

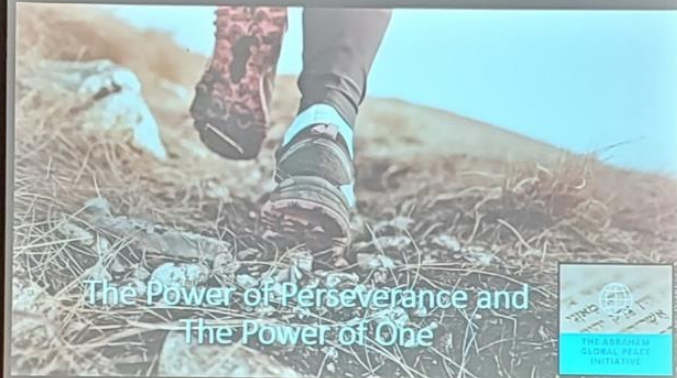

What would you do in the same situation?

Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi (1869-1948) was an Indian lawyer, anti-colonial nationalist, and political ethicist who employed nonviolent resistance to lead the successful campaign for India's independence from British rule and in inspired movements for civil rights and in the world.

— Teresa (1910-1997) was considered one of the 20th century's greatest humanitarians, and was named as Saint Teresa of Calcutta in 2016. She was the founder of the Order of the Missionaries of Charity, a Catholic congregation of women dedicated to serving the poor. For her humanitarian work, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

— Anne Frank (1929-1945) hid from the Nazis during the occupation of Amsterdam. Two years later she was deported to the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp. The diary she left behind has inspired millions of people to make the world a better place.

What can you do to change the world?



Thomas Longboat (1887-1949) was an Iroquois long distance runner from the Six Nations. In 1907 he won the Boston Marathon breaking all previous records. In 1909 he won the title of Professional Champion of the World. An inspiration, he also joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force during World War One.



Chiune Sugihara (1900-1986) was a Japanese diplomat who served as vice-consul for the Japanese Empire in Kaunas, Lithuania. During the Second World War, Sugihara helped thousands of Jews flee Europe by issuing transit visas to them so that they could travel through Japanese territory, risking his job and the lives of his family.



Helen Keller (1880-1968) championed people with disabilities. She was deaf and blind due to an illness at a young age. Nevertheless, she published books, spoke out politically and advanced human rights. She inspired and empowered millions of people to change the world.

The Power of One

Each one of us has the power to make the world a better place. The Power of One is a unique exhibit that calls attention to the unique sacrifices made by individuals to help others. The exhibit forces its audience to ask:

What would you do in the same situation?



Martin Luther King Jr. was possibly the greatest civil rights leader of all time. He advanced the rights and freedoms of Black Americans through non-violence and civil disobedience from 1955 until his tragic assassination in 1968.



Polish social worker, Irena Sendler, exemplifies The Power of One. From 1940 to 1944, she was involved in clandestine operations to assist primarily children in the Warsaw Ghetto. At great personal risk, she helped smuggle Jewish people out from impending death, placing them in orphanages and various hiding places.



Max Eisen survived Auschwitz and is the sole survivor from his family. Since then, he has committed his life to Holocaust education and awareness. His memoir, By Chance Alone, won the prestigious Canada Reads Award. For his contribution to Canada, he has won many awards and three Honorary Doctorate Degrees.

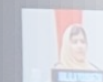
What would you do in the same situation?



Terry Fox said he wanted to make the world a better place. He was diagnosed with cancer in 1973 and lost his right leg. He died after running the Marathon of Hope to raise money for cancer research. He has now raised \$200 million.



Swedish environmentalist, Greta Thunberg, inspired the world by demanding that world leaders take action on climate change. She is now a UN Climate Change Ambassador.



Malala Yousafzai became the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace Prize for her advocacy for education. In 2014, she was named Time magazine's Person of the Year.

5. How can you help change the world for the better today?

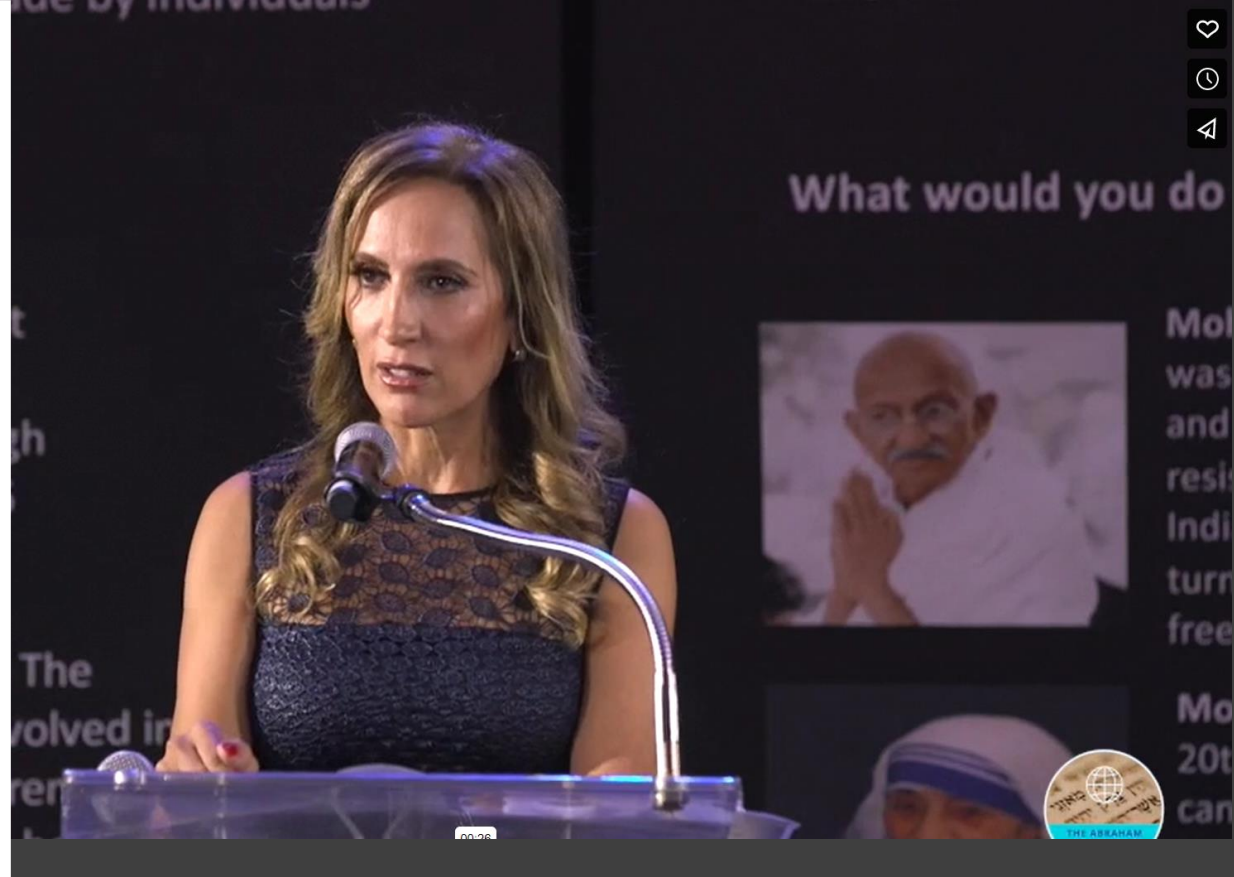
