. Karen showed the riders how to use a neck rope to slow the front end down, rather than use their reins. She wanted them to be able to create the haunches-in at the walk with little use of the reins. A common problem is the inside rein crossing over the mid-line of the neck.

Karen explained that this is showing you that the horse is falling onto the inside shoulder and that the correction needs to be in the body (not the mouth). She challenged the riders to use their seat and thigh to create the bend while leaving the inside rein for subtle positioning of the head. In this video Karen also used the example of renvers being biomechanically the same positioning as haunches-in. Karen had the riders in this video use the same exercise she demonstrated in the first video to perfect their haunches-in. She showed them how to use this exercise throughout the arena and used sketches to demonstrate the positioning for video watchers. Karen emphasized that you should feel like your inside thigh is sending the outside front leg over and that your inside thigh needs to do the job you think your inside rein wants to do. 

In this video Karen films from her helmet cam, so you can see what your view as a rider should look like while in the haunches-in (and several other lateral movements). This is a great video for anyone who wants to get clear about where they should be looking or where the horse should be looking during the lateral work.


A common problem: The shoulder falls in and the horse oses the bend


The missing skill: To be able to mobilize and maintain the shoulder towards the outside of the bend aka: Renvers




Solution:

To be able to use that skill within the Haunches In

(without losing the feeling of the shoulders staying 'into' the outside rein)




