Thomas Longboat (1887-1949) was an Iroquo long distance runner from the Six Hations. In 1907 he won the Botton Marzhoto breaking a previous records. In 1909 he won the title of Professional Champion of the World. An inspiration, he also joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force during World War One.



Chlune Sughara (1900-1986) was a Japanese diplom who served as vice-consul for the Japanese Empire in Kaunas, Lithuania. During the Second World War, Sughbar helped thousands of Jess file Europe by Issuing transit visas to them so that they could travel through Japanese territory, risking his job and the live of his family.



Helen Keller (1880-1968) championed people with disabilities She was deal and blind due to an illness at a young age. Nevertheless, she published books, spoke out politically and advanced human rights. She inspired and empowered millions of people to change the world. Each one of us has the power to make the world a better place. The Power of One is a unique exhibit that calls attention to the unique sacrifices made by individual to help others. The exhibit forces its audience to ask:

Martin Luther King Ir. was possibly the greater civil rights leader of all time. He advanced the rights and freedoms of Black Americans throu non-violence and civil disobedience from 1955 until his tragic assassination in 1968.



rousin social worker, trena Sendler, exemplifies The Power of One. From 1940 to 1944, the was imobbed in clandestine operations to assist primarily children in the Warsaw Ghetto. At great personal risk, she helpset smuggle lewish people out from impending death, placing them in orphanages and various hiding places



Max Einen survived Auxchwitz and is the sole survivor from his family. Since then, he has committed his life to Holocaust education and awareness. His memoir, By Chance Alone, won the prestigious Canada Reads Award. For his contribution to Canada, he has won many awards and three Honorary Doctorate Degrees.







This exhibit features many notable figures who have contributed to making the world a better, safer, and more inclusive place for all.








This exhibit invites its audience to consider five key questions:
